Defense."

We are sitting West. Our hand is

♦5 ♥K72 ♦Q972 ♣97632.

East opens 1♥, South overcalls 1♠ and we raise partner to 2♥. North bids 2♠, partner competes with 3♥ and South jumps to 4♠. All pass, we lead the ♥2 and dummy comes down.

Lead: ♥2

Declarer plays the ♥3 from dummy and partner wins with the ♥A. Partner then cashes the ♣A and returns a small heart ♥4 to our ♥K. It is good that partner returned hearts, but the cashing of the ♣A is unusual in that it sets up dummy's high clubs.

Is partner trying to give us a message?

Yes. The most likely thing is that partner started with a singleton club and wants a club ruff.

How many tricks have we taken?

We have three tricks and need just one more to set the contract.

What do we do now?

We return a club and put a smile on partner's face. Partner duly ruffs the club and declarer takes all the rest of the tricks.

If partner had not cashed the ♣A before returning a heart, declarer would have made the contract.


Which card to promote?

Which card to promote?

When you have a choice of cards to promote, it is usually best to try to promote your lower card first. Put another way, when you are missing two (or more) high cards, finesse against their lower card. You will do this by taking a "deep finesse." Take these combinations:

- 1. **♣KJ2** facing **♣543**
- 2. **KJT** facing **432**
- 3. **♠QT9** facing **♠654**
- 4. ▼AQT facing ▼642
- 5. **♣AJ9** facing **♣643**
- 6. **♦KT8** facing **♦542**
- 1) Your only chance of promoting both ♣K and ♣J is to lead ♣3 to the lower ♣J first, hoping the second hand holds both ♣A and ♣Q. If ♣J wins (lucky you), cross back and lead ♣4 towards ♣K.
- 2) Lead ◆2 to ◆T (or ◆J), finessing against •Q. If the second player holds ◆Q, either ◆T will win or bring out ◆A (you do not mind). You will later lead ◆3 to ◆J Erroneously leading to ◆K first and you can only ever win one trick.
- 3) Needing one trick, lead ♠4 to ♠9 (or ♠T), hoping the second player holds ♠J. If ♠9 forces out ♠K, later lead to ♠T. Leading to ♠Q first would work only if the second player held both ♠A and ♠K.
- 4) Lead to ▼T first, the deep finesse, your only chance of promoting ▼T. If you have 25 per cent luck and the second hand holds both ▼K and ▼J, ▼T will win. You can cross back and lead ▼4 to ▼Q.
- 5) Lead ♣3 to ♣9 first, finessing against ♣T. Say the second player holds ♣QT (or ♣KT).♣9 will draw ♣K, enabling you later to lead ♣4 to ♣J.
- 6) If you need a quick trick and cannot lose two tricks first, lead to ◆K. However, if you have time, you may be able to promote a trick with ◆A offside — see following deal.



1. 4NT was a Quantitative try for 6 NT. Normally, North would have 19 or 20 to invite opposite a weak NT opening, (there cannot quite be 33 points, holding 18 facing 12-14) but he likes his three tens.

Pass 4NT All pass

A heart lead would have defeated 4NT but West naturally led a spade (a high-for-hate •9).

With nine top tricks, declarer needed one diamond trick (doubtless cursing his partner for not settling for 3NT).

- T1 You Win the ♠J in hand,
- T2 you lead ◆2 to ◆8 the deep finesse. East winning the ◆Q
- T3 East switched to ♥Q. You Win the ♥K,
- T4 You then led ◆4 to ◆T (East winning ◆Q suggesting West maybe held ◆J). East won ◆A but ◆K was promoted and your 4NT contract was made.

If ◆2 to ◆8 had lost to East's ◆9, declarer would have had to hope West held ◆A and lead up to the ◆K next.

Note: Which means a very Machiavellian
East holding ◆QJ9 will win ◆8 finesse with an
unnecessary high ◆J or ◆Q to try and trick
you into repeating the ◆T finesse

Re-Opening Doubles

Michael Bishop

(Another way to double the opponents for penalties!)

This was a hand in Saturday's Real Bridge. Link: Open Duplicate, 1:30pm (Board 8, 30-Oct-21):

Vul: None Dir: West The bidding went -

What do you do as South holding the hand below?



You probably said 2NT or 3NT and indeed that is what 22 pairs out of 27 did − 81%. If you were playing Rubber Bridge you would double and that would be a *Penalty double* (You have 4 trumps with 2 honours, singleton in partner's suit and the lion's share of the HCP (25 vs 15) so 2♥ is definitely going down at least 2 tricks).

But playing duplicate, a double here is a **Negative double** showing the minors. To penalize the 2 vovercall, we must **pass** and partner, who is in the pass out seat, can make a re-opening double which we will then PASS, converting it into a penalty double.

3NT by us might struggle because we have length in the opponent's suit ♥ and a singleton in partner's long suit ♠. But we are guaranteed to get a plus score if we pass partner's re-opening double. And guess what?, only one N-S pair did exactly that and got a clear 100% top when E-W went 3 down doubled for 500 beating all those N-S's

getting 400 for 3NT. That pair was Judy Osie and David Osie.

The next time you open and there is an overcall on your left and the bidding is passed around to you <u>AND</u> you have a singleton or void in the over caller's suit, consider making a re-opening double. Partner could just very well be sitting there with a stack of cards in the over caller's suit, and she is hoping you will double which they can pass for penalties.

P.S If partner cannot pass your double for penalties, no problem – because of your singleton/void you will have support for any suit bid by partner.

How Match Point scoring works

The computer awards you on any given board:

- 2 Matchpoints for each pair your score betters on your say your side of the field.
- 1 Matchpoint for each pair that your score equals,
- Zero Matchpoints for scores which are better than you
- Two separate fields for scoring EW and NS, So, a NS top = EW Bottom.

On any given board:

The computer adds up your MPs and generally shows it either as nnn/MAX or as a **percentage** of the max MP score available on a board.

Consider a typical 20-table Matchpoint Event

- An absolute Top = (20-1 * 2 MP) = or 38
 match points, if you better all the other
 scores on that board in your direction (all 19
 of them)
- An absolute Bottom scores Zero Match points (i.e., everybody, all 19 of them, bettered your score).
- An Average (50% board) scores 19 Match points (i.e., half the field scored better and half worse)
- All the board results are tallied, and your result is usually expressed as a percentage of the maximum possible match point score.

The Bidding

After you open 1♥ in fourth seat, partner's leap to 4♥ ends the bidding.

T1 West leads the **♠2**, (fourth best), to East's **♠K** and you win with your **♠A**.

Now what? Plan the play.

Preliminary Analysis

Top Winners: 1♠+4♥+3♦+1♣ = 9 One short! Losers: 2 spades+ ♦A, maybe ♥K

Strategies for 10 tricks?

- ♣K finesse to throw a loser on ♣A
- Finesse the VK.

The best solution

You are staring at three losers, two spades, the ◆A, not to mention the ♥K. Working with the diamonds first, is out of the question as they will win and cash a spade tricks reducing you to the heart finesse.

If you take the heart finesse and it loses, down you go. But wait! What about the club finesse? If that works, you can discard a spade from dummy on the ♣A. But wait! What if the club finesse loses and the heart finesse was working all along!

Both finesses are 50-50 propositions, but why guess when you can 'combine'? And guess what? There is a 'two-king' combining rule.

When dealing with two suits each missing a king and a finesse for either will land you your contract, but if you take the wrong one, down you go, play the ace of the longer suit (in this case hearts), and if the king does not drop, take a finesse in the shorter suit, clubs.

The chance of finding the singleton ♥K coupled with the club finesse, if the ♥K does not drop, is your best bet.

Also, when you lead a heart to the ace, lead the queen. West may be someone who has covered every honour with an honour since birth.

Rookie Challenge Hand 2 (solution)
You hold the following hand:

♠ A986 **♥** 9 **♦** KQJT7 **♣** 743.

Your partner opens 1 ♥ and you bid 1 ♠. The auction proceeds:

You bid conservatively because you have three losing clubs and shortness in partner's suit. Even though your partner has shown 16–18 HCP and you hold 10 HCP, you decide to sign off in 4.

Your left-hand opponent leads the A, and this is what you see:

North (D)

- T1 West cashes the <u>*A</u>, *K, *2, *3
 T2 West seeing the club shortage, ex
- T2 West seeing the club shortage, exits with a trump ♠T.

Before you play to the second trick, **you need a plan**. Are you going to draw trumps, try to trump clubs in the dummy, or try to set up dummy's heart suit? Pulling trumps would work if you have established winners afterwards.

Winners: 4♣+1♥+5♠=10, **So look for overtricks!**Losers ♣A cashed!
Strategies for more tricks?

- Ruff two clubs on the table, but will have to ruff with an honour
- Ruff Hearts in hand looking for a 33 break Solution

Here, you would be left with at least one losing club in your hand. Because you are playing duplicate and trying to take as many tricks as possible, that might not be the safest line of play.

Because you do not know at trick two if spades are breaking 3–2 or 4–1, and you also do not know if hearts are breaking 3–3 or a more likely 4–2, you

should play to keep your options open. By winning the spade trick in your hand with the ace, your leave entries to the dummy's heart suit intact.

- T2 West seeing the club shortage, exits with a trump ♠T, you win this in hand ♠2, ♠3, ♠A
- T3 You **₹9** to dummy **₹A** (**₹3**, **₹8**)
- T4 You trump **₹4** with your **★6**.
- T5 You want to get to dummy to trump another heart, so you play your ♠8 to dummy's ♠J. Here, you discover that trumps split 4–1 when West discards a low club. If you draw the outstanding trumps, therefore, you will not be left with a trump in dummy to ruff a club later.
- T6 So you trump a third **♥5** with your last spade **★9**. Success: Both opponents follow to the third heart, meaning the suit was originally 3–3. Dummy's hearts are now good!
- T7 But you need to get there and finish pulling trumps. So next play ◆7 to dummy's ◆A,
- T89 Followed by cashing dummy's **<u>*KQ</u>** trumps to draw the two remaining spades from East.
- T10+ Now you can enjoy the three remaining hearts in the dummy (throwing your 2 clubs), and your last tricks are in diamonds in your hand.. You took **12 tricks**, even with trumps breaking 4–1. A Top board!

Here is the full layout.

Your line of play established the dummy's heart suit by ruffing dummy's losers in hearts in your hand, and you delayed drawing trumps until the long suit in the dummy became established.

This is a very successful line of play in many deals.

With nobody vulnerable, partner opens 1♥ and your right-hand opponent overcalls 1NT. How would you bid with this holding?

A952 ♥92 ♦K543 K94?

It might help you to think about the entire deal. Partner opened so you can expect 13 high card points there. Give the 1NT over-caller about 16 HCP and you have 10. What does that leave for over-caller's partner? Very little! Do you think your opponent should be able to make 1NT? Not likely! It is hard to play a contract when there are no entries to dummy. Without a big trump fit, it is not likely that your side has enough strength for game either. You could easily get the best score possible if you double 1NT for penalty.

You know what to lead – the ♥9, top of a doubleton in partner's bid suit. The defence will cooperate to set up East's long heart suit.

Poor South is declarer and has to find seven tricks in his own hand with that sorry dummy. South sees only two sure winners. Two more tricks can be developed in diamonds, and that is where South will begin his work. Declarer has to give up the lead twice and that gives the defenders time to set up hearts. East will eventually cash three heart tricks to go with the ◆A and West's ◆K. The defenders can also take three tricks in the black suits to set 1NT two. Plus

300 beats any score East–West could make if West had bid instead of making the penalty double.

Would you have doubled with West's hand? Would your partner have recognized it as a penalty double? Any time partner's opening bid is followed by a 1NT overcall, and you hold at least 10 points, you should give serious consideration to making a penalty double. For those who use negative doubles, they are used after suit overcalls — not after a strong 1NT overcall. With a penalty double available for good hands, responder to an opening bid does not show a lot of strength by bidding after an opponent overcalls 1NT. With good distribution and many points, responder can bid a long suit.

For example, partner opens 1+, RHO overcalls 1NT and you hold:

★KJT963 ***7 ◆93 ★**JT98.

You can bid 2♠ with no danger of misleading partner. If you had 10 points, you would have made a penalty double. Your bid is on the two level, but it is not forcing, and you are not showing a strong hand. Partner can pass even without support, so you should have a fairly good long suit.

How would you take partner's double of an opponent's 1NT opening bid? We are accustomed to using the double of an opening bid for takeout, but in order to make a takeout double, your opponents must have bid at least one suit, a suit that your partner can take out of the picture when choosing trumps.

In standard bidding, the double of a 1NT opening bid (weak or strong) is a penalty double. Some pairs use special conventions for bidding over 1NT openers, and some of those conventions assign other meanings to a double. Those players will Alert their double because it is not the standard penalty double. To make a penalty double of a 1NT opening bid, you should have enough tricks to defeat 1NT.

Take some time to discuss these auctions with your favourite partners. A simple agreement to have is that any double of a strong notrump bid (opening or overcall) is for penalty. If your side's first action (other than pass) is a double of a 1NT response (a weak bid), this is not for penalty. It is a takeout double with the opening bidder's suit taken out of the picture.

Develop Your Skills (DYS) is aimed at players who have completed the Build on the Basics course or who have been playing for at least one year. - T1 West starts with the **♠9**, dummy winning **♠A**, East **♠2**, **♠6** from hand
- T2 You paused to take stock and saw that you could count 11 top tricks. This meant you would need to develop an extra trick in one of the red suits. So, you cashed dummy's second high spade ♠K, ♠3, ♠T, ♠4.
- T3 You then led a diamond **◆2**, **◆3** to your **◆Q** and West winning the **◆K**.
- T4 West found the sensible exit of another spade, forcing declarer to do all of the hard work on his own. ♠8, ♠3, ♠5, winning the ♠Q in hand.

- The contract now depended on making four tricks in hearts and that suggested gathering as much distributional information as possible before touching the heart suit. So, you then cashed the <u>♦</u>J, West following S8, throwing another diamond 4 from dummy, East parting with the <u>\$</u>2.
- T6 You then cashed the ◆A. East showed out, revealing the 5-1 diamond break.
- T789 You continued by cashing out the three club winners. **AKQ**. West discarding a diamond on the third club.
- T10/11 West is now marked with an original distribution of 4=2=5=2. This allowed you to be sure that East had a starting shape of 3=4=1=5. So, you cashed dummy's YAQ, all following.
- T12 You then led dummy's ▼4. When East followed with the ▼9, you confidently covered this with the ▼T. winning!
- T13 The **▼K** was your 12th trick.



ABF Technology Project Update


MyABF has continued to grow and now has over 3,500 registered users. This is expected to grow as players enter the Gold Coast.

The next major release, planned for end 2021, is to offer clubs the facility to accept payments from players for club sessions via MyABF. After that, the next major releases planned are:

- personalised display of player results
- integrating Masterpoint centre functionality (also incorporating member management and invoicing)
- development of an in-house scoring module

Following consideration by the Technology Steering Committee and ABF Board the priority order of the last two items has been switched from the previous schedule (this is partly, but not wholly, due to the recent masterpoint centre outage problems). A technology audit by an external party has also been commissioned and will shortly commence.

Covid vaccination status declaration functionality is now set up on the Profile page. Players are encouraged to update their profile.
