Our new venue at North Ryde RSL is up and running and with the ongoing easing of restrictions for f2f bridge there is lots happening on the tournament scene in the next few months. Remember North Ryde RSL has unlimited free parking and is easy to get to (for example, from my home in Lindfield it takes me basically the same time to get to North Ryde RSL as it did to Club Willoughby).

NSBC is hosting the Margaret Smale Metro North Interclub Teams Challenge on Sunday 23 May at North Ryde RSL. There are 4 categories for teams to enter (less than 100 masterpoints; 100-300 mps; 300-750 mps; and greater than 750mps). 

Profile: Richard Kuipers

Our move from Club Willoughby to North Ryde RSL was a complex piece of logistics, but it received tremendously generous assistance from one of our long-time sponsors – club member, Richard Kuipers. Richard is the founder of Two Men and a Truck, one of the biggest home removals companies in Australia, which has 80 trucks and does 500 removals per week. When he was in his twenties, Richard, a Dutchman, came to Sydney for a holiday ... and never left. Almost five decades later, Richard, has turned himself into an Aussie success story. After growing up in Holland, he studied Hotel and business Management in Lausanne, Switzerland which included a year of training in Johannesburg, South Africa. It instilled in him the travel bug. He continued with a Hotel Management and Business Degree at the Hilton Hotel, Park Lane, London. Australia was next on the list – seeming such a remote, strange, and dangerous place. It was.

Soon he found himself married with a house and children. Needing to make money to survive, he responded to an ad in the local newspaper for a delivery run, picking up mail from the post office every morning and taking mail back in the afternoon. That company merged and gave Richard more and more work. Eventually he needed a larger van. That job spanned over a decade.

One day Richard's wife purchased a bookcase from a local pine shop, and he picked it up in the van. He then did a few extra deliveries for the

shop owner to help him out. He kept ringing with more deliveries, so Richard bought a second-hand truck. When it was a bigger job he would say "Richard I need the truck and two men". Pete, the next-door neighbour's teenage son would help.

That was the start of Two Men and a Truck.

The business evolved from the family lounge room to a caravan in the backyard. Eventually when the council complained about the trucks in the laneway, they upgraded to a little shop in Cammeray. Four years later they moved to their current premises in St Leonards.

The company is now managed by his daughters while Richard has taken on the role of "Brand Ambassador for Two Men and A Truck". He is an active campaigner and philanthropist, supporting numerous charitable causes. Richard recently completed writing his autobiography, 'Outside the Box', which was released towards the end of last year.

Rule of 11

We are East. Our hand is.

♦72 **YK94 QJ2 \$98752**.

North opens 1NT, we pass and South bids 3♠ showing at least six spades and 10+ points. Partner passes and North raises to 4♠. All pass, partner leads the ♣A and dummy comes down.

Lead: **♣A**

Partner cashes the ♣A and ♣K, declarer playing the ♣3 and then the ♣Q. It looks like declarer is out of clubs.

Partner switches to the ♥6 and the ♥7 is played from dummy. Things look comfortable for the defence. We already have two tricks, and we have the ♥K and the ♦QJ sitting over dummy. The immediate issue is what to play to this trick.

Assuming partner has led the fourth best heart, how many hearts are in the remaining three hands?

The Rule of 11 tells us to subtract the number of partner's spot card, 6, from 11. This reveals that there are five cards higher than the six in the other hands. All three of dummy's hearts are higher than the •6 and so are our •K and •9.

How many hearts higher than the ♥6 does declarer have?

Dummy has three and we have two so declarer has none!

Which card do we play to this trick?

We play the ♥9. As expected, it wins. Since partner has the ♥Q, we can safely exit with the ♥K, and wait for the setting trick in one of the red suits (here it will be in diamonds).

It would be a mistake to win the third trick with the ***K**. Declarer would win the return, draw trumps, and finesse the ***J**. This would then allow declarer to discard the diamond loser on the ***A**.

Post-mortem

This shows the usefulness of the Rule of 11. It is a good idea to get into the habit of using it on any opening lead of a small spot card. It does not work when partner has not lead from a four card or longer suit, but it is good practice to do the calculation.

A general principle of third hand play is to retain honours over dummy's honours in third seat.




When it is safe to lead a trump (in defence)

Say you, on opening lead, have nothing very appealing such as a singleton or top of a sequence. In fact, all your suits contain broken honour(s) such as Qxxx or KJxx. Yuk – these are extremely dangerous leads. It may be best, especially if dummy has shown weakness, to lead a trump, giving little away. However, you must be careful you do not butcher your or partner's trump holding by leading the suit. Say you are onlead vis 4♥ contract. Which of the following trump leads are safe and which not?

- a) ♥ 752
- b) **♥ A52**
- c) ♥ Q52
- d) **♥ J52**
- e) **₹ 2**
- a) **▼752** is pretty safe; you may pick up partner's **▼Q4** but probably declarer would have picked up **▼Q** for himself.
- b) ▼A52 is also fairly safe, although a holding of ▼Jx in partner's hand would likely to be squashed.
- c) **▼Q52** is most certainly not safe, for you would lose your protection for your **▼Q**. Do not lead a trump, instead wait for declarer to cash **▼AK**, promoting your **▼Q**.
- d) **▼J52** will be safe if partner has no high card. However, it is not completely safe. Look at this layout:

Dummy.



Left to his own devices, declarer will lose a trump trick. If you lead a trump, you will lose that trick.♥2,♥4,♥Q,♥A; then ♥3,♥5,♥9,♥6; then ♥K felling ♥J.

e) ▼2 is not at all safe. Indeed, this is much misunderstood, "Surely my ▼2 is worthless, so why not lead it?" I hear many say. But think of partner, who is likely to hold a useful holding such as ▼Qxx, ▼JTxx. Your trump lead will severely compromise partner's holding. Make the lead of a singleton trump an exceedingly rare occurrence in your repertoire: it is extremely dangerous. You could almost say, "never lead a singleton trump."



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The Art of Discarding

By Pat O'Connor

You are defending a slam contract. Declarer won the opening lead and started to draw trumps. You had only one trump, but partner followed to three rounds, so you had to find two discards. You were just comfortable with your remaining cards but then declarer led another trump! What? Trumps have all been drawn! What will I discard? Ah, the agony that discarding can become!

On almost every deal you need to discard because you cannot follow suit. Sometimes it is not a problem, but on others it can make or break the defence. Usually, you will try to give signals to partner about your hand, but sometimes you just have to survive.

Protecting your assets

When discarding it is important that you do not compromise your suit holdings.

You are West. Declarer is South in four spades. You lead the ♥A and ♥K. Partner encourages so you lead a third round to partner's ♥Q which declarer ruffs.

Declarer then leads trumps, partner following to three rounds. What discards do you make? You should discard your remaining hearts. Declarer has no more hearts, and it is important that you do not compromise your minor suit holdings. If you discard a diamond, partner may have a doubleton •J and you will not win

your natural diamond trick. If you discard a club, declarer might show up with ♣AK92 and you will take no club tricks.

Protecting partner's assets

Where possible do not discard down to a void in any suit. Here is an example.

You are West. If you discard both your small hearts early in the play before declarer plays on hearts, when declarer eventually leads a heart towards the *A in dummy, it is immediately clear that partner holds the queen, and she is in distress. So, keep at least one of the hearts when discarding.

Keeping parity with dummy

The golden rule of discarding is to keep parity with dummy. That means that if dummy has a four-card suit, you should keep four cards in that suit if possible. In this case dummy has four spades and four clubs.

South bid diamonds and North bid spades. The final contract was seven notrumps by South. You are East. Partner led a passive VJ.

For Our Newer Players

Declarer won with the ♥K in dummy and then played the ♦Q from dummy and a low diamond to the ♦A and ♦K in hand, partner following suit to all three rounds of diamonds. You must make a discard on the ♦K and probably more on subsequent diamonds. You have an awful hand, but you still need to plan your discards.

The key suit here is spades because you and dummy both have four cards, so you must keep the same number of spades as dummy. You should discard three hearts on the diamonds. Declarer then plays the ♥A on which you should throw a club, and then ♣AK, leaving the spades until last. Then comes the ♠Q from declarer's hand followed by the ♠AK from dummy but your precious ♠T wins the last trick!

Keeping parity with dummy is a vital defensive technique. Of course, it is equally valid to keep parity with declarer, but this is harder because you cannot see declarer's cards. However, sometimes you know about declarer's hand from the bidding.

In February 2021, Emma Barnes ran the 6-week. "Introduction to bridge" course at East Lindfield.



Usually, we have an intake of beginners twice a year, in February and in July, but because of Covid we cancelled the July 2020 "Introduction to Bridge" lessons. Perhaps that contributed to the excellent response this time, with 55 learners in our evening class and 33 in our morning class.

"Bridge Basics"
Course, also at East
Lindfield.



The majority of Emma's graduates decided to continue their Bridge journey and are now well into the 10-week "Bridge Basics" course with Liz Wilkinson – an equally charismatic teacher.

We are also offering these new players two opportunities a week to come and practice at their own pace, at no cost, during the course; one session is Face to Face at East Lindfield, and the other is on RealBridge.

These sessions help to prepare our learners to move into a supervised game at the start of June.

The Bidding

This deal came up in from a teams' match and the auction was the same at both tables.

West (vulnerable) opened 1♦, your Partner (north) X for takeout, and you squeak 1♥.
West rebids 2♦ & partner launches into a 4♥ game with his 22hcp and a shortage in diamonds.

West leads the ◆K and you get your first view of dummy and his 22 HCP.

- T1 West leads the **K** against your heart game. This holds as everyone follows **8**, **5**, **2**.
- T2 West then continues with the ◆Q. How will you get to 10 tricks?

Preliminary Analysis

Winners: 1x♠+4x♥+3x♠ = 8 + ♦ ruffs Losers: ♦K, 2 x deep ♠ & maybe ♥Q Strategies for extra tricks

- You will have to Ruff 2 diamonds for 1 extra trick in dummy.
- Probably will need to make some extra Spade tricks for contract if the ♠KQ are onside in the West hand.

Your Solution

You played a straightforward line:

- T2 You ruffed the Wests ◆Q continuation with dummy's ▼4 which won, East discards likely showing odd count (i.e., 3 diamond cards only).
- T3 You cashed the top trump **YA** and everyone followed.
- You then cashed the ▼K. When West discarded a diamond, you (declarer) knew you were in trouble, as East still had a winning trump. And now you had to rely on West having both the ♠K and ♠Q.
- T567you cash the three top clubs ♣AKQ with everyone following.
- Then led the ♠J from dummy. This was run and West played the ♠K.
- T9 West forced dummy by exiting with the
 ◆J. Declarer ruffed in dummy ▼8 as all followed.
- T10 You then exited via dummy's remaining trump **v9** into East's high **vQ**.
- T11 But East now led the 13th club (♣9), which you ruffed in hand ▼T.
- T12 You now lead a spade, trying to finesse West's ♠Q, to the ♠T, for your contract. But this lost to East's ♠Q.
- T13 You made the last trick ♠A but you were down one in the 4♥ contract.

When your teammates returned to score up
You Declared 4♥/S ◆K lead -50
They Defended 4♥/S ◆K lead -420
Team result -450 Loss of 10 imps.
They claimed that the contract could not be defeated. Then explained how the other

declarer made the contract.

The **second declarer** saw that he would need entries to hand if he wanted to take two finesses in spades, so he planned on creating 2 entries into the south hand right at the start. Even if it gave a trick away in hearts!

- T1 West led the **K** against the heart game. This holds as everyone follows.
- T2 Declarer then ruffed the second diamond continuation ◆Q with a high trump on the table ▼K.
- T3 Declarer then exited a low trump ♥4 from the table. After East ducked with the ♥2, he played ♥7 which held the trick, as West followed with the ♥5. It is no better for the defence for East to win early with the ♥Q.
- T4 Declarer, in his hand, led a low spade ♠2, to the ♠6, ♠T and East won ♠Q.
- T5 East exited with his last diamond ◆T, which was ruffed low ▼8 in dummy.
- T6 Declarer now cashed the A, finding the 1-3 heart break.
- T7-9 Followed by the three top clubs ♣AKQ.
- T10 East was put on lead with a trump ♥9 to his ♥Q.
- T11 East could do no better than exit with the 13th club which declarer ruffed in hand ✓J and threw the ♠4 from dummy.
- T12 As expected, a spade to the ♠J won this time, successfully finessing the ♠K.
- T13 Then the A was cashed and this declarer made the full 10 tricks.

The Bidding

Your partner opened the bidding 1♦, and over your (South) bid of 1♠. he then limited his hand with a 1NT rebid showing (12-14 Balanced shape).

Your system tools include 2-way checkback, so you bid 2♦ (Game forcing check back on Major holdings) and partner bids 2♠ (showing 3♠ but denying 4 hearts). With your excellent shape, you just bid the slam directly 6♠. West starts the defence with a lead of the ♠A.

Preliminary analysis:

Winners: $4-6 \stackrel{\bullet}{\bullet}$, $4 \stackrel{\blacktriangledown}{\bullet}$, $3 \stackrel{\bullet}{\bullet}$ = may make all 13 on 22 Spade break.

Losers: no top losers, may have deep spade

Solution

- T1 West leads ♣A, you follow with the ♣4 from dummy, East ♣2 (start of count), and you ruff this with a low trump ♠3.
- T2 You (declarer) play the ♠A, West ♠2, Dummy ♠7, and unfortunately East contributes the ♣2. A 4-0 trump break offside!

All would have been well if East had followed suit: Declarer would have had 12 easy tricks on a 3-1 break. East's club discard reduced declarer to needing a trump endplay to bring the contract home.

The first requirement was that declarer needed West to have exactly three clubs, because he needed to reduce his trump length to the same as West and needed to ruff 2 more times as West follows suit in


clubs. As will be seen, in the endgame declarer needed to have two trumps and a good heart and West three trumps.

The specifics in the red suits were a little different in that, once the assumption in clubs was fulfilled, declarer could have made 12 tricks at double dummy if West had held 2=4, 3=3 or 4=2 in the red suits. However, this was a single dummy problem.

- T3 So you continue by cashing the ♠A all following., ♦3, ♦T, ♦2.
- T4 You continue with a diamond ◆5, to dummy's ◆K, again EW both following with. ◆4. ◆8
- T5 You cash the ♠Q, as East discards a small club ♣3, hand & West following. West has 4 small diamonds!
- T6 You cash the Last diamond ▶J, East throwing a small heart, you drop the small heart from hand ♥6, as West follows with his final diamond.
- T7 You now start on the hand trump reduction, by leading the ♣6 from dummy, ruffing with a small trump ♠5, both EW following low.
- T8 You return to dummy by overtaking your

 ▼J with the ▼A. Again, EW follow.
- T9 You again ruff a club **♣T** back to hand with a low trump **♠6** and the **♣K** falls from West!
- T10 You cash the ▼K and west follows obligingly with a second heart, as you throw a club from table.

The position with the last 3 cards, not caring about East.



T11+ Then you led the ♥Q, West was skewered: if he had ruffed high, you would have made the last two tricks with trumps. If West had ruffed low, declarer would have scored a trump in dummy and the king of trumps in hand to make his contract.

Bidding

Partner opens the bidding with a prepared club 1♣ (2+), then over your 1♥, showed a 12-14 balanced hand. You force with a 3♥ bid which is raised to a heart game. You push on to 6♥, after you asked for aces via the Keycard or Blackwood convention (4NT) showing two. West leads the ♥5.

Our Game of Bridge

T1 West leads ♥5, ♥2, ♥9 and win in hand with the ♥T.

What is your plan for the play of the contract?

Preliminary Analysis

Top Winners: 3x + 6x + 2x = 11 tricks

Top Losers: ♣A Still out

Possible strategies for the 12th trick

- a) Picking where the ◆Q is sitting & finessing the right way. 50% chance
- b) Playing up to the ♣K and finding the ♣A onside. **50%** chance.
- c) Running the ♣J & finding ♣Q onside **50%** chance
- d) Stripping the hand and **end playing** the opponent with the A and try getting them to lead the diamond suit for you.

The Solution

The best idea is to try to avoid the diamond guess if possible, by trying the endplay method. So: -

- T2 You play A drawing two more hearts from each opponent.
- T3 You play ▼K West playing an encouraging club discard, pitching the ♣2 from dummy, and drawing the last outstanding heart from East.
- T4-6 Your next move is to cash the dummy's three top spades AKQ, discarding two small clubs from your hand. EW following to all the spade cashes.
- T7 You play S2 from Table, East SJ, Ruffing this back to hand with one of your high trumps H8. This is to strip exit cards from your opponents. They both followed to the spade, they were 44.

This leaves you in your hand (after the ♠ ruff) holding.



T8 Now exit with the ♣K to one of your opponents. If they duck (unlikely) you have 12 tricks & can try a ♠Q finesse for 13.

If West has the ♣A and no more spades, he will be forced to lead a minor-suit card, ending the play problem for you.

- If West gets out with a club, a club winner will be established for a diamond discard.
- If West gets out with a diamond, claim as you will find the Q safely.

If the spades had not broken 44, and West has a fifth spade exit, and leads it, ruff this in hand and try to get the diamonds right. The best idea is to try to figure out which opponent has more diamonds and play that person for the queen. If West started with five spades, East is more likely to have diamond length.

If East has the ♣A and does not have a spade to lead,

- East's best return is a low club, which
 you should ruff. If West started with a
 doubled *Q, you would not have to
 guess the diamonds, otherwise you will.
- If East gets out with a diamond, claim as you will find the \Q safely.
- If East has a 5th spade to lead, you ruff, and it is basically back to the diamond finesse. You have given yourself your best chance to avoid the guess of diamond finesse.

The bidding

Despite the lack of high cards, I have no qualms in opening 1♠ (good 11hcp with all points in my long suits), but any hopes of a straightforward auction are immediately dispelled when West overcalls 3♠. I daresay that is a weak bid in the modern style, but whatever it means my partner appears not to have noticed it.

He attempts to respond 1NT (forcing NT). When East declines to accept 1NT, and the director is called for an insufficient bid!

Partner removes the offending bidding card and replaces it with a jump to 4♠ (this change of suit bars me, as South, from the Auction), which East promptly doubles for penalty.

West gets the defence underway and leads the **K** and I get to see partners' hand:

Preliminary analysis

I am not sure I am going to enjoy this. No doubt East has all the missing trumps, and if the ♥K and ♣K are the wrong way round, things will be very awkward.

My Solution

- T1 West leads **♦K**, **♦3** as East overtakes the **♦A** as I play **♦4**.
- T2 East now continues with the ◆T. I ruff with ♠4, as West & dummy follow.
- T3 I play a spade ♠6 to the ♠Q, West discarding a diamond, and East takes the ♠A
- T4 East now switches to the ♥2. He would do that whatever his holding in the suit but hoping that he may have started with ♥KJxx, and I play low. West wins with the ♥J, dummy ♥5
- T5 West returns the ♥9, is covered by the ♥T, ♥K and my ♥A.

From the play in diamonds, I think the suit is divided 8–2. If West's shape is 0–3–8–2 and he has the ♣K, I am going to make this!

- T6 I cash the high heart ♥Q, but West dashes my hopes by discarding a diamond.
- T7 I ruff my last heart ♥4 in Dummy with ♠2, West dropping a diamond and East the high ♥7.
- T8 I then play the **♠9** off dummy. East covers with the **♠T** and I win with the **♠J**.
- T9 A club ♣6 to the ♣3, ♣Q queen holds as East plays ♣4.
- T10-11 So, I pick up East's 2 trumps leading ◆5 through ◆83 to my ★K7.
- T12 Cash my ♣A

T13 But lose one more trick (to West's ♣K), leaving me one down.
