We are entering a new bridge year, having recently held our AGM. I wish to add my sincere thanks to the retiring president for his 11 years in charge, having previously served on the final Lindfield Bridge Club committee which helped bring together that club and John McIlrath's bridge clubs to form the North Shore Bridge Club. We wish him well in his retirement.

John McIlrath also retired from the committee. but he continues his involvement in the club as our chief director on Thursday nights, our major competition night.

It may have been stated elsewhere, but North Shore Bridge Club is arguably the largest bridge club in the southern hemisphere. It hasn't achieved this by luck. It has been through the dedication of the staff that this has come about.

A special mention must be for our manager Mike Prescott. Most players will come across him at the club on a regular basis, but will not be aware that he spends a lot of time before and after the sessions and at weekends. dealing with issues outside the control of the club but necessary for the smooth operation of the club (e.g. internet breakdowns, computer hardware and software upgrades).

Margaret Owen works with Mike in the office, and appears to do a week's work every day.

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Then we have nearly 30 staff.

Our teachers, who give lessons and run supervised sessions, have played their part, not just in the expansion of the club, but in the retention and development of membership. Our directors run the sessions; they have to be on their toes at all times to meet the various demands of the players.

I hope to persuade both directors and teachers to provide profiles in future newsletters. There are 2 items of essential reading recently distributed to members. On the internet, Mike has issued his annual message concerning procedures for players. And Matthew McManus wrote an article on active ethics in a recent newsletter.

Following the recent presentations by the Legions Club on the development of the premises, we are now in a position to start seriously planning for our involvement. We will keep you informed of progress as and when it occurs.

Add our ongoing relationship with the East Lindfield Bowling Club, and our future is bright indeed!

#### **Thanks John**

Our Hon Secretary, David Hagley, sat down recently over a cup of coffee with our outgoing President, John Brownie, to ask a few questions of the man who has done so much for our club.

## What's been your personal history with bridge and the club John?

I started learning the game in 1986 so that I could play with my wife. 'How time flies' he quipped with a wry grin across his face! Joined Lindfield a couple of years later and became a committee member in 2006. I then took on the role of President in 2007 through until this year except for a one-year break in 2010/11. 'What a game and what a club', he added.

#### How's the club going John?

Very well indeed, and at the moment I believe it's going from strength to strength. The beginners, supervised, rookie and restricted teaching team are doing a fantastic job and our overall attendances are on the improve. An interesting statistic that was shown to me recently indicated that 49% of all CW players in a week had come through our "junior" ranks. This is a wonderful achievement and all bodes well for the future of the club. We have around 1,800 members and NSBC is now the largest bridge club in Australia, so we're doing something right! I'm also pleased about our East Lindfield club and its growth as a venue.

## What do you see as your greatest achievements?

From the outset, we must remember that we have a great number of volunteers and dedicated staff within the organization, so it hasn't been a one-man band. However, having said that, accommodation has been a long, hard grind but it appears that we are

now on the cusp of having this behind us. Hopefully the CW developments are close to the approval stage and, as mentioned, our Lindfield integration has worked wonderfully well. The club also has a very sound financial base for the future.

#### Any disappointments?

I really thought that the Gordon Bowling Club premises would have been an ideal accommodation venue for the club. However, with the State higher density housing policy, the GBC option did not progress with Council. I hope that future generations won't regret the loss of this fabulous green space. Some things are meant to be, and with this disappointment, out of the ashes came a revised negotiation and 10-year licence agreement with the Lindfield Rollers Bowling Club.

#### And for the future of the club?

I feel that we must continue to build bridges with our landlords at both CW and LRBC. Our current relationships with both are excellent and, I must say, much better than in years gone by. Having said that, we need to keep our future options open re suitable accommodation.

So, in summary, remember .... it's a great game, a wonderful club and I'll continue to see you all at the bridge table. Enjoy and good health.



Hand that caught my eye

Recently a hand came up during a major event. It was presented on BBO with many commentators discussing the play. Here is the layout

The bidding was aggressive, which is typical of good players today. Also, the game was

IMPs, which rewards you when you bid and make games. The 2♥ bid was weak. North's 2NT asked for description and 3♣ was an artificial bid saying South was minimum. North gave up, signing off in 3♥.

The final contract was ugly, as is frequently the case when you try for a game and find it is not worth bidding. South appears to have three diamond losers and two or three heart losers.


Look closely at the heart suit. A little miracle has happened. East has the J10 doubleton. This means declarer can hold his heart losers to one by leading the queen (or leading to the queen). West can have his king now or later. Let's say West takes the king. Declarer's ace will drop East's remaining heart and all the hearts are good. Magic.

Here is how the play goes.

West leads the ◆K and the defence takes the first three diamond tricks, ending in the East hand.

Can East defeat 3♥ at this point?

First, here is what East actually did. He led a club. He hoped that West had the •K and four hearts to the nine. If this is true, there might be a spade trick and a heart trick for the defence. This play does not work. Take a look at all four hands. Can the magic layout in hearts be overcome? Here is the answer. This is the layout of the trump suit. Note that East has the last diamond.



It is agreed that:

- leading a club back won't work.
- leading a spade back won't work.
- leading a heart back won't work.

What is left is East's ◆5, giving declarer a sluff and a ruff. This is normally a very bad idea. Is it bad on this hand?

Let's see.

If South does not ruff the diamond in his hand, he has to ruff in dummy with the queen. Now South has two certain trump losers.

If South chooses to ruff the diamond in his hand with a little trump, West ruffs with the seven, forcing dummy to ruff with the queen. Again, two trump losers.

If South chooses to ruff with the eight or nine, West throws a club, keeping his trumps. The defenders get two trump tricks because West's seven is now big enough that it will get a trick on its own merit. Pretty amazing layout.

Why is this a meaningful hand? One might think that this defence is double dummy. And in fact it is. What is important is that when a hand is over and you feel you might have made a contract or perhaps defeated a contract, you look at it later to see if there was any possible play that would have worked. When you find a play that is successful but seems exotic, keep it in mind.

Someday, this play will come up again and you will recognize it and will consider it. It may be that the time for this play has come and you are ready for it.

Studying your failures is one of the great learning tools.

#### **MIKE'S ADVICE**

Here is an important tip you can bank on.

When a good pair makes a game try and they stop in a part-score, your chances of setting them are very good. Greed motivates players to hunt for games, but when they stop in a part-score, it means they do not think they can make game. They think that making a part-score is the best they can do. If they have any kind of bad luck you should set them. Be aware of this and do not lean back, thanking your lucky

With 14 HCPs and a weak heart suit you open 1♥. North gives you a double raise to 3♥, showing 10-12 points and 3+ card trump support. Your heart suit has perked up with partner's support and you bid game. West leads the ♣Q. How do you plan to play the hand?

#### **Analysis**

Looking at losers, you have two in hearts and one each in diamonds and clubs. How can you get rid of one of them? There is nothing to trump in dummy, so you need to look at getting an extra trick from a side suit. The diamond suit looks promising. Once the ace is knocked out you will have two tricks and could discard your club loser.

#### How do you go about the play?

Ed: Same bidding using Bergen bids: 3♦ = 4+ hearts and 10-11 HCPs (limit bid).



#### Pat O'Connor's Bridge Solution

Full Hand:



You win the club lead with the ace. You should not play trumps immediately. If you do, the opponents will take their ♥A and then lead another club, which takes out your king and exposes the club loser. Then when you knock out the ◆A, they will cash their club winner.

The key is to play diamonds first so that you establish a diamond winner on which to discard your club loser. Play a small one from your hand to the king in dummy. If this is ducked by the opponents, continue with the queen. Whenever they take the ace, your jack is promoted to a winner. You then go to dummy, either by leading your remaining diamond if the ace was taken on the first round, or by leading a spade to the queen. Then discard the ♣5 on the high diamond in dummy. Now it is time to draw trumps.

The only tricks you lose are one diamond and two trumps, making your contract.

#### **Key Point**

Delay drawing trumps if necessary, in order to establish a winner in a side suit on which to discard a loser.





North Passes. South overcalls East's opening bid with 1<sub>a</sub>, and North will pre-empt with 3<sub>a</sub>. How should East and West bid?

- N: Pass, not usually good to open weak 2\* with an outside 4-card major.
- E: Not enough for a strong bid, opens the higher of a two-suiter 1♥.
- S: An aggressive 1♠ overcall, not vulnerable, just to get into the auction, disrupt EW and tell partner what to lead.
- W: Negative X, just enough points, but good 5/5 in the other suits, short spades and tolerance for hearts, well worth the bid.
- W: An alternate 2♣ bid is also good (both lead directing and immediately identifies the club fit for partner). This applies only if

- 2♣ is used as a non-forcing bid. Players whose system uses a forcing 2♣ must X.
- N: A pre-emptive 3♠. Best to go as high as you can early, then get out of the bidding. ED Note: I would bid 4♠.
- E: Cannot ask for help in spades for NT,
   5♣ is the pragmatic bid! We may have been pre-empted out of a 6♣ contract as partner is likely to be short in spades. But West may have useless diamond honours. It's a guess to bid a an aggressive 6♣.

#### Matchpoint Tips

N/S need to pre-empt in spades to at least 4♠ to score well. I would, with 6♠/4♠ fit, bid 4♠ over partners 1♠ overcall and make it very difficult for EW to find their fit.

E/W need to reach a 5♣ or 3NT game for a good score. Overtricks in clubs score well. Letting NS play a spade contract, even doubled, scores poorly.

#### **IMP Tips**

EW Game bonus for 5♣ is scoring +7 IMP, any overtrick does not matter. The 5/2 heart fit is not sufficient with the 5/1 bad break. Letting NS get away with a spade contract is a poor result for EW.

**NS** needs to play a spade contract up to 4S, even if doubled, they only lose -1 IMP..

Even a save in 5♠X (-5 IMPs) is better than 5♠ (-7 IMPs). But this **risk pushing them** into 6♠ (-13 IMPs). It's safer to give up if they bid 5♠.

#### **Best Lead by South**

The ♠5 (count 4th highest) would be the normal lead.

#### **East Initial Contract Planning:**

Loser Count: None off the top.

Winners:  $1x \triangleq 2x \checkmark 2x + 6 \text{ ruffs} = 11$ .

Can get extras in hearts for 1 or 2 tricks to make 12/13.


Looks like we have missed a 6♣ contract.

The aggressive bidding is likely to cause problems at all tables. You must make 12 tricks (1 overtrick) in Matchpoint scoring to do well.



South leads ♣6 to North's ♣A, North continues ♣K and then ♣Q. How do you make 10 tricks?

Solution: Hand repeated



Declarer (East) Planning

Count Losers: 2x - (cashed) + A = 3

Count Winners: 5x + 3x + 1 + 4 Ruff = 10

<u>Problem</u>: North keeps leading clubs, trying to promote a spade trick in the South hand. To stop the immediate problem:

#### Solution:

At trick 3, ♣Q is led by North - ruff high with ♠K.

Problem: If North has the ♠A (likely with his vulnerable overcall), then the next ♣J could promote an overruff by South if they have the ♠o!

<u>Solution</u>: Immediately play **3 rounds of top hearts**, discard the **♣**T from the West hand and then knock out the **♣**A.

You are now fully in control and can over-ruff South's ♠9 in the West hand! And you will make your contract (10 tricks) in 4♠.

If you do not see the risks of a club ruff by South's •9 then you will go down. Cashing the 3 hearts is a very small risk to ensure your contract.

With shortages in both hands, I would settle for a 6 contract as it's more likely to be successful than 6NT. You can make extra tricks by ruffing.




