More sessions changes forced by BBO overloading

From Wednesday 1st July, event sizes will be restricted to **20 tables** (40 Pairs). A major restructure of NSBC BBO events is shown in the above table.

Changes to the NSBC BBO tournaments taking place from July 1st.

Due to BBO changing our restrictions we are making many changes commencing July 1st. We have been limited in all sessions to 40 pairs so 20 tables. It will be 1st in 1st served.

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NSBC Open Sessions

Open sessions from July 1st, we will have two Open sessions everyday Monday to Saturday.

- Morning sessions at 10.00am Registration opening at 8.00am with a limit 40 pairs 20 tables.
- Afternoon session will be at 1.30pm Registration opening at 1.00pm with a limit 40 pairs 20 tables.
- Sunday We will continue Red Point Sunday at 1.00pm but once again limit 40 Paris 20 tables 1st in 1st served.
- Wednesday Evening No change except limit to 40 pairs 20 tables 1st in 1st served registration from 5.00pm for 7.00pm start.
- Thursday Evening Special Events. These will also be limited to 40 pairs 20 tables so get your entry in at 5.00pm for the 7.00pm start.

I ask any players playing in the morning Open sessions to give others a chance to play in the afternoon session. Please look at 1.20pm if we are not full then please join in. But please, if your registered to play, make sure you are logged in early for the session start, as it not fair on pairs that have missed out on registration.

NSBC Restricted Sessions

Please note the restricted sessions will be held on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at 10.00am, with registration starting from 8.00am. You should have no trouble getting into these sessions with the limit 40 pairs 20 tables.

Please note all Restricted players need to email your BBO username to Sue Crompton <u>suecrompton40@gmail.com</u> or call her 0416 290 867. Sue with user-name "Suzy1430" will be your host for Restricted tournaments from 1st July. Please get your usernames to Sue over the next week so on July 1st we are all ready to go.

NSBC Rookie Sessions

All Rookie sessions will remain the same except registration will not open to 1.00pm for your 2.00pm game but we are limited to 40 pairs 20 tables so get in early once we are full that is it. Please note Saturday Rookie has been cancelled. Tuesday evening Rookie session will be the same as before.

NSBC Supervised Sessions

- Supervised session will continue but will now start at 10.30am instead of 11.00am so players can attend Kim's talk at 12.45pm.
- A New Supervised session is planned for Monday evenings, Registration starting at 5:00pm for a 7:00pm start.

There is nothing I can do on any of these matters and we are working extremely hard to continue to bring you **NSBC online**.

We now have 25 sessions online on BBO and this is a lot of work.

NSBC President's Message

Greetings members of the North Shore Bridge Club. This letter is an update of significant developments since my earlier article of several weeks ago.

We have continued to operate as a 'virtual' bridge club, and other clubs have modelled themselves on what we have achieved. As I wrote previously, the achievements can be attributed to the dedication of Mike Prescott. our Manager. Besides the daily BBO game, there are also on-line teaching and supervised sessions. Whereas the BBO sessions are 'free', we can charge for the lessons and supervision. I would like to thank Nick Fahrer for his contribution to setting up the BBO sessions; these are now run by Mike and our team of directors. Improvements have been made during this time by club members, so the results are now available via our normal Pianola system, with members actual names rather than BBO Usernames.

A major success is the state of our finances. As you know, we set out in March with the intention of supporting our staff financially. So far this has been achieved with the club breaking even or showing a small profit. For this to occur, we have received income largely from 3 sources.

- 1. Donations from members have been very generous, and we encourage members to keep this up.
- 2. We received a substantial contribution from Job keeper.
- 3. We earn income from teaching and supervision.

The smooth running of the 'virtual' bridge operation has now given us more time to deal with other major issues. We are not yet able to return to operating as a normal bridge club.

Club Willoughby has reopened 3 days per week and will continue to operate within the guidelines of government regulations. To date that would mean that even if we could return to the bridge rooms, we would have to spread out, which would not be a practical solution. Those who are members of Club Willoughby will continue to receive their updates via email – these emails should not be confused with Bridge Club emails. We will continue to coordinate with Club Willoughby, as we have been doing with Lindfield Rollers.

Next there is the holding of the AGM. Without this pandemic, we were legally bound to hold the AGM before the end of June. We first dealt with the Office of Fair Trading, which advised that under the circumstances we could delay the meeting beyond that date, maybe even to combine it with next year's AGM. At that stage it was deemed that we could not hold an 'electronic' meeting, since our Constitution had no such provision. But recent legislation, both federal and state, suggests that this need no longer apply. We can now hold the AGM part physically and part electronically. Such a meeting needs to be carefully planned, to ensure that no member is disenfranchised. We will keep members informed on the progress of such plans. My thanks go to David Hagley for undertaking much of the investigative work, and to our honorary solicitor, Michael Giugni, for providing legal opinion at no cost to the club.

Lastly there is the question of future premises. This has taken a back seat in recent times, although prior to the Club closure we had looked at several potential locations to add to our present venues. We had planned to have a presentation/discussion prior to the AGM, but this has obviously been impossible. The many variables to be considered have been suitability, ambience, price (we have basically discounted the possibility of purchase, so we are talking about a long term lease, similar to our current lease at CW and our licence at EL), proximity to public transport, proximity to car parking.

To be borne in mind is that the concept of unlimited (free) parking is a thing of the past, wherever we go, and our final decision will be determined by how well all the variables are best satisfied.

Since my previous article we have stepped up our search. My thanks go to Leo Goorevich who, besides looking after the club website, has spent some considerable time investigating possible locations and undertaking negotiating with the various owners/agents. At this stage we appear to have one very suitable location, which satisfies all the criteria. There are still the various processes (e.g. Council approval) to deal with, but this is now top priority. There are also one of two alternative options available. Again, we will keep members informed of progress.

Finally, my thanks go to Les Grewcock and Kit Meyers for their dedication in dealing with the club finances during this difficult time. Regards John Mottram NSBC President

In addition, we are running Pre-Game talks on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday at 12:45 for our newer players. If you would like to join in just let me know and I will get you involved and connected to Kay. It is just that easy.

We are now running a Red Point game every Sunday with 9 x 3 board rounds, just like sessions at the club. Registration is from 11.00am, with the game starting at 1pm sharp. The new BBO 20 Table limit applies.

On BBO, waiting due to extending boards from time to time you may have to wait in last couple of rounds. We have set this up, so all pairs get to play all boards. On BBO if you played clocked even if you are playing the last board of the round and the clock hits zero the board would be averaged, So I am trying to avoid clocked sessions, please try to stick to time and then tables will move at the end of each round and cut down on waiting time. Please be patient, I understand waiting is frustrating, but this is the best way for our tournament sessions to run.

NSBC BBO Swiss Pairs (June)







North opens $1 \ge and you$ respond $1 \ge .$ North rebids 1NT, showing a balanced hand with 12 - 14 HCP. With your solid six-card spade suit, you have no hesitation in jumping to game.

West leads the **♣5**. You win with the **♣A** in dummy.

What is your plan?

<u>Analysis</u>

You have a loser in hearts and probably three losers in diamonds, so you need to eliminate one. You note that a loser can be discarded on the \clubsuit K.

How will you proceed?

Entries to dummy are scarce so you need to choose the right time to take the discard on the $\clubsuit K$. The temptation is to do it immediately, since the lead is in dummy when you win the $\clubsuit A$.

However, if you do that, West will ruff, and you will still have three more losers.

You cannot draw all the opponents' trumps before you take the discard on the $\clubsuit K$ because you need at least three rounds of spades to do that. If you play more than two spades, you will not have an entry to dummy to cash the $\clubsuit K$, but for maximum safety you should take two rounds to eliminate as many enemy trumps as possible.

So, lead a small spade to the $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{K}$ in your hand then a small one from your hand to the $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{A}$ in dummy. Both opponents follow, so there is only one trump at large. Now discard either a heart or a diamond on the $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{K}$. Fortunately, West has no more trumps and cannot ruff in. Now return to your hand by ruffing a club and draw the last trump.

It was unlucky that the clubs were split 7–1, but safe play saved the day.

Key Point

Draw trumps at the optimal time

Start small, and keep counting

Introduction to the count

If you really want to improve your declarer play, aim to "count" hands.

It is a fact of life that you cannot move to the next skill level until you do this. The bad news is...it is NOT easy. It requires a lot of concentration. But the good news is that practice makes perfect and these tips will help.

What do we mean by "counting"?

It is knowing the distribution of the opponent's hand/s by mentally remembering the cards they play to each trick, and therefore working out the defenders' shapes.

If you start trying to count a hand and then you forget or lose the count, leave it, and start again on the next hand. Do not be frustrated and give up, because the more you try the easier it will become. As declarer, the most important things to consider are:

- Always count the trump suit. As soon as dummy goes down, make a special note of how many trumps your side has. Say you have six and dummy has three. That is nine. Keep that information stored away, but then focus mainly on how many trumps are missing and how they will be distributed. If you have nine, four are in the opponents' hands, and you usually hope they will split 2-2, but more likely 3-1, and hopefully not 4-0. As you play trumps, watch to see how the four trumps fall in the opponents' hands.
- Some suits are more important than others. It is hard work to count every suit. With experience you will recognise when dummy comes down which suits you need to count, the trump suit always, as already mentioned, and often your other long suit.

- Remembering the bidding will give you clues in counting.
 Let us say West opened a pre-emptive 3H.
 They are likely to hold seven of them.
 Subtract from thirteen the number of hearts you see in your hand and dummy. Then you know how many hearts East has. And Hold
- 4) The best way to get a count is when an opponent shows out in a suit.
 Make a mental note of how many their partner has or had. And Hold that Thought!

That Thought!


5) Counting will help you make the right play at the right time.

Try to play the "easy" suits first, to get a count on the "difficult" suits.

If you have kept a count as the hand has progressed, it will often help you know how to play an important suit at the end.

The real trouble with counting is that sometimes we FORGET as we go along, and the more tricks that are played the harder it is to remember the distributions. Our minds tend to focus on how to play suit combinations etc., and we are sometimes surprised at the cards the defenders play, and we lose the thread of the count. But practice makes perfect, so please keep trying on every hand. Success will be guaranteed, and you will feel great satisfaction!



Responding to a takeout double

First a bit of theory on responding to a takeout X with both 4 card majors: Covered Rule 1 & Rule 2 in the June bulletin.

Rule one: If your partner doubles a minor and you have two four-card majors, bid 1 if you have a good enough hand to volunteer another bid. 5-7hcp

Rule two: If your partner doubles a minor and you have two four-card majors, bid 1♥ if your hand is so bad that you do not want any more bidding.

Rule three: Do not bid 1NT unless you have some extra values. Else, bid your best 3 cards major.

Rule four: A cue bid says you have one of two kinds of hands.

(1) You have both majors and invitational or better values.

(2) You have one major and enough points for game.



East opens 1. in third seat and you overcall 5. There must be a better way to bid this hand, but you cannot figure out what it is. Everybody passes and West leads the &K. You do not receive much of a dummy, but hang in there, think positively and plan the play to win.

How does playing a **9% contract** grab you? That is what your chances are. You must lose two spades tricks, so you cannot afford to lose a heart trick. It is time to use your imagination and place the opponents' cards exactly as you need them and then play for that layout. It is called a positive assumption. It is also called "thinking big" and "needing a miracle." How would you place the opponents' cards to make 5\?

A good start would be to assume that East has **Kxx** (18%), the only lie of the suit that does not produce a loser. As you must make 4 hearts! Even so, you would need to take two heart finesses, so you need to get to dummy twice for entries. Well, wish upon another star. Wish that West has the **◆8** so you can lead a diamond to the **◆7** to gain a second dummy entry. And do not forget to ruff the opening lead with the **◆9** (or a high honour). You want to make sure you keep two little diamonds to get to dummy's entries. Assuming West has the **◆8**.

Because finesses work only 50% of the time, you are now playing a 9% contract. As sad as this is, it is still better than playing a zero percent contract. When you are in a desperation contract, envision a winning layout and go for it! Play to make! Miracles do happen.




Q1 – Solution:

Why did partner switch to a club under leading his ace (he has six of them, so South has just a singleton)? There is only one explanation: he led the stiff \mathbf{Q} ! Otherwise, he would have no reason not to continue with the diamond jack or the club ace followed by a club.

Thus, you must

- First cash your +A (you cannot get in again)
- Then give West his ruff

And congratulate South who played very well when he did not cover with the diamond king on the first trick!



Q2 – Solution


Your partner is known to have:

• seven diamonds, likely three hearts. (they seem in a 4/4 heart fit)

• So why did he not lead his black singleton? Because said singleton is a void! Maybe in spades? No, then South would have five of them. It must therefore be in clubs:

- overtake the **•K** with the **•A**
- and play back the ♣8 (or even better the ♣Q), a suit preference for spades.

After his ruff, West will play back a spade to your ace and you will give him a second ruff in clubs.

Partner's response (5♥) to your Roman Key Card Blackwood bid of 4NT showed two key cards (aces and the trump king) without the ♠Q. When dummy hits, you can see you are in a good contract. West starts with the ♠J.

You plan initially to win in hand, cross to dummy with a heart and run the \mathbf{AT} , which holds.

- T2 **V**2 to the **V**A

T3 **▲T** running (your **▲3**) winning with both opponents following. How do you proceed from there?

Solution

After the **▲T** held, declarer continued with the **▲2** from dummy, East following suit with the **▲6**. But declarer was not tempted to finesse for a second time, for that would rely on the king of trumps being on his right, still only a **50%** chance.

Instead, he rose with the A because he saw that he could guarantee the contract if the trumps were 3-2 (**a better 68% chance**) and that he would have quite promising residual chances if East did have four trumps to the king.

- T4 ▲A After West followed for a second time in trumps, declarer cashed the ▲A
- T5 Cashed the **K**
- T6 Cashed **♦Q**, discarding the **♣2** from dummy.
- T7 Crossed to dummy with a **&3** to the **&A**
- T8 Cashed **♥K**, discarding the **♣5** from hand
- T9 Crossed to hand via **♣J** to **♣K**
- T10 Ruffed his remaining **♣7** with dummy's last spade **(♠9**).
- T11+ South still had **▲QJ8** and would only lose 1 trick to the **▲**K

Note

The initial duck of the **T** (done smoothly) is an exceptionally good play by West. If declarer took that second trump finesse, he would have resulted in a defeated contract. That is because West would have won the trick with the **K** and returned his last **7** trump clearing dummy of trumps.

Declarer would then have been reduced to relying on the failing ♣Q finesse for his contract.

After you (South) open $1 \ge$ and jump to $3 \ge$ after partner's $1 \ge$ response, partner leaps to $6 \ge$. West leads the $\diamond Q$. Clubs are 2-1. How do you plan to the play the $6 \ge$ contract?

Analysis:

Top Winners: 2x + 1 + 1 + 6x = 11Losers: 1 + 8 maybe a \forall or \Rightarrow loser

You have two suits with finesse possibilities to play around with, spades and hearts, but be reminded, if the opponents get in, they will cash an extra diamond and you will go down.

If the **heart finesse works**, you can discard a spade on the ♥A, probably set up the spades for two diamond discards and chalk up an overtrick. If spades cannot be established for two discards, you will concede a diamond and ruff your remaining diamond. Easy enough if the heart finesse works, what if does not. They cash a diamond and down you go and maybe the spade finesse was right all along!

If the **spade finesse works**, and the suit breaks 3-2, you have 13 tricks; and if the suit breaks 4-1, you can concede a diamond, ruff a diamond and make your slam without worrying about who has the ♥K. But if the spade finesse loses, they take a diamond and down you go.

So which finesse should you take? Neither just yet, it was a trick question.


Solution

You can increase your chances dramatically by playing the **▲AK** to see if the queen drops singleton or doubleton (about 33% chance). If it does drop your home

If it does not, take the heart finesse. This must be better than guessing which finesse to take. Besides, testing spades keeps you alive for the heart finesse. Your chance of making this hand by first playing the **▲AK** and then taking the heart finesse, if necessary, is a bit more than 65%, better than a taking a spade finesse after cashing the king first (50%).

For the technically minded You win = \mathbf{AQ} Drops% + (No Drop% x \mathbf{VK}) Winning % = 33% + (0.74% x 50%) = **65%**

Tip: When you can't afford to give up the lead and you have two finesse suits, one missing a queen, the other a king, and if you pick the right one you will make your contract, don't just try either one! Play the ace-king of the suit missing the queen, and if the queen does not drop, try a finesse in the suit missing the king. Incidentally, if the contract were 7, you should play the same way.

Both vulnerable, South dealt and picked up:

▲A9542, **♥Q103, ◆2**, **▲**AKQ6

South's 1 opening was raised to 2. Vulnerable at IMPs, you need to be extremely aggressive with game bidding. A game try feels about right. South bid 3♥ "help suit" and North raised to 4♥, (just in case there was a 4–4 fit there). South correctly went back to the known eight-card fit by bidding 4. West lead the ♣J:

Analysis:

How do you assess your chances? Winners: $1 \triangleq +1 \forall +1 \triangleq +3x \triangleq + (\blacklozenge \& 1 \triangleq Ruffs)$

Direct Losers: $A \neq 2x \neq losers$

- You need spades to be 3–2
- You must also find the **V**J.
- You need to ruff a little club with the short trumps

Play started at one table:

- Declarer won the **A**,
- Cashed **&K**
- And tried an immediate club ruff in dummy.

Do you like this start?

This was careless management of the black suits. If, for example, one opponent started with 2–2 in the black suits, the player with two trumps could ruff high (or overruff dummy) on the third club. Now, the other opponent would still have two natural trump tricks. Even worse, the player who ruffed high might be able to cross in hearts for another club play. How can declarer avoid this?

At trick two, he should play a low trump from both hands. He can win any return and then bang down the A, happy if they are indeed 3-2. Then he can safely ruff a low club in dummy. If an opponent overruffs, it is with the outstanding high trump. Then declarer turns his attention to the **V**. Who should he play for it? How?

For one thing, it might depend if the **A** is still in dummy. For another, it depends on how the black suits behave. I would play for the person who has the fewest black cards to have the **VJ**. He is likely to have more hearts, and therefore more likely to hold a certain card in the suit. A look at the full deal reveals more:


The first declarer went down two tricks. He prematurely tried to ruff a club in dummy. East overruffed, crossed to his partner's **VA** and scored his **K** ruffing another club. West still had two natural trump tricks. Declarer lost the **A** and **four(!)** trump tricks.

Our Game of Bridge

Play at another table with proper declarer technique:

- T1 Declarer wins the club lead with A
- T2 Declarer ducks a spade from both hands (♠2 ♠6), East winning ♠J
- T3 East likely exits a club, Declarer winning the **♣K**
- T4 Declarer now lays down the **▲A** with gratifying results with spades breaking 2-3 as declarer requires
- T5 Now, he ruffs his small club in dummy, discovering that West started with five clubs. East could or did not over ruff.
- T7 Because East is known to have more "missing" red cards than West, declarer will likely play East for the ♥J by finessing the ♥T and make his contract for a wellearned plus 620.

BBO Alert By Mark Guthrie Mark, a club member, is the ABF Technology consultant.

I know most of you are going to hate this article, it is really aimed at the small number of you who will love it. In order to separate the wheat from the chaff, I will use a magic word...

TECHNOLOGY

Right, that got rid of them pretty quickly, let us begin.

Point 1 – BBO Alerts by Magic

Imagine in these strange times that by reading this article three wonderful things could happen. Firstly, when playing on BBO, as if by magic (that magic of course being technology), BBO did all your alerting for you! Now I know that alerting on BBO is akin to indicating on a freeway, it's a lot of effort and gives your enemies information that they could use against you, but we all like to pretend we are trying to be good people and if the system does it for you then it isn't really any effort at all.

Point 2 – Real System Notes

The second thing that could happen is that you could finally develop those system notes you have always wanted to have with your partner. Not, of course, because you need them, but to assist your poor partner who seems to believe on Mondays that you play Simple Stayman and Thursdays Extended Stayman. Or perhaps they are different people? We will have a solution for that too later.

Point 3 – Become a Geek

Thirdly, we all need mental challenges to keep us lively and alert. I'm not giving you points 1 and 2 for free, you will have to work for them, but not only will you have stretched your grey matter to the point of breaking (yuk!), but you can be the smart one in your partnerships who shows the other one how to do it too. Like that annoying person who can solve a crossword puzzle by inventing words you have never heard of for the collective noun for octopus' suckers.

So, how is this all going to happen?

BBO Alert.

BBO Alert is a very clever piece of software developed by Stanislaw Mazur that does exactly what I described above. It automatically alerts your bids in BBO.


Installation

Righty-ho let us get started. There are two ways to install this, you can follow these instructions, or you can send them to someone under 30. I do not care which you do as long as you do not try option 3. I am not doing it for you, so do not ask.

I will show you how to set it up in the Chrome web browser, it also works in Firefox. Sorry, it does not work in any others, but you can use as many browsers as you like so to go ahead and install Chrome or Firefox if you have not got them already.

In Chrome type this in the address bar and hit Enter:

Now, if you think the next step is going to be typing "BBOAlert" into the little box that says, "Search the store", you would be correct.

Then click on **Add to Chrome** and you are done with the installation. That was not too hard!

Now in order to use it we need to go to BBO. Just login as normal.



On the right-hand side there is now a new tab "BBOAlert". This has a button at the top that says "Import", but before you press it you need to do some more work. Open a text editor (or create a new email, anywhere you can type into is fine). Enter this:

BBOalert ,1C,3+!cs ,1D,3+!ds ,1H,5+!hs ,1S,5+!ss 1C--,1N,6-9 no 4 card Major

Now to see what it does, select all the prepared text and copy it to the clipboard. Now go to BBO and hit that Import button again (I say again because I reckon most of you hit it the first time, I mentioned it and got an error). If it works, you will now see this:


It is recommended to begin with that you go to *Account->Settings* and set Confirm bids on, at least to begin with.

Now let us start a game on BBO and see what happens. Either play with some robots or start a teaching table, up to you.

By magic it has pre-filled the alert box with the text we wrote in our text file. (On BBO !s will print the spade symbol \clubsuit .)

Now try 1 pass 1NT:



Well that is the easy bit over I am afraid. The hard part is now learning the format for the file and working with your partners to build up a file with your system in it, but that is what we promised at the start of this article. You will also need multiple files if you play with different partners, but a lot of it will be the same.

Next Steps

Sharing your file with partner – share it over email or drop box or one drive or whatever you like, you will want to have the same file though. Learning the format – It is quite easy. You'll want to look at Stan's documentation for this which is at:

https://github.com/stanmaz/BBOalert or join his Facebook group by searching for BBOAlert on Facebook. There are also lots of example files on there too. It has also got an option to learn the system as you play but I have run out of room.



Clubs returning to face to face bridge

The ABF as the national administrative body of bridge in Australia does not have any authority regarding the running of bridge clubs, we can only issue advice and make recommendations. It is up to each club to determine when they reopen, based on the Federal and local restrictions on activities, the sharing of equipment and social distancing rules.

Many States and Territories are asking clubs to complete and display a Covid Safety Plan as it explains the steps a club will implement to protect the health and safety of its members
