

1. Improve Your Slam bidding

This hand comes from a Thursday Open standard game at our East Lindfield venue, with 19 Tables playing the hand.



Notes on the bidding:

The likely bidding sequences are shown for 4 common bidding systems, all coping with a minimum level Spade overcall by East.

The **Standard** bidders start with:

South North

4+clubs, 10+ HCPs

When West overcalls with 2♠ or 3♠ this pushes NS towards a slam. A jump to 4NT is usually treated as Roman Keycard Blackwood in opener's suit (♥) and from there you get to 6♥.

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The <u>2/1 Game force</u> bidders will have a similar auction, as shown previously, except that they are in a game force auction.

The <u>ACOL bidders</u> start with a strong 2♥. The 3♠ overcall again pushes them towards slam.

The <u>Precision bidders</u> above are also in a strong game force position before the 3♠ overcall that pushes them towards slam.


Notes on the Matchpoint Scoring

- Only one pair bid the cold 6♥, and made
 tricks and scored a TOP 100%.
- 3. Sixteen pairs bid 4♥ or 5♥ and made an easy 12 tricks for an average+ (53%).
- One pair bid game but somehow only made 11 tricks. There should be 7H+2D+3C=12. The cost was -47%, for just giving away 1 under trick!

West's Lead? East overcalled spades, so West should lead T♠, top card from a doubleton.

South's Planning

Losers: Just one quick spade loser, unless you're very lucky and they lead a heart.
Winners: Looks like 7♥+2♦+3♣ = 12 tricks



Card by Card play in 6H by South

- East leads T♠ to West's J♠.
- 2. West tries to cash A♠, but South ruffs with 9♥. South can't afford a high honour, as the hearts are likely to be 3/1 or even 4/0.
- 3. South draws trumps with the A, K, Q, and can pitch a diamond on dummy's clubs.

Declarer can now count the opposition hands:

- East has 6/7♠+3♥ + 4/3 minor cards.
- West has 2/3♠+1♥ + 9/10 minor cards

South has 4 tricks already plus 3 + 2 + 3 = 12 tricks, so should either claim or at least play the hand out quickly.


NSBC Pre-Paid System

2 Club News 2a. From the Manager



Membership of the North Shore Bridge Club

Our membership year follows the calendar year, so we are coming up to membership renewal time. You might be interested to know that out of your membership fee we pay your subscription to the Australian Bridge Federation (the ABF), to the NSW Bridge Association and to Club Willoughby, so that you are automatically a member of these organisations.

Of particular note is the travel insurance scheme available to ABF members, which is at favourable rates; if you are about to go overseas and you are looking for insurance, do check them out. Club Willoughby also offers their members a small discount on drinks from the bar.

You're not yet a club Member?

If you aren't already a member of our club, do think about joining! The annual fee is \$65 for a calendar year, and once we get to December, you can join and effectively get 13 months of membership. The benefits of membership include a free game in your birthday month, a free drink or coffee at the bar and a \$5 voucher towards a meal at The Orrery. More importantly you can then join our Pre-Paid system for pre-paying your table money, and as you'll see below, your membership will be automatically renewed.

You're a member, but you're not on the Pre-Paid system

Save yourself the hassle of finding \$12 each time you play, **and** save 5% on your table fee. Simply start your PP account with an initial deposit and we'll deduct \$11.40 each time you

play. You'll get a monthly statement of your account and when your balance is getting low we'll remind you to top up with a deposit via the club website or with the director of your session.

If you prefer not to become a PP member, then you need to pay your \$65 via the club website, or to the director of your session, before the end of December 2018.

You're a member, **and** you're on the Pre-Paid system

As we did last year, we plan to automatically renew memberships for our Pre-Paid members, by debiting their accounts with \$65 towards the end of December. This saves you having to do it, and it also saves the directors and the office a great deal of administration.

Note that you must be a current member to be in the PP system.

If anything relating to membership renewals isn't clear, feel free to discuss it with your director.

BOOK REVIEW by Nick Fahrer

Planning the Play - The Next Level by Barbara Seagram and David Bird

In 2010 the first in this series of texts,

Planning the Play of a Bridge Hand, won the prestigious American Bridge Teachers

Association Book of the Year award. Seagram and Bird now take declarer play technique up a level and introduce a few more complex concepts. Here's a great example of playing a suit and a hand safely.

★ K 7 4 **86** ♦ KQ763 ♣ A 5 3 **♦**853 **♦** J 10 9 2 • A 10 7 5 4 ♥ J 9 2 J985 4 **♠** A Q 6 ♣ KJ72 ▼ K Q 3 ♣ Q 9 ♦ A 10 2 10864

You are in 3NT and get the lead of the 5. You have eight sure winners (3 spades, 1 heart, 3 diamonds and 1 club). How do you play the hand? Now you might make five diamonds if they split 3-2 but you only need four diamond winners to make your contract. But you cannot afford to let East get on lead or they will play a heart and you will go down. So... what should you do?

You should play a small diamond to the King and then a small diamond back to the 10 (finessing). It might lose but then West cannot attack hearts, so you will be safe. On this hand you will be rewarded with an overtrick as East has the DJ.


<u>4a. Useful Bidding Tools – BERGEN</u> <u>Raises</u>

If you know about a 9-card fit in a major, it is likely your opponents will also have a big fit. It makes sense to jump, or pre-empt, thus consuming the opponents' bidding space, often bidding their suit, and at the same time accurately defining your hand for your partner. Bergen raises are a widely used and very useful bidding tool. They were created by American expert Marty Bergen.



4b. Duplicate Bridge Scoring

The basic duplicate bridge scoring in all our pairs events is a Matchpoint scoring method. This is used by all bridge clubs for pairs events utilising standard duplicate movements such as Mitchells and Howells.

Historically: There was a traveller score sheet attached to the back of each physical duplicated board. Players updated their results onto the "traveller" and could see any previously entered results. The director collected all the travellers at the end of session and then had to manually work out a Matchpoint score for each pair.

As described last month, the Matchpoint scores were allocated to each partnership per board, giving:

- 2 points for each pair that your score beats
- 1 point for each pair with the same score
- 0 points if you didn't better, or even equal, another pair. In other words, your score was the lowest for that board.

These days almost everything is automated.

- Hands are generated by a computer program.
- These hands are transferred into dealing machines and dealt many times for the duplicate event.
- The director has real-time scoring computers and complex software
- Bridgemates are used on all tables. Scores are entered and collected using a wireless network, back to the director's computer.
- Results are available immediately after the last board is played. These can be displayed on overhead monitors.
- Printed hand records are made available immediately after play
- Through **Pianola**, analysis and scoring details of all played sessions are freely available, shortly after the session ends.

4c. The Australian Masterpoint System

In Australia the Masterpoint system is run by the ABF and it has several purposes:

- To stimulate interest in Contract Bridge.
- To provide a means of measuring player achievements.
- To assist with the financing of the ABF's national and international commitments.

The scheme allows affiliated bridge clubs to award Masterpoints to players at their clubs. The clubs submit **monthly awards** lists to the ABF data centre. The ABF compiles these awards against each player's ABF Number.

A number of Bridge Ranks have been defined, based on the Masterpoints earned. Some of the higher ranks demand a minimum number of Red and then Gold points. Masterpoints are earned as follows:

Types of Masterpoints

<u>Green Points</u> Clubs normally award green point for most local duplicate bridge sessions and club events.

<u>Red Points</u> - The NSWBA has control of awards for State sponsored championships and congress events.

<u>Gold Points</u> - ABF has control of awards for National Events. You generally have to play in national events to win Gold Points.

ABF Masterpoint scheme

The ABF controls the number of Red Point_Sessions that can be allocated during the year at each club, based on their_home club membership numbers.

For our club the number of sessions we were allocated this year, and have been allocated for next year, are shown below in red:

The NSBC runs 3 x **ABF sponsored GNOT** teams event qualifiers each year that issue <u>Gold Points</u> at our club sessions.

<u>4e. How many Masterpoints for each ranking?</u>

The table opposite shows you how many points you need for each ABF ranking.

You will notice that to get past the "*Regional Master" rank you need to acquire some Red or Gold Masterpoints.

To get past the "**National" rank you specifically need to acquire some Gold points.

To get to the exalted ranks of the various levels of Grand Master, you must be a pretty good player, you must have played a lot to amass that many points, and you need to have done well at State and National events to get all those Red and Gold points. We are fortunate to have many Grand Masters playing at our club.

5a. Pat O'Connor Bridge Problem

This month Pat has chosen another hand from "A First Book of Bridge Problems".

There are copies of his books in our library, but they are also available through the Bridge Shop on Penshurst Street. You still have time to get you partner a copy, a great Christmas gift / hint! Seriously, if you have a regular partner, it's a great idea to get copies of this book and to take the problems one at a time and discuss them together.

As South, you have an unbalanced hand with 16 HCP and no 4-card major, so you open 1♣.

Partner responds 1♥ and you bid 1♠, still looking for a fit. Partner with a good 6-card heart suit rebids 3♥ which is invitational to game.

You have no heart support but with the clubs well covered you bid 3NT. West leads the ♠Q.

How do you plan to play the hand?

Initial Analysis

Counting the tricks that you can win without losing the lead, you only have four winners, two in spades and two in clubs.

Where could the additional tricks come from? The defenders have led spades, so that is their suit. Diamonds look dodgy, best left alone, and there is no likelihood of any extra tricks in clubs.

However, you have five potential tricks in hearts once you knock out the ♥A. Sounds easy, so what is the trap?

How are you going to get to dummy to make the long heart tricks?

How will you play the hearts?

Read on for the solution!

Most of the new players come to the club through word-of-mouth, so if you have had a good experience with us, do pass on the message!

Start your bridge journey at our club with the lessons for beginners, or come along after you have learned somewhere else to take advantage of our extended teaching program and our many levels of play for the newer players.

5b. From one of our newer players

Robert started in the Beginners class with Liz Wilkinson, but has rarely had the time for more than one session a week. He chose to play a session, rather than go to more classes, so started with a weekly Supervised game. He now plays regularly at Rookie level.

Can you become a bridge player if you are time-poor?

"Can you learn bridge, if you are time poor? Can you play bridge competitively if you are time poor? It is my contention that you can. If I can do it, you can do it too.

Am I time poor? You bet I am. I currently run a professional practice that takes up a considerable part of my week. I am planning to retire in the not too distant future. However, retiring and not having anything to do scares me. Therefore I have started to put certain things into place, not only to occupy my time when I do retire, but to stimulate my brain and my body as well. To address the latter, I am playing Golf and to keep my brain in good working order I started Bridge. My dilemma is, that I only have limited time and can only commit to one session of card playing per week.

I was introduced to cards, playing Euchre with my grandmother. This was way back when I was aged in single figures. Most of all I remember that I did enjoy the experience playing with my Nan. I enjoyed the concentration it taught and the quick thinking it required. I enjoyed the partnership skills and I remember the great satisfaction it provided when I managed to get things right. Above all. I remember that it was fun.

So, with this background, and in the full knowledge that I am time poor, I set out to give bridge a go. I attended two lots of beginners' lessons run by the exuberant Liz Wilkinson at NSBC. Thereafter, I played some basic hands under supervision. This built up my confidence. Today, I have the opportunity to express and test myself

against some very accomplished players once a week at the Rookie session held at NSBC on a Tuesday morning.

Initially it was daunting playing with people who attend 3 or maybe 4 sessions of bridge a week. They were progressing at a much faster rate. To compensate and to keep pace with my peers they suggested two books by Paul Marston. The Principles of Card Play and The Language of Bidding. These books opened my eyes to what is possible. They provided the "know how" to be more competitive and I can consult them at any time. I highly commend them.

So, a couple of years on, what is my report card? To be brutally honest, I play bridge badly. I make many errors. But you know what, this encourages me to persevere. It is a fact that the best players make many errors in a session. Ask them. I nevertheless keep going because my brain needs to work harder and after all that is one reason for being there.

The other reason is for the social engagement. It is a well-established fact that participating in bridge keeps dementia at bay because it not only offers a cognitive challenge but does so with a large social component. From my experience, participants at the Tuesday sessions have a good sense of humour and we have lots of laughs. I have met some genuinely lovely people. Sure, there are times when one is looking to slaughter the innocent, to search for the guilty, to look for a hole to crawl into, but above all it is fun. And that is why I am there and will keep going."

In an ideal world, where bridge is your only priority, new players come at least twice a week. However, as we can see from Robert's experience, even if time permits only one visit a week, you can still develop and enjoy your game.

<u>5c. The Solution to the Pat O'Connor problem</u>

It is best not to hold up a spade winner at trick 1, because if the opponents switch to diamonds at trick 2, before you have set up the hearts, they might be able to cause you some trouble. So, should you win with dummy's Ace or with the King in hand?

Remember that the problem here could be entries to the dummy, to get to your heart tricks once you have forced out the Ace. So, win the first trick in hand with the ♠K, preserving the ♠A in dummy to access the hearts.

Now you must set up the hearts, so start with the ♥Q from your hand. West plays a small heart, you call for a small heart from dummy and East also plays small. It's your trick, but the lead is in your hand. You can go to dummy with the A♠ and keep playing hearts until the Ace appears, but how do you get to dummy now? You have no more entries!

What is the answer? Play the ♥Q at trick 2, but when West plays small you overtake the ♥Q with dummy's ♥K. Now the lead is in the dummy and you can keep playing big hearts until the Ace appears. When you get the lead back you still have the ♠A in dummy as an entry.

This should be part of the planning process before you play to trick 1.

Key Point

Be prepared to <u>overtake</u> an honour,

in order to preserve an entry.

And if you were the defenders?

Looking at this hand from the defenders' point of view, when declarer starts with the ♥Q at trick 2, it should be obvious that they are planning to set up dummy's hearts as winners. You can see that dummy only has one entry with the ♠A, so this is the perfect time for the defenders to duck the ♥Q and make declarer work for the Ace!

This is the best-known bridge site on the internet. You can register for a free account very easily, and access many free resources including free bridge lessons for beginners and intermediates.

The most valuable part of the site is Bridge Master 2000 which allows you to learn declarer play strategies in an interactive setting. You can access some of Bridge Master 2000 for free within the Practice section.

The most popular use for Bridge Base Online is to play against players from all over the world! A word of warning though - you will probably encounter some impolite players, so I would not recommend the play function unless you have very thick skin!

5e. Developing your playing skills

We provide progressive levels of bridge sessions, so that the newer players can develop their skills, and above all their confidence, at their own pace and in an environment where they are comfortable. These levels are:

"Supervised" bridge sessions are the first level of game. They run for 2 hours and players usually get through 12 boards. During these games a director is on hand to help players with both the bidding and the play.

"Rookie" bridge sessions come next. They are still only 2 hours, but 18 boards are played so the pace is the same as in the Open game where 27 boards are played in 3 hours. The director is not available for help.

Note that there is a 15-minute talk on bidding or play, before both the Supervised and Rookie sessions.

"Restricted" bridge sessions are the next level again. They are full 3-hour bridge sessions, playing 27 boards, but players with more than 300 Masterpoints are encouraged not to play in these sessions.

And then the sky's the limit, it's on to the Open game!

There are also some special events for the newer players, including the "Under a Hundred Masterpoints Tournament", held at East Lindfield (see section 5f).


