

Many NSBC members will remember Ian Bailey as an avid bridge player. Pleasant and friendly at the tables, he was a partner and friend to many of us. Placid and unflappable by nature and always good social company, he was especially pleasant company at congresses which he frequently attended. I played with Ian over many years, and we had some

I played with Ian over many years, and we had some success at a number of tournaments, the best being winners (with Robin Devries and Richard Lock) of the Restricted Teams at a Gold Coast Congress about 10 years back.

Working in the same company in the 1970s, lan and I found we had a common interest in bridge and began playing at clubs around the Eastern Suburbs. We played together for some years until I left the scene to focus on family and career. Ian played on and became a member of the Lindfield Bridge Club which was the precursor to the NSBC. On my retirement some 15 years ago, he got in touch and we resumed playing together. He patiently coached me in the ways of modern bridge.

To me Ian was more than a bridge partner. As friends, we stayed in touch over the interim years and caught up on social occasions every year or so. Ian was an engineer by profession and worked on cutting-edge communications satellite technology in the 60s and 70s in Canada and later in Sydney. He was also an A-grade squash player and played good tennis right up until a year or so back.

He left the telecommunications industry in the early 80s to take up bookmaking of all things! He was successful in that craft and later owned various retail and other investments which were also successful. On retirement he continued his love/hate relationship with the turf and had an elaborate computer set-up at his home so he could continue punting in an armchair. This became perfect for bridge playing when the pandemic struck. On many occasions, when sharing an apartment at the Gold Coast with Derek Maltz, those two would sit over the form guide picking winners.

lan's passing was mercifully swift. My grief, and that of his many friends - in and out of bridge, will be longer.

May he rest in peace.

Double Trouble

Extract from Pat's Book – "Demystifying Defense".

Rookie Challenge hand 1 -Solution

We are West. Our hand is

★ KJ874 ♥ QJ ◆ A6 ♣ T987

South opens 2♠, a weak two bid showing six spades with less than opening strength. We pass, North passes and partner doubles for takeout. South passes and we have to decide what to do. Partner typically has an opening hand with spade shortage. We are delighted to defend a doubled spade contract. So we pass, as does North. Partner probably has good hearts, so we lead the ♥Q and dummy comes down.

This is going to be fun! You lead $\underline{\,}^{\,}\underline{\,}$ Q, and declarer plays low from dummy, partner encourages with the $\underline{\,}^{\,}$ 7 and declarer contributes the $\underline{\,}^{\,}$ 2. We continue with the $\underline{\,}^{\,}\underline{\,}$ J on which partner plays the $\underline{\,}^{\,}$ 5 and declarer the $\underline{\,}^{\,}$ 3. It looks like partner has the $\underline{\,}^{\,}$ AK left.

What now?

We would like to get to partner's hand, so we play the ◆A to get partner's reaction. He plays the encouraging ◆7 so we continue diamonds to dummy's ◆T and partner's ◆Q, declarer playing the ◆8 and ◆9.

Partner then cashes the <u>▼A</u>, declarer following with the <u>▼8</u>. We discard our lowest club <u>♣7</u>, hoping that partner will recognise it as a low card. Partner then leads the ▼K

What do we return?

We don't want to lead trumps into declarer's hand, so we play the ♣T. Dummy plays the ♣J and partner wins with the ♣A, declarer following suit. Partner then leads the ♠2, declarer plays the ♠T and we win with the ♠K. We get out again with another club to declarer's ♠K but we still get one more trump trick.

The result of the carnage is four tricks for South, down four and -800 if not vulnerable, -1100 if vulnerable.

We have all seen worse weak two bids, but today was not South's lucky day. His partner had a useless hand, and the trumps were stacked against him!




Cover or Not


Defence: When to cover an honour with an honour?

When declarer/dummy leads an honour card, the default position is to cover the honour with your higher honour, to draw two of declarer's high cards for one of yours:



If you as East are too mean to play ♠K on dummy's ♠Q, ♠Q will win and the ♠2 to ♠J will follow, enabling declarer to score all three tricks. Instead, if you cover ♠Q with ♠K and declarer can win ♠A and ♠J, but not ♠Q.

But., do not always cover an honour with an honour as a reflex reaction, however. If there is no chance of promoting lower cards for your side (effectively the point of covering an honour with an honour), then do not bother.



If ♠Q is led of the table, you as East should play ♠4. You can see that covering ♠Q with ♠K will only promote Tables ♠JT9. By playing ♠4 on ♠Q, declarer's ♠A will win the second round perforce (because he only has two spades) and your will score the ♠K as a third-round winner.

So, cover an honour with an honour if you think you can promote lower cards for your side. Otherwise, do not.

Matchpoint scoring

The computer awards you on any given board:

- 2 MP's for each pair your score betters,
- 1 MP for each pair your score equals,.
- Zero for scores which are better than you

The computer adds up your MPs and generally shows it either as nnn/MAX or as a **percentage** of the max MP score available on a board.

Typically 20 table Event

- A Top = (20-1 * 2) = 38MP if you beat all the other scores (all 19 of them)
- A Bottom scores Zero.
- An Average (50% board) scores 19MP

The Bidding

Partner opens 2♠, weak, and your leap to 5♣ silences the table. West leads the ♥Q. Plan the play.

Preliminary Analysis

Winners: 1♠+8♠ – 9 tricks a lot of work to do Losers: ◆A, maybe more, Maybe the ♠K Strategies for 11 Tricks

- Spade finesse for 1 extra trick
- Set up the spades by ruffing out
- Diamond Finesse for 1 extra if AQ are both onside.

The Solution

The best idea is to set up the long spades to discard diamonds, without letting East in to switch a diamond.

After all you could lose three tricks in the two suits if East has the ♠K and West the ♠AQ. Another bad news scenario is East winning the ♠K and shifting to a low diamond putting you to an uncomfortable guess if the diamond honours are divided.

Unfortunately, the spade finesse goes directly into East and East will surely shift to a diamond. Can you figure out a way to keep East off lead even if East has the ♠K?

T1 West leads ♥Q, Duck the opening lead in dummy and unless East plays the unlikely ♥A, discard a spade from your hand! This keeps West (the safe Opponent) on lead.

What can West do? In fact, if West doesn't cash the •A, it is likely that you will be able to discard all your diamonds on established spades and make an overtrick. Notice that the dummy has three club entries that will help you establish the spades even if the suit breaks 4-1.

In fact, if spades are 4-1, West must shift to a trump at trick two to prematurely kill a needed dummy entry. As declarer, if West shifts to a trump at trick two and spades are 4-1 and the king is not singleton, you will have to lead a diamond from dummy and guess what to do if East plays low. I have complete confidence in you. Also, go after West as a partner rather than an opponent in the future.

In order to make this **loser on loser play** at trick one, you must advance the play mentally in your head, so to speak. You must ask yourself what is likely to happen if the spade finesse loses and a diamond comes back? Some terrifying scenarios can be avoided by looking ahead. Hopefully you will frighten yourself into making the winning play!

A Must Read for Club Players

This article is sourced from Bridgefeed "A Must read for club players" series and is titled "Watch those Spot Cards".

If you are a club player, it is almost a certainty that when you are declarer, you play your spot cards up the line. Likewise, when you are defending at the club, it is nearly certain that you do not take advantage of the fact that the opposing declarers almost never false card their spot cards. There are a few exceptions, but since you tend to play against the same players repeatedly, good observational skills will tell you who they are. This board from a recent common game is a perfect example.

Against East's final contract of 4♥, You South leads the ♠A.

North–South should play Ace is for "attitude" and King is for "Count." They were playing standard signals, high is encouraging (shows the ♠Q) and low is discouraging (denying the ♠Q).

T1 You cash the <u>♠A</u>, ♠4 from Dummy, and Partner plays the ♠7 and Declarer plays the ♠9.

If you are in tune with this tip, unless you have seen otherwise from declarer, partner is virtually certain to hold the ♠6.

- T2 So, you can lead the ♠8 (suit preference for the higher remaining suits diamonds) to partner's ♠Q,
- T3 Partner gives you a diamond ruff,
- T4 You cash the ♣A taking the setting trick.

Declarer, who has no reason to suspect a diamond void, will carefully be planning to play South, the opening bidder, for the A.

For example, if South cashed two rounds of spades followed by a low club (from a hypothetical suit with one club honour), declarer would plan to put up the •K to make five when South has under-led the ace. Results:

Setting 4♥ was worth 87% of the N–S match points, but letting them make 4♥, was worth 22% of the match points in 1303 plays. Only 88 N–S pairs (9%) held heart contracts to nine tricks out of 934 E–W heart contracts.

You might suggest that upside-down count and attitude would solve the problem immediately.

But switch North to ♠Q 10 9 and East to ♠J 7 6, and now standard signals win.

Tips for play at the club:

- (1) When you declare, randomize your equivalent spots, or better, play the same signals as the opponents (high encourages vs. standard and low encourages against upside down).
- (2) Pay close attention to the behaviour of your opponent's when they declare. Absent evidence to the contrary, assume your opposition declarers do not false card.
- (3) Ask your opponents about their methods or read their convention card to determine their signalling methods.

Do you tend to breathe a sigh of relief when your opponent makes a takeout double and relieves you of the obligation to bid with a minimum hand? Wouldn't it be more fun to take up some bidding space from your opponents? The best time to do that is when you have a fit for partner's suit. When partner opens a major suit, you need only three cards for a fit. After partner's 1♠ opening bid is doubled by your right-hand opponent, would you bid with:

★K76 **♥5 ♦**J9762 **♣**T942 ?

If not, you should! You have a fit the trump king and ruffing value in hearts. Think how much more difficult you make life for your opponents by bidding. Doubler's partner probably has some values but might be reluctant to bid at the three level.

Try another hand with the same bidding:

★K976 **♥**5 **♦**J9762 **♣**T94

Surely you want to bid over your opponent's double now. A raise to 2♠ simply doesn't do this hand justice. You can raise to 3♠. No, I haven't lost my mind, and I am not saying that this hand is worth a limit raise.

Your opponent's takeout double gives you new ways to show a limit raise or any good hand. Traditionally, redouble is used to show 10 or more high-card points. When you raise partner to 3♠ instead of using the redouble, you deny 10 or more points. This is a competitive auction because of RHO's takeout double, and it's time to apply the law of total tricks.

In a competitive auction, the Law tells us to compete for as many tricks as our side has trumps. You know opener has five spades and you have four. That makes nine trumps and you compete for nine tricks. If a raise to 2♠ made it hard for your opponents to compete in the first example, just think what your 3♠ raise is going to do to them!

Because redouble exists, nobody at the table should take you for a good hand when you jump raise your partner's opener's suit after your opponent's takeout double. This weak raise is **not Alertable**. In fact, those who jump to show a limit raise in this situation are the people who are bidding in non-standard fashion and should really Alert. Don't expect that to happen, however, because they are probably inexperienced players who are not aware that their bid is not standard. Now try these. Partner opens 1, and RHO makes a takeout double. What will you bid with each hand below?

1. **♠**42 **♥QJ97 ♦**765 **♣**K754

Jump to 3♥. You want to keep them from finding their likely spade fit. With nine trumps between you, the three level should be safe. You might not make 3♥, but if you do go down, the penalty is likely to be less than what your opponents can make if left to bid freely.

2. ★42 ♥Q97 ◆7654 ★K754

Bid 2♥. It might not block the opponents, but at least you can try. Your raise also helps partner know when it is correct to compete further.

3. **★**4 **♥**JT 65 **♦**Q9654 **♣**54

Go all the way to 4*! With 10 trumps, contract for 10 tricks in competition. That could really mess up your opponents. Responder can make this pre-emptive raise to game whether RHO doubles, overcalls or passes. In standard bidding, responder's immediate raise to four of a major shows a weak, distributional hand with five-card trump support. With a strong, game-going hand, responder makes a forcing bid first and then bids game.

4. ♠K76 ♥QJ97 ◆AT76 ♣54

This is a real limit raise. Before RHO's double, you planned to raise to 3, but now that bid would be pre-emptive. Many pairs use 2NT to show a limit raise or better immediately. If you don't use that convention, sometimes called Jordan, start with a redouble to show 10 or more points, and raise hearts next time.

Some of you might have learned a new bid today — one that isn't even a convention. Responder's jump raise of opener's suit is pre-emptive after a takeout double. It's standard bidding, but not widely known among less-experienced players.



The Bidding:

You (South) opened 1NT (12-14 Bal playing a weak NT opening), and partner bids 2♣ Stayman, which you respond 2♥ and you landed in a 4♥ contract.

To start the defence, West leads a trump ♥7,

T1 West leads a trump ♥7, you the declarer, cover with dummy's ♥9 which holds the trick. East playing the ♥2, and ♥8 from hand.

Preliminary analysis

Top Winners: 2 + 3(4) + 1 = 6 3 short! Top Losers: A, but many deep losers Strategies for 10 Tricks?

- Looks like East has the ♥K, so 4 heart tricks are likely.
- Could draw trumps, cash ♠AK & exit the 3rd ♠ for the defence to open a minor suit or give a ruff sluff in spades (5th Heart trick)
- Lead up to ♣Q, hoping ♣K is onside.
- Pick and find a onside, or get opponents to lead the diamond suit
- Overall, not a good contract. Balanced hands Vs Balanced hand usually play better in NT. But it is too late now. What is your line?

Your Solution

- T2 You then choose to play a low diamond from dummy ◆5, (planning to either get a 5th trick with a diamond ruff, or if ◆Q onside and East does not rise, so the ◆J forces the ◆A). But East, rises with the ◆Q winning the trick. But now you can force a diamond trick.
- T3 East shifted to a spade ♠7. You won this in hand with the ♠K.
- T4 You then exited with the ◆J. East winning the trick with the ◆A
- T5 East then continued with the ♠Q. You won this trick in dummy with the ♠A.
- T6 You cashed the **♦K**, to get rid of his remaining spade loser **♣T** from Hand, with EW following.
- T7 The limited entry position forced you to turn your attention to the club suit by leading dummy's ♣5 towards his ♣Q, but West took this with the ♣K
- T8 West then played the ♠J. You ruffed this with the ♥T
- Then you led a low club to West's <u>♣2</u> and finessed dummy's <u>♣T</u>, which held as West played the ♣9.
- T10 All that remained was to lead a trump

 v4 to East's v5 and your vQ and West's

 v3.
- T11 You cashed the <u>▼A</u> to draw East's last trump ▼K.
- T12 You claimed the last two tricks as dummy was now high (♣A & ♥J).

Note that you managed to play both minor suits optimally for three tricks! To make your 4 contract.

2021 ANC and 2021 GNOT Final

In light of the worsening COVID situation in Victoria, NSW and ACT, the current travel restrictions and the unlikelihood of restrictions easing for travel to WA and QLD in the near future, the ABF Board has agreed to the following changes to the calendar in 2021:

- The 2021 ANC which was to be held in WA in November has been postponed until further notice. An online event will be held in its place and further details on this will be available on My ABF and the website soon.
- The 2021 GNOT Final (originally to be held in Brisbane) will also be cancelled as a face-toface event, and instead will be held as an online event.

The selection criteria will be teams of two or three pairs of strong demonstrated partnership performance that are likely to contribute to <u>future</u> Australian International team performances.
