INTERESTING HANDS ANYONE?





You are about to play the last hand of the session. The screen reveals that you're running first with 58.3. The pair running second are on 57.9. As it so happens you are playing them on the last round. The first 2 boards are flat so this the deciding hand. Partner sitting North opens 1S and East passes. You hold the following: A2 V KQ2 AKQJ10 KQ8. You can feel a grand slam coming on. You roll out Blackwood and partner responds 5S showing 2 key cards and the QS. 1 keycard is missing so you sadly sign off in 6S. As it happens 6S is down 1 as the full hand was:



And now for the post mortem. North observes that you should have bid 6NT. You quietly suggest that 4S would have been a better opening bid. The final scores appear. 3 pairs out of 8 have bid 6NT which makes so you and pard

WATCH OUT FOR THOSE 4-4-4-1 HANDS!



4–4–4–1 hands are always tricky to bid. Here is an example. You hold ♠ 2 ♥J942 ♠ K742 ♣ AKJ4. You open 1C and partner responds 1S. You decide to rebid 1NT and sure enough partner jumps to 4S. You pass and sheepishly put down your hand. Partner goes down 3 tricks. The way to avoid this problem is to open 1D and rebid 2C. Partner will work on the basis that you have 5 diamonds and 4C but this is a much safer bid. Partner now knows you may have spade shortage. This will also avoid having to shout him 3 rounds of tricks at the bar.

President's report

This newsletter is the first of a series of two monthly newsletters to club members. We hope to keep you all up to date with the club's affairs.

The question I am most often asked about is: what's happening about future accommodation? The answer I almost always have to give is: not much at this stage. As I suppose you all know Club Willoughby is talking about redeveloping its site, and they have been talking about it for over nine years. As I understand it at the moment, they obtained approval from their members at a recent extraordinary general meeting to enter into a contract with their preferred developer, but we haven't been told that the contract has been signed. There is one item of news: they have announced a proposed opening date for the new clubhouse on 11 November 2018 (the anniversary of the end of World War I). It's not definite, but it's the first time they've said anything as close to definite as this.

In the meantime, we continue to enjoy good relations with Lindfield Bowling Club, and if the plans for us to move into the new Club Willoughby should go awry, it seems likely that we'll always be welcomed at Lindfield.

One complaint we had about Lindfield related to the cooking smells, emanating from the kitchen. We've installed a range hood over the stove, and hope that this will fix that problem.

We plan to introduce a new session at Lindfield, for supervised play, supplementary to the supervised play sessions at Willoughby. Starting shortly!

The Pre-Paid table fees scheme has been completely revamped, by Mike Prescott and Matthew McManus. You fill out a form, available from the director at any session, and leave it with the director. You pay the club a sum that you choose (we suggest \$100), using your credit card. Then, each time you play, you write on the envelope PP, for Pre-Paid, and the club debits your account for \$11.40 – that is, you get a discount of 5% off the standard table fee of \$12. You need not do anything else until a director (reminded by the computer) notes that the balance in your account is running low, and hands you a slip of paper saying just that. All you need to do then is pay some more money (your choice how much) into your account, by your credit card. The club knows nothing of your banking details.

We have destroyed all credit card records we collected under the old scheme. It works just like an Opal card.

There is a new Sunday game available at Willoughby, at 1.30 pm. Why not come along and try it.
