Update from the President

Dear Members,

Firstly, welcome to many of you who have recently joined our club! I hope that you are all finding North Shore to be as good a club to play bridge at as I do. And to all our existing members, thank you for your continued support and please make all of our new members, and visitors, feel welcome when you get the opportunity.

I would like to thank the many members who wrote to me this month after I communicated the decision of the committee to raise our table fees for the first time in around five years. The supporting comments I received from so many of you are greatly appreciated. For the small number of you who expressed concern with the decision, I truly appreciate your feedback also and you may be assured that the decision we made was driven by the need for us to be financially secure enough to continue to operate bridge lessons and games during these troubled times. We remain committed to our 'not for profit' principles.

On the topic of property, we are, I'm afraid, not much closer this month than last month to securing the Chatswood site. We are still waiting for the Owner's Corporation of the building to approve a by-law which will permit us to be a tenant.

As I noted in last month's newsletter, the committee is also considering whether or not to continue our tenancy at North Ryde RSL. Clearly the venue was not as popular as we had hoped and whilst our agreement with the RSL means that we are not paying rent during the lockdown we feel that it is appropriate to review now whether or not we continue to operate from this facility. We are targeting to decide at our meeting in late September. The committee has also recently considered the matter of policy with regard to the vaccination status of players and staff in our face-to-face venues. You will find an update on this matter separately in Liam's column in this month's newsletter. I want to point out that we are so fortunate to be able to play bridge online at the moment and even in the future if you are unable to comply with the policies, we feel are necessary to put in place for face-to-face operations, you will be able to continue to play online from the safety of your home.

Finally, to state the obvious, the current times are clearly difficult for us all. I am so fortunate to be on a committee with some wonderful individuals who are all working diligently on your behalf. We are considering matters we would never have dreamt of a couple of years ago. We appreciate that you have elected us to look after your club and to represent you. If at any time you would like to ensure that we are considering your perspective on any of the matters we are dealing with, please do not hesitate to reach out to any member of the committee, Liam, Gary or me.

While you might have a great Internet connection, however it can be compromised by weak WIFI signal within your home. If you do suffer from freezes or dropouts move closer to the modem first.

I would like to join with our President in welcoming our new members – almost 100 in August. The promotional membership rate of \$15 is proving very popular! If any of you know someone that might benefit from joining our club (or playing online), please put them in touch with me and I will provide them with all of the information that they need.

It is important to give credit to those who have these good ideas, so please join me in congratulating Margaret Owen for coming up with this initiative and getting it off the ground.

While online bridge continues its boom of activity during the current lockdown in Sydney, the club is looking forward to the future when the city, and our club, can reopen its doors.

With this in mind, the NSBC committee discussed vaccination policy at its most recent meeting. The committee agreed to adopt a policy that requires full vaccination for all of our face-to-face staff and players once our doors reopen.

Like all bridge clubs the largest part of our demographic is retirees, including a significant number in the 70+ category. This also corresponds to a higher health risk from COVID in that category, and a greater obligation on the club to make sure that our players are safe.

Guiding this decision have been the recent decisions of the ABF and the NSWBA to implement vaccination policies. For the ABF, all national bridge events next year will require proof of full vaccination or a medical certificate confirming ineligibility as well as a negative COVID-19 test conducted within the last 3 days.

The NSWBA has gone further and simply required full vaccination to attend its physical premises. The reasoning here is that while the ABF runs one-off events, the NSWBA is running an ongoing business, so the medical certificate route is not practical. While we are

ironing out the details of our policy, it is likely to end up closer to the NSWBA's than the ABF's.

As we expect to remain in lockdown for at least another month, announcing this policy now gives all of our staff and players the chance to get fully vaccinated. I am aware that many of you have already taken action here and most of our staff have too. I have my second shot coming up this week.

For those who are unable to get vaccinated, you will continue to be able to join us on RealBridge which we believe is the best platform for a social and competitive game of bridge from the comfort of your home. We are proud to offer the largest selection of online bridge games in Australia and it is clear that our players agree that Gary and our team offer a great service.

I welcome your feedback on this policy and my contact details are at the head of this column.

Since the success of the inaugural Online Winter Congress on the first weekend of August, we held another popular event on 22 August: the online rendition of our East Lindfield Swiss Teams Congress. With players joining from around Australia, the 52-team field compared favourably to previous years.

Coming up: our next online congress will be the <u>NSBC@Lindfield Online Labour Day</u> <u>Matchpoint Pairs</u> on October 4. Join us on RealBridge for a full day of Matchpoint fun. \$25, entries through the NSWBA website.

Club Teams Championship Results






Online Swiss Teams Now on RealBridge Host Club: NSBC@Lindfield

'Drinks anyone', as long as you are Male!

Following on from my previous story reported on a few months back about my Granny and her epic 1929 win of a big Bridge tournament in northern Scotland, and her adventure to get hold of the motor car offered as 1st prize, another story has come to mind. This time from the early 1980's.

In about 1976 my 1st mother-in-law (I got on much better with her than her daughter, but that's for another time) enticed me back into bridge, starting with a series of 8 beginners lessons from Dick Cummings, a long-time partner of the Tim Seres. After the 6th lesson Mr Cummings told the class he had to go overseas the next day and lessons 7 and 8 were cancelled but he had entered us all in a Pairs game at the NSWBA. It started the next Wednesday, and ran over 6 weeks, nothing so easy as Novice, Restricted, Intermediate were available, just straight into the mix. I was soon hooked and became a regular in the NSWBA clubrooms. Early on I met up with Tim Waygood and we still play together now, despite a break of about 20 years when we lived in different places. In our first couple of months together we teamed up with another pair of hopeless beginners and our 2nd match was against Dick Cummings, Tim Seres, Dennis Howard and Ron Klinger!! They, very politely, just managed to beat us, 50 - 0.

Shortly after that I was transferred to live in a big NSW country town where I joined their large and very social bridge club. They played in a 'mens club', where women bridge players were freely admitted to play as long as they entered through the back door, husbands through the front door, wives round the back! I found that amazing, but not as amazing as the table waiter. He arrived at the table and asked if he could get us a drink, my (male) partner and I each asked for a beer, our Opponents (female) both asked for a gin and tonic. Shortly afterwards the beers arrived, however after a few hands no sign of the G & Ts, so I enquired of the waiter what had become of the drinks requested by the ladies The Answer, forever etched in my memory "Sir, I don't take orders from women."

With the support of most, but not all, of the male members and most, but not all, of the female members about two months later the Bridge Club moved to other premises where it was equal rights for all. I suggest the waiter was lucky never to have met my Granny.

What do you bid?

You should try **2NT**, which shows an invitational hand (11–12 high-card points) and a stopper in hearts. Note that the **VJ863** is a very attractive holding because it provides a likely heart stopper, vet all but one of your high-card points will help to secure tricks in the other suits. Your partner raises to 3NT, ending the auction.

West leads the A , a	North

Many contracts are lost by playing the wrong card at trick one, which is the right time to think. In fact, trick two is often too late to make your contract. What guides your play when you consider which spade to play from the dummy at trick one? Your partner was a bit enthusiastic when bidding 3NT with a balanced hand and 13 HCP, so you need to play carefully. Because your opponent leads her own suit instead of her partner's, it seems likely she had some good cards in her suit,

West leads the **▲6** so you play the **▲J**, which T1 holds.

Regarding the play at trick one, you should use the Rule of Eleven. When an opponent makes a fourthbest lead, subtract the rank of the card from 11 to determine how many cards higher than the opening lead are in the other three hands.

In this example, West led the 46. The Rule of Eleven says there are five cards higher than the 6, in the other three hands combined: dummy, right-hand opponent, and you, declarer. This rule guides your play of the AJ at trick one. Because you and dummy have four cards higher than the 6, your right-hand opponent has only one card higher. Because the AQ or T in the East hand would win if declarer played low from dummy at trick one, declarer should play dummy's AJ to eliminate the possibility of East winning with the T.

Now what line of play should you consider? You clearly you need to develop some diamond tricks. While a simple club finesse may be taken later, it is important to play diamonds right away. Declarer needs at least two diamond tricks to go along with three spade tricks, two heart tricks and at least two club tricks. And diamonds must be played from the dummy, aiming to finesse twice if necessary.

- T2 So, $\diamond 2$ to your $\diamond T$, which West wins $\diamond Q$.
- Т3 West continues **▲4**, **▲K**, **▲T**, **▲9**
- T4 Next **43**, to your **4**, and West wins the **4**.
- T5 West shifts to the **v**2, aiming to get to her partner, having no entry to the long spades. You play low from dummy, as East wins the ¥Q.
- T6 East returns +9, so you win +K west follows +4.
- So, you cash the 13th diamond **•6**, discarding a T7 **▲**2 from the dummy.
- T8 Now all that's left to do is to drive out Easts VA with low heart to dummy's **VT**.
- Т9 East returns a heart to the **VK** in the dummy,
- T10 So you then cash the \underline{A} (discarding the \underline{A})
- T11 You then play the **J** from the dummy, covered by East's **♣K** and win **♣A**.

You end up with nine tricks: three spades, two hearts, two diamonds and two clubs.

Declarer's success begins with the trick-one play of the **A**J, a finesse. Then declarer attacked diamonds from the dummy to finesse twice. Declarer needs to develop diamond tricks and take the club finesse later.

Our Game of Bridge



Defence in Detail

Accurate Defence is the hardest part of our game. A series of artiicles written for the GC Newsletter by our Manager. Liam Milne


If someone's play looks strange, stop and consider the position.

Sitting East and playing a knockout teams match, you hold the following hand:

▲ T872, ♥ AKT93, ♦ T5, ♣ 95

The opponents have a short and sweet Precision auction:

the **♣2** (fourth best) for their opening lead. Dummy plays the **♣7**, you cover with the **♣9** and declarer wins the **▲Q**.

You may not have prepared yourself for what declarer does next:

- T2. he leads the six of spades to dummy's king (partner following with the five)
- T3. In dummy, next play is the eight of hearts! What on earth is going on?

If declarer is trying to establish a heart trick, he is going about it in a very curious way. Your strong heart spots suggest that hearts are declarer's weakest suit rather than a likely source of tricks. In fact, we can probably rule out several heart holdings immediately: if declarer held three or four hearts to the queen, this play would frequently destroy his own stopper. Assuming declarer is a sane player, his heart holding simply can't be that good. So, what is he up to? With several other alternative suits to play on, the only reason for declarer to play hearts is for dishonest purposes. He must be attempting to dissuade the defence from shifting to hearts when they get in. Luckily, your hearts were strong enough that you could see through the plan. Declarer can't hold three or more hearts including the queen, so is it good enough to put in the nine of hearts (hopefully winning) and cash out the suit? No. Declarer might hold the gueen of hearts doubleton, in which case playing low would be disastrous. There are two good reasons to take your top hearts and attempt to run the suit: if you let your partner win the queen of hearts, they might concede the ninth trick with their return, while if declarer has the queen, ducking will probably concede the contract.

In order to help partner, do the right thing if they hold • Qxx, best is to play your hearts in abnormal order (ace then king). An abnormal order of play suggests that partner wake up and do something special, in this case unblocking his queen under your king.

Declarer could see that the straight-forward line of playing on spades would compel the opponents to find the winning switch. The most realistic plan was to play their suit himself and hope for the best. At the table, East ducked the heart smoothly and that was that. Did you get swindled, or did you punish declarer's flamboyant line of play?

Point to remember: 'following the rules' (second hand low) is good enough for the most part, but when it looks like someone has made a very strange play, playing quickly is the surest way to have a disaster.

THE BIDDING

You open 1 a on your 19hcp and partner leaps to 2NT (Jacoby GF in Spades, asking for shortages). Your 3NT showed extras while denying six spades and indicating no singleton or void in a side suit. After some control-bidding cues, you asked for key cards and then confirmed that the partnership had them all by bidding 5NT asking if he held anything else? When North showed that he held the &K by bidding 6, you bid what you thought you could likely make, the **grand slam in spades.**

West starts the defence with the lead of the ♥T. How will you get to 13 tricks with these cards?

Preliminary Analysis

Winners: 5 + 4 + 1 + 2 = 12 one short! Top losers: none maybe **K**

Strategies for 13 tricks

- Pitch losing diamond from dummy on 4th heart winner, & ruff DQ
- Diamond Finesse (50% chance)
- A trump has not been led. May signify a 0-4 trump break?
- A possible Dummy reversal ruffing the 2 Clubs in hand for an extra trick.

Your Solution

When dummy came down, you counted 12 winners and saw that, if trumps were no worse than 3-1, he could draw the trumps, discard a diamond from dummy on the fourth round of hearts: and ruff the •Q in the dummy. So,

- T1 West starts the defence with the lead of the ♥T. You played low from dummy ♥5 and win the first trick in hand with you ♥K.
- T2 You then played a low trump toward dummy. When West discarded a diamond, declarer won the trick with dummy's <u>▲8</u>. Declarer saw that trying to ruff a diamond was too dangerous a policy to pursue, requiring East to have 4 hearts.
- T34 Instead, you decide to ruff two clubs in hand without using the ♥A as an entry. So, you cashed the ♣AK with everyone following.
- T5 You then ruffed a club $\clubsuit 5$ with the $\bigstar K$ in hand.
- T6 Next, you led the ♠Q (unblocking) to dummy's ▲A
- T7 You then lead **♣7**, and ruffed dummy's last club with the **▲J** in hand.
- T8 You then lead your remaining trump, the **▲5**, was now led to dummy's **▲9**.
- T9 You then drew East's last trump with dummy's $\underline{\bullet T}$,
- T10 You then claimed 13 tricks: four trumps, four hearts, a diamond, two clubs and two club ruffs.

Note that the bad heart break meant that if declarer had been careless with his trump entries to dummy, he would have gone down when he ever tried to cross back to dummy in hearts. The full deal:

The Bidding

You are sitting South, with a good looking 16hcp hand. You open 1, but West finds a vulnerable overcall of 1.

Partner finds a Negative double (promised four spades, as he felt obliged to do something and considered that his three-card suit had the same playing strength as some four-card suits) You jump to 4♠.

Against your spade game, West starts the defence by leading the ***A**. Dummy comes down. Now what?

Preliminary Analysis

Winners: 4 + 5 + 1 = 10 Tricks Top Losers: *****A, maybe deep clubs Strategies for 10 tricks

- If Spades break 33 easy
- If spades 2-4, could duck a couple of hearts (throwing clubs), then ruff in Dummy.

Your Solution

On eyeing dummy, you could count 10 easy tricks if spades were no worse than 4-2 and diamonds 4-2. That suggested playing for control.

- West leads <u>VA</u> as East plays V7, T1
- T2 West continues with ♥K, ♥6, ♥9, So You discarded a low club \$3 from hand.
- T3 West continued with the ♥Q, ♥J, ♥T and you kept to your plan and discarded a second low club loser ♣4 from hand.
- T4 West suspecting that his partner had long (six?) trumps, continued with a fourth round of hearts ♥2 (Suggesting club trick). You ruffed this in dummy with the **T** as East dropped D7 & D2 from hand
- You then cashed the A and the awful 0-6 T5 trump break was revealed.

You finished two down, complaining all the way about your bad luck.


Your partner was not amused!

"Despite the fact that the play you faced looked like it was about retaining control, you should have ruffed the second heart rather than discard a club,"

- T2 Ruff **♥K** with the **▲3**.
- T3 Play $\diamond 2$ to the $\diamond K$.
- Τ4 Then the **+J** back to the **+A**.
- T5 Ruff the **◆5** with the **◆T**.
- Come back to hand **42** to the **A**. T6
- T7 Ruff **♦8** with the **▲J**.
- T8 Then ruff dummy's remaining heart **V** with the **♦9**.
- Т9 Ruff your last diamond \mathbf{AQ} with the \mathbf{AK} which would be your eighth trick.

"The **AQ** would be your ninth and tenth tricks. This approach will succeed unless one of your minor-suit winners is ruffed and is independent of how badly the trumps break."

The Bidding

After you open 1 \checkmark , your partner responds with a 2NT bid, (Jacoby Game Force, 12+ 4 \checkmark or 15+ 3 \checkmark) You show your singleton club 3 \bigstar , and partner cues 3 \blacklozenge . You bid 4NT, Keycard Blackwood in Hearts, Partner shows 3 or 0 Keycards and land in a 6 \checkmark contract. West starts the defence with lead of the \bigstar Q. Hearts are 1-1. **Plan the play.**

Preliminary Analysis

Top Winners: 1♠+6♥+2♦+1♣= 10

Top Losers: None, but a deep ♦ & maybe ♠K Strategies for 12 tricks

- When dealing with losers in two suits, it is almost always right to start with the longer combined suit providing the suit is unevenly divided.
- Eliminate clubs from both NS hands by ruffing 2 clubs in the long hand
- Given that your diamonds are 4-3, you may be able to develop an extra diamond trick if their diamonds are divided 3-3. That extra diamond winner can be used to discard a spade from dummy thus avoiding the spade finesse.

Your Solution

- T1 West leads the **♣Q**, you win the **▲A** on table, **♣9**, **♣7** from hand.
- T2 You now start on the club elimination by ♣4, ♣T ruff high ♥9, ♣2
- T3 You then cross back to dummy on a small trump ♥3,
 ♥2, ♥K, ♥7. All the trumps are drawn.
- T4 You complete the club elimination **♣5**, **♣K**, **¥4**, **♣3**
- T5 You now start on the diamonds play the $\diamond 2$, $\diamond 8$, $\underline{\diamond A}$, $\diamond 3$,
- T6 You lead a low diamond **•6**. If East had followed with a low diamond **•7**, duck the trick **•4** into the safe West hand **•J**, who now cannot play a club (ruff & discard) nor a spade into your hand's protected

▲AQ. If West holding is exactly a doubleton diamond West will have no safe exit and no spade finesse will be necessary.

If West has a diamond exit and diamonds are

- a) 33 You will have your 13th diamond to pitch dummy spade,
- b) 4-2 with West, you will need to try the spade finesse to make you contract


If East does not play the lowest missing diamond e.g., inserts a higher **T**. You will win the **K** and exit another diamond hoping for 3-3 diamond break (36%). If you get lucky, you will be able to discard a spade from dummy on your 13th diamond.

However, if diamonds are 4-2 (48%), close your eyes and take the spade finesse. Sometimes finesses work. In any case you have a 68% chance of landing this contract by giving yourself two chances.

◆ 33=36%, ◆ 42=48%, Finesse=50%
2 chances = Diamond 33 else ◆ Finesse
Probability = 36% + 50% (100%-64%) = 68%

The normal way to play diamonds with this combination is to first duck a diamond and then play the ace-king. This technique allows you to retain control of the suit when the suit breaks 4-2. However, you cannot afford to do that here. If you duck a diamond and East wins and returns a spade, you have painted yourself into a corner. You do not know whether diamonds are breaking 3-3 so you do not know whether to take the spade finesse or gamble on the diamonds being 3-3. Why put yourself in such a predicament?

This hand is the exception to the general rule of ducking a trick early with this diamond combination because you must discover how the diamonds break immediately because of the threat of a premature spade return from East.
