


A Pretty Good Slam, Considering

The committee is up and running, with plenty of things happening. I'd like to **thank Carol McMurray** and **Jane Russ** again for all of their help last year, and to welcome **Robyn Rogers** and **Helen Stewart** to the committee for this year. I haven't got nicknames for either of them yet, which prevents me from writing much about the committee this month.

So instead, here is a hand for you. Normally the hands I share are disasters, but this one goes to the next level. First, we'll look at it from partner's side of things.

Playing IMP teams, vul against non-vul you pick up this:



In an uncontested auction, right hand opponent passes, and you open 1♥. So far so good. Partner bids 1♠ and you respond 3♥. Maybe playing Standard American you would choose a different bid, but you are playing **Precision** which makes 3♥ fairly automatic. Your partner seems to like hearts and bids 4♦, showing slam interest and a first or second round control in diamonds, not surprisingly denying a control in clubs.

What now?

Maybe it is a bit cowardly, but you have seen your partner's hands before when they make a slam try and you decide to sign off in 4 .

Partner is bouncing up and down in their chair still and your sign off doesn't affect them. They reply $5 \blacklozenge$.

What on earth is going on?

Partner must have some absolute monster of a hand, where they can almost work out your cards from the fact you have shown about 15 high card points and they have most of the rest of them in their hand.


Partner was always going to six of something but is probing you to see if you can get to seven. You have a very nice hand in context and the clubs are a given. Partner must have the Av as he hasn't tried to use Roman Keycard which was an option available after 4. You could bid 6. to show the ace and king but partner probably already knows about those. The JA could be the missing information that gets you to 7NT. You bid 5 , confident that partner will understand what you are saying. Of course, you could just bid 7NT yourself, but torturing partners is your main pleasure in life. Partner bids 6 and you realise that something probably went wrong a few rounds of bidding ago. You pass.

At least you won't have to play it and you'll have a few minutes to work out what to shout at your partner about first. Though of course you won't do that because you are far too nice.

Now let's go over to the other side of the table and see what happened there.



Counting points can take ages, but it only takes a few seconds to work out that this is a fourloser hand. You plan to start by bidding spades and then to bid diamonds until you get to game, or partner supports one of your suits.

Amazingly, partner opens 1♥. You didn't expect that, but now you can go slowly. You start with 1♠. Partner bids 3♥ showing a Max 15 hcp hand. This is going very well.

You are pretty sure that bidding four of a minor when you could have bid 3NT is Minorwood – Roman Keycard in a minor. So, you bid $4 \\le and$ partner responds $4 \\le$. That is one step which shows **one or four** keycards (a keycard being one of the four aces or the Kle).

You are trying to work out if partner could have a hand with about 15 HCPs but only one keycard (*They could. Imagine* ♥AKQJ ♣KQ). That takes even longer than counting your own points, so you give up and just bid 5 ♦ which is pass or correct. With all four keycards partner will go on.

Partner bids 5▲.

You ask for a review of the auction, hopeful that one of the opponents will explain the bidding for you. They are both very good players, and very polite, but they have no more idea than you about what is going on.

It seems like you should be in a slam and if partner does have only one keycard, you are already going off. Better to go off in a major than a minor so you bid 6 .

Here is the bidding one more time from souths prespective:

T1 Your left-hand opponent leads the **T**^{*} and you are a little surprised by dummy. Not what you expected, and only one keycard.

"Thank you partner. Nice bidding." Remember this is a team's match so you are going to have to score up with your teammates and explain why you've got a negative score when 3NT is cold. You have already used your two main excuses on previous rounds – "a couple of revokes happened" and "they pushed us to the six level". This one might be a bit harder.

Anyway, you are going to have to play it.

Here is the whole hand:

The good player on your left sniffed out the heart void that you don't have so didn't lead the **A** obviously.

- T1 You win the <u>A</u> on the table
- T2 You play a <u>K</u>♣ to discard your heart loser
 4♥. So far, so good.
- T3 Now you take the diamond finesse winning with the $Q \bullet$
- T4 Then ruff a $3 \\in dummy \underline{4}$.
- T5 You play the <u>J</u> and they hold up the ace, so you can't get back to your hand,
- T6 So, you theatrically ruff $K \neq$ with the <u>2</u>.
- T7 Play another trump K.

There is nothing your poor opponents can do now to stop you making 6 as the diamonds & spades all come good.

Normally bridge players feel quite good after making a slam but this auction has left you feeling like you need a shower. Your opponents are unperturbed. What are a few IMPs on one board if they get to play another eight boards against people who bid like that. Rubber bridge anyone?

They pummelled us on the other boards of course.

We explain our "victory" to our teammates.

"Not many people bid slams knowing they are missing 3 keycards. And very rarely in a different suit to the one that was agreed."

"Still, you managed to convince them not to lead either of their aces, and the trumps and diamonds both broke 3-3 with the K♦ on side. A pretty good slam, considering."

Sue Crompton discusses "Unauthorised Information" in our game of bridge

This week I am going to talk about **unauthorised information**. At the bridge table sometimes, things go wrong.

You open 2NT for the minors this doesn't get alerted and now partner bids 3 ◆ (thinking he is transferring to hearts) You doesn't alert this as this is suit preference. One thing I see a lot is partner will grimace or even announce this is a strong bid or minors. So, when things go haywire try not to react and just bid according to your system. The opponents will more than likely call the director and he/she will sort it out.

Another situation that happens quite frequently is when your partner hesitates for what seems like an eternity. You had already planned what you were going to bid but now things are far more complicated.

I was directing and playing in and I had bid and my partner took a long time to bid. I then made my bid and Margaret said do you acknowledge there was a long hesitation and I said yes I do. (Sometimes players don't agree there has been hesitation please call the director and he/she will sort)

I looked at my hand and said "I'm not entirely sure I have my bid" she said "don't worry it's a friendly Saturday afternoon game". I said "No we need to play to the rules". But I was directing so I said let me ring Dave Weston and let him make the ruling. Margaret said "Well that's not fair as you cook him yummy meals and he will be on your side" I laughed as yes I do cook him yummy meals, but I know Dave and he will give the correct ruling. He looked at the hand and said you don't have your bid. So, my top score now was taken but to a bottom 😂. So, I know it is hard but try to bid in tempo as the rules are very strict if you take a long time to bid it makes it much harder for your partner to bid. It doesn't mean they cannot bid it is just a lot more difficult.
