This last month has been a very busy one with a lot of things moving very quickly. From the end of September when we received the abrupt news that brought an end to our efforts to move to Thomas St Chatswood, it was a mere four weeks before we relocated to The Willis.

# Introducing "The Willis"

The Willis Recreation and Sports Centre at 325A Eastern Valley Way is located on the corner of North Willoughby, Middle Cove and Castle Cove. It is a tennis club and mixed sports centre that is approximately 1km from our previous home of Club Willoughby.

NSBC previously operated out of The Willis under John McIlrath up until 2015. We moved out for a variety of reasons, chiefly the merger with Gordon Bridge Club and the availability of East Lindfield as a venue.

#### Why the move now?

It was clear that North Ryde RSL was not a popular venue with our members and hence we needed a different, hopefully long-term, solution. We had heard that The Willis had come under new management who had a good reputation in our community. When we approached them with a proposal, it became clear that we were a good fit for each other.

Some of you may have played there with us many years ago - it is now better than ever. Under new management that are proactive in their approach to giving NSBC a home, we are being well taken care of and seen as an important partner at the venue. We are excited about this new venue and the opportunity it represents, and we can tell that you are too with the opening launch booking out very quickly. As this issue goes to print, we are running our launch function and first session at The Willis (Wednesday 3 November).

- Central North Shore location close to the old Club Willoughby.
- ✓ Spacious and luxurious playing room with capacity for up to 30 tables.
- ✓ Plenty of on-site parking with bridge sessions at alternate times to tennis.

- Newly renovated Café and Bar coming soon so we can enjoy a cup of tea or a few drinks.

# The Willis (Anonymous)

For many years the North Shore Bridge Club (NSBC) operated with Club Willoughby as their main premises and with East Lindfield as a second site. In 1894 a visiting warlock played against John Mottram in a game of rubber bridge and when John dropped the warlock's singleton king offside to make a doubled grand slam, he placed a curse on the Club Willoughby premises. Since that fateful day members of NSBC have searched high and low for a new location in which to play bridge. The warlock's curse ran deep, and the task proved hard to complete, often being handed down from father to son and mother to daughter.

In the year 2020, the final strand of sinew holding the Clock Tower Roof of the Grand Card Room at Club Willoughby finally gave way and the last cards fell solemnly on to the damp carpet. It was finally over.

Fortunately, brave Sir Leo and King David had found another location. Deep in the Shire of Chatswood stood a grand Palace with ample room for bridge players, why the space was so abundant that the lords and ladies considered playing with six people per table.

The trip from Willoughby Vale to Chatswood was a long and arduous one, led by a young knight known only as Liam who came from a faraway land called "The Place That Seems to Send Us All Their Bridge Players". It was too far to make the trip in a single journey and so young Liam, ably assisted by Lady Margaret and her trusty steed Josh, set up a base camp at the holy shrine of North Ryde RSL.

Some claim that it was in fact a mythical wizard known as Mike (also from The Place That Seems to Send Us All Their Bridge Players) who started the journey to North Ryde and that he was following a map drawn by Sir Leo (who seemed to have gone in completely the wrong direction) but it is too long ago now to be sure. What is beyond doubt, however, is that when the music finally stopped and young Liam jumped into the nearest seat, he had most definitely won this game of musical chairs and was sitting entirely alone in a large dungeon in North Ryde RSL.

The warlocks curse had not been washed away along with the walls of Club Willoughby, it was following NSBC and its band of grumpy followers wherever they went. But what of King David of NSBC? The warlock had vanquished him to rule the Kingdom of Orange instead and his loyal followers back in Sydendom were gathering around the town crier Kevin "Hear Ye!" Davies to listen to his pronouncements. The words of wisdom and comfort raised the spirits of the lost souls of NSBC, and they determined to march onwards to Chatswood Shire and claim their entitlement.

The warlock had one final curse left, and he used it wisely. With his dying breath he whispered something that could hardly be made out, "... curse.. on visitors.. ignoring... danger." And with that he passed away. Gibberish like that is hard to understand and even harder to remember so it was shortened to COVID.

Yes, with his callous last words, the warlock had made bridge illegal and turned NSBC into an outlawed organisation.

With their game more endangered than a rubber bridge game in Double Bay and their King sent to the snow, it looked like the end for NSBC.

Young Liam staggered out of the ashes of North Ryde RSL, helped by Margaret, Josh, and Sir Leo. The sky was full and dark as Sir Leo helped Liam to get clear of the debris. "Don't worry Liam, we still have our dreams. We still have... Chatswood."

Just then King David appeared through the clouds as an apparition (well, he wasn't allowed to travel due to COVID). "Er... I was meaning to talk to you about that."

What now? The NSBC faithful search for answers and direction. Who better to lead them out of the wilderness than the very person who had got them lost in the first place. They turned to Sir Leo.

"In my youth I heard of a fine land. A land so pure that only those who seek perfection can enter through the gates of its grand car park."

"Where is it Sir Leo? Where should we go?" the crowd asked as one.

"I dare not say its name. Even a whisper, spoken too harshly, could bring it crumbling down."

"Not Club Willoughby again?"

"No, no. This is a place built of bricks and iron. Encased in gold and lit by shimmering diamonds. Forged in the fires of Mount Olympus and envied by the gods of all religions. And it's got a coffee shop."

"Sir Leo! What do you call this place?"

Sir Leo paused and looked meaningfully into the distance. "I call it... The Willis."

A lady at the back said "Oh, that's nice. I liked it when we used to play there."

The people around her bade her shush, "You'll ruin the story."

If you are looking for someone to play with on normal RealBridge sessions, please login to the session about **30 minutes** before start and type into the chat window "Director I would like a partner today, please" and wait in the lobby. The director will do their best to find you a partner. There is rarely a time we cannot accommodate those looking for a game.



#### Visitors and Guests are Welcome

Visitors and guests are very welcome, members can pay for a guest via their PP system just let the director know at the start of the session, that you will accept charge on your PP account for your guest. Guests and visitors can also pay directly online see Visitor Payments below.

General and Technical Help Please contact Gary Barwick on 0413 884 805 if you have technical issues or would like to know more about RealBridge and how it works. If it is your first time playing on RealBridge or you are trying to fix an existing issue, please call Gary earlier in the day and **not 5 minutes before the session starts** as I have more time to help you then B.

### Technical Help – Browsers iPad/Wi-Fi users

iPad users please use the **Safari browser** for the time being. PC/Mac users please use **Google Chrome** or **Microsoft Edge** as these are still the best performing of the browsers.

WIFI signal strength is the biggest issue I deal with. Please make sure you are not too far away from your WIFI modem when playing on RealBridge. While you might have a great Internet connection, however it can be compromised by weak WIFI signal within your home. If you do suffer from freezes or dropouts move closer to the modem first.

MacBook Support On the 1st of October one of the key root certificates that manages security on the Internet expired. The result of this certificate expiry meant that iMacs and MacBook's, that are about 6 years or more old, would receive security warnings when visiting the NSBC website, informing you that the site was possibly unsafe (it is totally safe). Even if you ignored these warnings you would still not be able to access RealBridge sessions, it would stop at a grey screen.

Apple being Apple, don't support computers or devices they make that are about five or so years old and therefore could not be bothered providing you with a new security certificate. In the short term there was not an easy fix to this but now there is another security certificate that can be downloaded and installed that will hopefully delay this problem for a few more years. I have tested it on my MacBook Pro from 2009 and it works fine. It is a little technical but not terribly difficult. If you have one of these affected Macs and would like some help making it go again feel free to contact me and I will step you through it.

How to Play Worse Bridge

Our newsletter is full of articles on how to improve your bridge. This isn't one of them. If I knew how to play bridge properly myself then maybe I could write one, but then we'd have to find a bad bridge player to take over from me, and every bridge player I have ever met thinks they are just one good session away from being World Champion, so that might not be too easy to do. Instead, this article is about ways to have fun. But (you are thinking) how can I use the words **Bridge** and **Fun** in the same sentence? Well, I didn't (Oops, I just did).

Bridge has something called Conventions, which the Americans have been trying to ban for decades but are alive and well here. A convention is a bid that doesn't mean exactly what it appears to mean. You are probably thinking, "Well, I don't play conventions. Our system is simple Standard American, with multi-2s, short club, inverted minors, Stayman, Transfers, Bergen, Roman Key Card, Cappelletti, Jacoby 2NT, splinters, Michaels and Unusual NT. Just like everybody else. Our system is so simple we don't even alert anything."

Even if you don't play some of that stuff, I bet you would open  $1 \ge 0$  on this hand:

**◆AKQ9 ♥ AKQJ ◆T9 ◆ 432** 

If you explained the basics of bridge to a human (i.e. not a bridge player) and asked them which suit they would like as trumps I doubt 1 in 100 would pick clubs. See, even the things you don't think are conventions, really are.

So having established that you already play conventions let's see if we can get you to play some new ones. Or as you may well end up thinking, having established that coffee is a drug, roll up your sleeve and let's see if we can find a good vein.

#### 1 No Trump

I'm going to start by going for something sacred. Who says 1NT has to be 15-17 or 15-18 points? Experts. What do they know about having fun, look at them, what a miserable bunch. Experts play a system called "*Expert Standard*" which the rest of us can't find out about, but is revealed to them when they make a contract on a squeeze and don't say "I was sure I was going off but East threw away a winning diamond, what an idiot!"

So let's mess about with your 1NT opening for a bit. Why don't you try playing 10-12 instead? I recommend only playing it when you aren't vulnerable, but if you are just trying it out then play it all the time to start with. I played it vulnerable all the way up to -1100 but you can keep going if you like.

What happens now is three things. First, you need to think a little bit more, it's not really more, it's just differently. If your partner opens 1NT 15-17 and you have a 10 count with no major, you will usually bid 3NT. If your partner could only have 10 points for their opening then you need 15 for 3NT. Same hands, just the other way around. You can play everything else exactly the same, you just need to count.

Secondly, you confuse the opponents. In fact, you confuse them even more than if you shouted "Snap!" and put your Ace of Clubs on their Ace of Hearts as you gathered up all of the cards. The biggest way you will confuse them is by passing with a 12 count when your partner has opened 1NT. Try it and see how often they decide to bid on nothing and end up 3 off at the two-level vulnerable.

But I have saved the biggest piece of good news for last. You get to bid much more often. It's no surprise that 10-point hands are more frequent than 15-point hands.

Is it a good idea? Probably not, or the experts would play it. Is it easy to play and fun? Absolutely.

If you do play this, then remember that a 1NT rebid by opener will now show 13-17 points and a 2NT rebid shows 18-19 (or split it up however you like, it is your system!).

If you want to have even more fun, try playing an escape system if the opponents double you (how rude!). SW1NE is a good option, it's by Bob Sebesfi, a fountain of cool conventions and regular at our club.

And for extra, extra fun, do a little upgrading and open this hand 1NT. Wait until you discuss the hands in the bar afterwards and tell everyone how the bidding went at your table!

#### TWERB

What about when the opponents open 2 strong. Do you put your cards on the table and tell everyone you'll be back in a bit and just pass for me when it is my turn? Do you sigh and says something about always sitting the wrong way? I never understand why people say that, if they were sitting the wrong way then they would be facing away from the table and they wouldn't know what was going on.

What about bidding something? Yes, you stand to be short on points, but you will often have some shape. I'm sure if you have seven diamonds to the AK you probably already know to bid over 2, but wouldn't it be nice to bid more often. What if you could say to your partner and the table "I have a long suit or maybe even two suits, but I'm not telling you what they are yet."

Welcome to TWERB (Two-Way Exclusion Relay Bids). Even the name is more fun than Cappelletti. Here is how it works. Bidding a suit shows the next suit up or BOTH other suits. Bidding NT shows two non-touching suits (the pointy ones or the round ones, although they all actually have pointy bits so you can sound like an expert and call them the **Odd** suits.).

For example, over the opponents 2 de opening, 2H shows either long Spades OR Clubs and Diamonds. The only thing you won't have is Hearts (hence the exclusion part of TWERB). Now, while the opponents are spitting coffee everywhere and picking up their cards off the floor, your partner just bids 2 de, pass or correct. For even more fun, if the bidding comes around to you and you have both minors, just put on your poker face and pass. Your opponents will miss 6 de but you'll have to help the director search for the mythical Psyche Register that they are supposed to write you up in. Well worth it.

#### **Brown Sticker**

Q: What is brown and sticky? A: A Stick

No, a convention without an anchor suit, a.k.a. a **brown sticker convention**. The fun police have had a serious go at getting rid of these, but you can still play them in clubs in Australia, which is funny because they are considered too difficult for experts

so the Americans have succeeded in getting them banned from a lot of world level events.

If you don't have an anchor then your boat could float away but in bridge we just mean that your bid doesn't promise a known suit. If you play them, then you need to pre-alert the opponents for no apparent reason before you start to play and you have to put a little brown sticker on your convention card which is nice.

My favourite "BS" conventions are RCOs and Comic NT. Rank Colour Odd (RCO) opening bids show the three combinations of two suited hands. For example, you can play that 2◆ shows Rank (majors or minors), 2♥ shows Colour (red or black) and 2♠ shows the odd suits (don't call them pointy and round, you'll sound silly). Now partner just bids pass or correct or can make a forcing bid with NT.

Comic NT is an overcall of 1NT that shows either a real NT overcall (15-18) or a 'comic' overcall which is a weak 2 in an unknown suit other than the one the enemy just bid before you.

So, how is TWERB not a BS convention? Well, the Queensbury Rules say that if the opponents use a convention, then it is gloves off, you can do anything. And the best thing... If the opponents open 2 strong and artificial and you have long diamonds, then not only does your partner not have to alert your 3 bid; they actually aren't allowed to.

So have fun, with these and many other conventions that you can find on the Internet or in the paper bin of any bridge club.

But I forgot, you don't play conventions, and definitely not Brown Sticker conventions.

Just remind me, when you open 2 as a multi-2, which one is your anchor suit again?



#### Eight sometimes, Nine sometimes?

Plan your play in 3NT with the hands shown below. You are playing in a **team game** that is scored by IMPs. The opening lead is the **\*5**.

South's rebid shows a balanced hand too strong for a 1NT opening and not strong enough to open 2NT. Using 15–17 1NT openers, the 2NT rebid shows 18-19 high-card points. Notice that South skipped over the spades. I usually advocate showing your major on the one level but make an exception with opener's 2NT rebid.

With a game-going hand, responder still has room to show a four-card major. The only time a major suit will be missed is when responder is very weak and passes opener's highly invitational 2NT rebid. With that weak a hand, however, responder will frequently bid a four-card major the first time. North carries on to game, hoping that the long diamond suit will be a source of tricks in 3NT.

When planning your play in notrump, count winners. You have two hearts, two diamonds and two clubs in top tricks. Three more tricks must be developed. The diamond suit offers the chance to build the needed

tricks. The guestion is how to play the suit. The •Q is missing. Should you bang down the ace and king, playing for the queen to drop - or should you finesse?

The bridge maxim "eight ever, nine never" may come to mind. You have nine diamonds between your hand and dummy, so the saving suggests playing for the  $\diamond Q$  to drop. (With eight or fewer cards in the suit, the saying advises the finesse.)

Bridge maxims are often good advice, but they don't replace logical thinking. What if the +Q doesn't fall under the ace or king? You can lead a third diamond to drive it out, but you will find yourself looking at those diamond tricks you worked so hard to develop sitting in dummy with no way to reach them. Entries are very important when developing a long suit. Once you recognize that, you might opt to take the finesse to assure your contract as long as both opponents follow to the first trick. The full deal:

Cashing the **K** and finessing the **J** ensures your contract, but on this occasion, you end up making an overtrick.

Recall that the form of scoring is IMPs. Overtricks are nice at any form of scoring, but at IMPs the reward is very small. One undoubled overtrick will translate into a gain of 1 IMP at best. While some team matches are won by a single IMP, many more are lost when one team makes a game that went down at the other table.

It's not so simple when you are playing in a pairs game. In that setting, even 10 extra points can mean several match points — the difference between an average score and a top. But is it worth it when you could go down?

My advice is that when you (the newcomer or intermediate) play in a pairs game, look for safe overtricks but don't risk your contract for them. When you get better and play in a field of experts, you might occasionally risk your contract to go for an overtrick.

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# **Our Game of Bridge**




**Defence in Detail** Accurate Defence is the hardest part of our game. A series of artiicles written for the GC Newsletter by our Manager. Liam Milne

Sometimes every option looks bad. But some options might be better than others. Sitting West with no one vulnerable, you pick up these cards:

#### **★ 2 ♥ KT852 ♦ A63 ★** KJ93

You and your partner have an aggressive auction to push the opponents into slam:



- 1. Strong
- 2. Pre-emptive
- 3. Hard to judge.

Against  $6_{\bullet}$ , you decide to lead the  $\mathbf{v5}$  from your partnership's suit. Dummy follows with the  $\mathbf{v9}$ , partner covers with the  $\mathbf{vJ}$  and declarer wins the  $\mathbf{vA}$ .

T2, Declarer puts the  $\diamond Q$  on the table. As you win the  $\diamond A$ , partner follows with the  $\diamond 7$ . Playing reverse count, your partner's card is consistent with both singleton  $\diamond 7$  and doubleton  $\diamond T7$ .

You are now faced with an awkward choice of plays. How do you reward partner's aggressive bidding to beat this contract?

A heart seems unlikely to be right. Given that partner holds at least five hearts for his athletic leap to the five level, a heart will either be a ruff in dummy or a ruff and discard. Declarer will then be in the dummy to cash a diamond if partner holds the  $\bullet$ T.

A spade will stop any such ruff, but might pick up partner's trump holding.


A diamond will work just fine if partner's •7 was singleton. If not, declarer will get a discard plus a dummy entry to take a possible trump finesse.

A club will be excellent if partner turns up with the ace, passive if partner has the queen, and will cost a trick if partner has nothing in the suit.

It seems to come down to whether we think declarer or partner has the singleton diamond. Declarer might have passed 6+ with +QT, but partner might not have found this 5\* bid without some sort of shape.

Declarer's bidding strongly suggests most of the high cards, including solid spades and the  $\clubsuit A$ . If declarer has the last diamond, the only play to beat him will be to give partner his ruff before declarer draws trumps and claims. The downsides of the diamond play are limited: given declarer's likely solid trump suit, either the  $\clubsuit 9$  or a heart ruff are likely to get declarer over to dummy to cash a diamond if he needs a trick there. Visions of a trump finesse are likely a mirage.

The full deal:



At the table, West switched to trumps after winning the A hoping that declarer had a singleton diamond. Declarer quickly collected the rest. Full marks to declarer for putting maximum pressure on the defence; drawing trumps first would have made it easier for West to duck the A on the first round.

When this hand was played at a weekend congress, 7 tables played in 6 of which 4 made it. 3 tables found 6, making each time (only beatable on a club lead from East). The remaining 19 tables played in game. Amazingly, two tables went down in 4 lindeed, if you returned a diamond at trick three, partner ruffs and plays a trump holding declarer to nine tricks.

**Point to remember:** when everything looks bad, weigh up the possible cost of each play. Some plays might work out less badly when they are wrong compared to other possibilities which will immediately destroy your chances.

# The **Bidding**

After the North's 1NT (one-round force), his jump rebid of 3♠ showed a limit raise with three-card support. You bid on to game and West starts with the ♥Q. How do you like your chances in 4♠?

# **Preliminary Analysis**

Winners: 2 + 1 + 1 + 2 = 6. Lots of work Losers: None but deep 4, 7, 4Strategies to make 10 tricks

- Ruff 3<sup>rd</sup> Heart on Table with short trumps
- Set up the Clubs for an extra trick
- Set up the diamonds for an extra trick

After West's heart lead at trick one, you paused to consider how you might make ten tricks. Clearly, you needed trumps to be 3-2. If North held the ◆T instead of the 7 or 4, declarer would have relied on diamonds to make an extra trick. However, the actual suit offered only about one chance in four of being played for two tricks and one loser. You therefore turned your attention to setting up a long club for your 10<sup>th</sup> trick, a better three-in-five proposition.

# **Your Solution**

- T1 West starts with the ♥Q which you duck (♥2, ♥3 (encouraging signal), ♥4
- T2 West continues ♥J which you win in Hand ♥A
- T3 You start on your club set-up strategy,  $\bigstar$ 8,  $\bigstar$ 5,  $\bigstar$ A,  $\bigstar$ 3
- T4 You ruff a club back to hand **♣2**, **♣6**, **<u>♠3</u>, <b>♣9**
- T5 Next you cash the high trump <u>A</u>
- T6 Then the high  $\underline{\bullet K}$ , all following.
- T7 You then followed by cashing the ♣K, discarding a low diamond from hand.
- T8 You are pleased to see that the clubs were 4-3, so you ruffed a second club in hand.West choosing not to over-ruff
- T8 A heart ruff returned you to dummy,

Making 4. The full deal:

T9 Where you called for the established ♣7, and discarded a second diamond from hand.

All the defenders made was a trump, a heart and a diamond.

# **Preliminary Analysis**

Winners 5 + 3 = 8 tricks Losers: 1 + 2 + 3 = 8 tricks Strategies for 10 tricks:

- Ruff ♥ loser 1 extra
- Find **AK** and make a **-** almost impossible!
- End play in clubs, to get opponents to open Diamond suit or ruff sluff discard!

# **Your Solution**

- T1 West starts the defence with the lead of the ♥J, you (Declarer) win with dummy's ♥A
- T23 You then drew all outstanding trumps with the <u>▲AK</u>
- T4 You then cashed the <u>♥KQ</u>, pitching a club♣T from table.
- T6 You then ruffed the losing ♥4 in dummy <u>◆8</u>.
- T7 You exited with the remaining club ♣J, which was won by East with ♣A, you dropping the ♣Q from hand, voiding both hands of clubs. East relied on his partner to give him accurate count in the suit. After West signalled an odd number of clubs,

East decided to believe that the **♣Q** was a singleton.

- T8 So, East shifted and cashed the <u>◆A</u>, partner encouraging.
- T9 East continued another diamond ◆2. West took the second diamond with his ◆K
- T10 West exited with the ♦9. You claimed the balance, making 10 tricks: five trumps, three hearts, a heart ruff and a diamond.

If East had exited with a club at trick eight instead of a diamond, declarer would have thrown a diamond from hand (short diamonds) and ruffed in dummy. As a result, he would have lost only two diamonds and a club, also making his contract.

Note that there would have been no happy ending for declarer if West had led a club at trick one as no end play is then possible.

### The Bidding

The auction was the same at both tables in a teams match. The play at both tables began in the same way:

T1-2 West cashed the **VAK** 

T3 West then shifted to the ♣K, taken by the ♣A on table.

# **Preliminary Analysis**

Winners: 4**♦**+2**♦**+1**♣** 

Top Losers: **VAK** cashed, deep diamonds

# **Your Solution**

T4 You continued with a  $\diamond 5$  to the  $\diamond A$  in hand,

T5 You then led the **◆9** to dummy's **◆T** – both EW following suit

- T6 You then played another diamond toward your hand, which seems to be recommended practice on deals of this type. But East, discarded C3 and South won with the DK.
- T7 You then ruffed a diamond D2 with the AJ
- T8 You then returned to hand with a trump ◆5 to ruff a second diamond in dummy. East again discarded a heart and now you as declarer could only make two remaining trumps for a one-trick set.

When your team-mates came back to the table, the result on this board was a **12 Imp loss**. They were playing against an expert declarer, and they claimed there was nothing they could have done to defeat the contract.

- T4 At the other table, the expert declarer also led a diamond to the A.
- T5 However, instead of playing a trump, declarer tried to cash the ♦K. East ruffed in with the <u>♦2.</u>
- T6 East then played another club. The expert Declarer ruffed this with the <u>▲9</u>
- T7 Then ruffed a diamond in dummy with the  $\underline{\bullet T}$ .
- T8 Next, declarer returned to his hand via a low trump to the <u>◆Q</u>
- T9 Then he ruffed another diamond with the <u>▲J</u>, thereby establishing two long diamond tricks in hand.
- T10+Now declarer drew the remaining defensive trumps with the <u>**◆AK**</u> and claimed the rest of the tricks.

He made four trumps, three diamonds, two diamond ruffs and the ♣A for a total of 10 tricks. The full deal:

You are sitting East in a match point event at the club. You pick up a monster 26Hcp and 2-3 loser hand. You open with a GF  $2 \pm$ ,  $2 \bullet$  (waiting), and you show your hearts, and partner raises to  $3 \checkmark$ . You cue  $3 \pm$ expressing slam interest and partner cues  $4 \bullet$ . You check on keycards (1 - must have  $\checkmark$ K), and you need to place the contract. You can count 12 top tricks, with  $\pm$ T a likely 13<sup>th</sup>.

At pairs I would try 7NT (or at least 7♥). South leads ♥5 and Dummy tracks

### **Preliminary analysis**

Winners: 3♠+5♥+3♦+1♣=12 one short Losers None

Strategies for the 13th Trick

- Spades break 33 or **AJ** drops early I extra trick
- Spades long with North, Finesse &J
- **♣K** falls singleton (Pitch **▲**T on the **♣**Q)
- K is held by the opponent with long spades and can be squeezed out of a trick

South starts the defence of your 7NT contract by leading the ♥5 (safe neutral lead)

- T1 South leads ♥5, You win this in hand, preserving your limited entries to dummy.
- T2/3 You cash two top Spades, getting the bad news that South has the length in spades. Now only
   ♣K drops and the squeeze option are left to make the contract!
- T4 You cash ♣A, but no ♣K falls. That leaves only the squeeze for your contract.
- T5-8 You cash the 4 high hearts, your full attention is on South. He discards, a spade (keeping **▲J9**) a club and a diamond.
- T9-10 You cash the **AQ** (south following)
- T11 You lead the 3<sup>rd</sup> diamond to the ♦K, and south is squeezed. He has to keep the ♣K, as you are now on Table. And discards another spade!

T12+ You cash ♠Q, Dropping the now singleton ♠J and then cash the ♠T for contract. 7NT bid and made for a top board!

You as an EW player

- You have to be in 7 to score well,
- a small slam to get an average,
- else a poor scores.

The squeeze end position, after you have cashed **all outstanding free winners**, with just 3 cards left in each hand, as you lead the **>7** towards dummy's singleton **>K** 

North ..does not matter West: ♠Q, ♠8, ♦K East ♠QT, ♦7 South has ♣K, ♠J9

South must keep  $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{K}$  as you are entering dummy, which holds  $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{Q}$  (Treat Card)and is squeezed out of his Spade guard as he must discard a spade. Hence you know the  $\mathbf{A}\mathbf{J}$  will now fall!


