



1. Improve Your Slam bidding

Notes on the Match point Scores: This hand came up in the 2018 Stratified Pairs session 1, hand 13, played by 34 Tables.



N/S must bid Slam to score well!

To score an equal top you have to bid 6, find the QA and make 13 tricks.

Only 16 pairs bid slam. 18 Pairs failed to reach the slam.

South knows they have at least 30+ HCP and 5/3 spade fit, that's slam territory!

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Bid a slam for a good result

97% is top when you bid 6 and find the Q to make all 13 tricks.

73% when you bid 6 and lose to the Q but make 12 tricks.

Underbidding with a game scores poorly

41% is average, when you only bid game, but find the Q▲ and make all 13 tricks.

18% when you only bid game and only make 12 tricks.


5% is nearly bottom, for 4NT making 11 tricks. 0% is a bottom for 3NT making just 10 tricks.

Key Messages:

You must **bid your slams** to score well when everybody is likely to bid slam.

Stay with the field.

Even if you go down, everybody else probably does as well and you obtain about average score!

We have 30+ HCP, nothing wasted in diamonds. 6 should make.

Alternatively: by partnership agreement 4 of a suit is a second 5-card suit

Key Tools: Cue raise

A Cue Raise of opponent's overcall suit **shows** a strong fit in your partner's suit, forcing to at least the next bid in the suit.

1 opened, 2 overcalled.

How to support partner?

3 Cue Raise (strong fit) forcing to 3 2. Weak support, maybe less than 6 **HCPs**

3. Limited Support, maybe 7-9 HCPs

4 Pre-emptive, maybe just long spades

X Negative, shows 4-4 in the other suits

X first, then followed by a Cue asks for a stopper

Key Messages:

Hands with fitting shortages make extra tricks. For example, Axx opposite x allows you to ruff the xx.

Hands with unfitting shortages are potential misfits. For example, AKQx opposite x has wasted values. Consider a signoff in game

Editor:

Useful tips and tools

<u>Jacoby 2NT</u>, Game Force, agrees partner's major and requests shortage information to assess the fit.

1 ▲ - P - 2NT
3 ♣, 3 ◆, 3 ♥ these are shortages
3 ▲ shows six spades, no singleton, maximum strength
3NT shows maximum strength, no singleton
4 ▲ is a signoff, no shortage, minimum HCPs
(11-12)
4 ♣, 4 ◆, 4 ♥ responses are 5/5 hands

4NT Keycard or Blackwood, check for Aces

- 5. (1 or 4) keycards
- 5 (0 or 3) keycards
- 5 (2 or 5) keycards no Q trumps
- 5. (2 or 5) keycards with Q trumps

Note: <u>5 Keycards</u> = 4 Aces + K trumps

This is often written on system cards "1430"

Bidding the next suit in Keycard asks for the Queen of trumps (if missing).

5NTasks for Kings. This is used when looking for a grand slam. By agreement either:

- Bid specific Kings up the line, but not past the trump suit
- Give a count of Kings, 0,1,2 etc.

2. Stratified and Congress Results

2a. 2018 TBIB Stratified Match Point Pairs

A stratified pairs event was run over the four Saturdays in August, in parallel at Club Willoughby and at East Lindfield. The board scores were merged from both venues, and then match pointed across the whole field. Your best three scores were counted & totaled to provide your total MP score (i.e. % Scores)

Over the four weeks 34, 40, 34 and 35 tables participated in the event.

Pairs were graded on their average current ABF Masterpoint status (A+B)/2 and a number of winners were declared in the 5 categories:



4. Improve your card play skills

This hand on play analysis was provided by Pat O'Connor, our resident bridge book author!



The bidding was:

West	North	East	South
	1♣	1 🗸	1♠
Pass	2♠	All Pass	

North opens 1♣ and East overcalls 1♥. You have nine HCP and four spades, so you respond 1♠, which partner, with a minimum opening hand and four spades, raises to 2♠ and everyone passes.

West leads the **v**2. What is your plan?

Initial Analysis


You have two possible losers in hearts, four in diamonds and one in clubs. However, things are promising because three of your diamond losers can be ruffed in dummy and/or thrown on the long club winners.

East surely has the ♥K for the overcall so if you duck in dummy and East takes the ♥K, your ♥Q will be set up.

But is this the best way to proceed?

The lead of the ♥2 is ominous. A **two** is often the **lowest card from four** because the common lead from a long suit is the fourth highest. It cannot be from a doubleton because the standard lead from a **doubleton is the higher card.** But here, because East has bid he has at least five hearts for the overcall. The ♥2 <u>is</u> <u>clearly a singleton!</u>

The Full Deal

Look what happens if you duck the lead in dummy.

East wins the ♥K and returns the ♥J (suit preference for diamonds, the higher of the other two suits) which West ruffs. West then leads a diamond to East's Ace and East leads the ♥4 (suit preference for clubs, the lower of the other two suits) which West ruffs. Then West leads the ♣A and another club for East to ruff. You have just <u>lost six</u> <u>tricks</u> whilst watching helplessly from the sideline. Your partner is looking equally stunned!

The sight of the ♥2 should ring alarm bells.

- You should immediately win with the **♥**A,
- Cash three rounds of trumps to deprive the defenders of their fun,
- and then play clubs until the defenders take their ♣A.
- Then they can cash their A, and • possibly the VK which will set up your ♥Q as a winner.
- In any case you will be able to dispose of three losers on the established clubs and still ruff a diamond in dummy.

You will end up with only three losers. That gives you ten tricks instead of seven!

Key Point

The opening lead of the two of a suit can be quite revealing.

When they feel that Rookie is too slow or too easy for them, we offer the 3-hour Restricted level games, suitable for players with less than 300 Masterpoints.

In this way the Northshore Bridge Club offers new players a route to the OPEN competitive game, at their own pace.

A Couple of Tips on how to Win at PAIRS BRIDGE:

Understand the Matchpoint scoring:

On any given hand's travelling score sheet, you get 2 points for every score you better, 1 point for every score you equal and zero points for having a lower score.

These are added up & translated to percentages on the Bridge-mates, and bridge players often comment on "**Top board**", "**Average board**" or "**Bottom board**" when they see their percentage scoring displayed in the bridge-mates during the session.

The NSBC stores all results for each board on **Pianola** after the session for access & review. An automated e-mail is sent to players e-mail addresses, with active links. Please do click on these links & explore the stored session results.

You are trying to score <u>against all the</u> <u>other pairs in your direction</u>, not just the pair you are playing against. Remember: Your score is the sum of (2 points, 1 point, 0 points) depending on how you compare with the other players in your direction. Usually expressed as a percentage. Any one board is only worth **4% of the total session scores**. So, don't get despondent about one poor score. Sessions are usually won on 60% to 65% total scores.

<u>As Declarer</u>: it's all about winning overtricks. An extra trick or 10 points gains many MPs. You **do not have to bid light or poor games and slams**, as extra overtricks score just as well.


<u>As Defender</u>: Make sure **you make what you're entitled to**. Don't give away any unnecessary tricks! If they make a game or slam hopefully this is just average, or a little below Average score.

Above all - Have fun!

6. The History of the North Shore Bridge Club

The NSBC was formed in 2007 with the merger of the Lindfield, Willoughby and Cove clubs. This was triggered by the need to relocate the Lindfield Bridge Club from the Lindfield arcade, now demolished and replaced with a block of units. Subsequently the Gordon club at East Lindfield joined in 2015. The diagram below tries to picture a historical perspective of the club mergers.



Lindfield Bridge Club:

1950s: The Lindfield Bridge Group, set up by Rex Knox's mother, starts playing at the Station Master's cottage in Lindfield.

1962: The Lindfield Bridge Club is formally established in the Masonic Hall in Lindfield. Rex Knox is installed as the initial president.

1965: The club moves to the St Albans Church Hall as the table numbers grow.

1970: A whole floor in the then new Lindfield arcade is leased, with half the space being sub leased to Flick & Co. A real home! No more putting out tables each play session!

2007: The move and merge to form the North Shore Bridge Club at Club Willoughby.

Club Willoughby Bridge Club

Pre-2001: Social Bridge Australia runs sessions as Willoughby Bridge Club at CW.

2001: John McIlrath starts the Club Willoughby Bridge Club as a business.

2007 Club Willoughby merges with Lindfield/Cove into the North Shore Bridge Club, playing at Club Willoughby.

Cove Bridge Club

2001 John McIlrath starts the Cove Bridge Club at Cove Tennis Centre as a business.

2007 Cove merges with Lindfield/Willoughby into the North Shore Bridge Club.

2014 The renamed Willis venue closes and members play at Club Willoughby and Mosman.

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North Shore Bridge Club

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Mosman and Diggers

2014 The Mosman club starts up with the demise of Willis and some Mosman members not wanting to play at either Club Willoughby or Trumps. John McIIrath starts the Diggers club as a business opportunity with Watermark.

2016 As part of the settlement with John McIlrath, the Mosman and Diggers start-ups are taken off the North Shore Bridge Club books and transferred formally to John McIlrath's business.

Gordon Bridge Club

1988 Greg Quittner starts the Gordon Bridge Club at 11 Cecil St, as a business.

2011 The Gordon Bridge Club moves to the West Lindfield Bowling Club.

2014 The Gordon Bridge Club moves to the East Lindfield Bowling club. This was caused partially by the Lindfield Bridge Club seeking more permanent premises and courting the West Lindfield Bowling Club as a home.

2015 The Gordon Bridge Club merges with the North Shore Bridge Club and continues to expand at the East Lindfield Bowling Club.


