Another Story



NSWBA Price Increases

As you may already know from the latest NSWBA Transition Project update, a decision has been made to **not sell the premises at Goulburn St**. While many members may welcome this decision, it is important for members to understand that NSWBA is running at a loss. Despite some improvement since COVID, we are still a long way short of being financially sustainable. In addition to the increased cost pressures felt by many other organisations, we also must deal with a reduced membership base that was already declining prior to COVID and has not recovered to pre-COVID levels since. Currently, we are running down our cash reserves.

We therefore need to take some actions. First, the NSWBA Council has decided to increase **2024 table fees** across all session types.



SBC Members prices for duplicate sessions will increase to **\$16** (\$13 for concessions)



NSWBA championship sessions will increase to **\$22 - \$24** depending on the event.

Price rises for visitors, supervised play, workshops and all other state events have also been approved. These price rises will come into effect on **1 November 2023**.

We understand however that many of our members are also facing cost of living pressures, so have decided not to increase annual membership fees for 2024 notwithstanding a **\$10 increase** in the annual State Affiliation fees.

These price rises will help improve SBC's financial outlook but will still not be enough to achieve financial stability. We are therefore also looking at other initiatives to improve the bottom line, including attracting and retaining new players and finding ways to make better use of our space in the city premises. These ideas will take some time to implement. You will not see any changes to the premises for some time yet, but when these options have been fully investigated, we will share the plans and gather feedback from members.

Our club has a lot to offer – a great city location, accessible by multiple public transport routes and modes, opportunities for learning and simply having fun and most importantly, a very welcoming community of bridge playing members.

We thank you for your on-going support, and hope you understand that these changes are necessary for our club to succeed and thrive. We

FAQs and John Scudder's Perspective

There is a lot going on at NSW Bridge Association (NSWBA) and you might ask yourself, "What does this all mean? And how is this going to affect me?" The project team, together with Council, is dedicating the next two newsletters to answering your questions. This update focusses on explaining the NSWBA Transition Project, while the next update will focus on the Extraordinary General Meeting to be held on 6 November 2023.

About the Transition Project

Please find a list of Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) and their answers here. This list aims to address many of the requests for information we have received. However, we have asked John Scudder, Chairman of the NSWBA, for his perspective and some more in-depth explanation.

Q: What is happening with the NSWBA Transition Project? Where are we at?

A: The Transition Project has been going on for some time, definitely longer than anticipated. Turns out the project is quite complex. It is not just about separating the current functions of the NSWBA but also about setting up the new organisations and improving our skill set and volunteer base. It is exciting to see a number of great people, with relevant experience and commitment, putting up their hand to volunteer and lead us through the restructure.

To date much of the work has been happening in the background – we are in the final stages of agreeing how to separate. I am pleased to report that this is happening very much in a collaborative spirit, with trust and goodwill from all parties. Both groups, one representing the Club and one representing Bridge NSW (the new name of the NSW peak body for bridge), are mindful that their success depends in part on the other's success.

Shortly we will be in a position to share the transition roadmap, with more detail. Knowledge transfer is already in full swing.

Q: We understand that Council is committed to the separation, yet we hear lots of rumours and different stories? Can you explain why we are doing this?

A: Many people don't appreciate the financial pressure the NSWBA is under. There is a false sense of security, that we can continue just as we always have, that we don't need to change. The reality is, we are losing money.

Let me explain our current circumstances, and to do that best we need to revisit history:

The NSWBA was established in 1963, as a state association and a bridge club, with the main object to promote bridge.

On the bridge club side we acquired the Sydney Bridge Club in 1982 and the Sydney Bridge Centre in 2015 which ensured successful club operations for a long time.

On the state association side we focussed initially on establishing competitions and events, very successfully I might add, e.g. just think about our outstanding ANC record. However, over the last two decades we also welcomed an increasing number of new bridge clubs in the state, requiring representation and support from their state body. Today we have over 150 clubs that are affiliated with the NSWBA making us the

largest state association for the ABF. In fact we represent about 1/3 of the ABF membership.

Like most bridge bodies across Australia, we have experienced a decline in members, table numbers, and events attendance. The pandemic has dramatically accelerated this. To put this into stark numbers, NSWBA club table numbers recovered after Covid and have been stable for months now, but are still less than 50% of where they were before the pandemic. At the same time, costs are going up for everything. This affects not only our NSWBA club, but all our affiliated clubs.

This has made it very clear to Council that action must be taken. We can no longer afford to put our head in the sand and just ignore the facts. However, our current structure of being a state body and a club with different stakeholders makes this too complex. Therefore this transition project is setting up both organisations for the future.

Q: Can you share more details about the decline in player numbers?

A: I am happy to share table numbers for the Sydney Bridge Centre, the NSWBA club in 162 Goulburn St. In the financial year 2017/2018 we had 6,833 tables and in FY2018/19 we had 6,654 tables. Then a complete collapse during Covid, no surprise there. We have seen great recovery from those years, but the latest figures for this financial year are a total of just 3,174 tables. This is more than a 50% decline! We cannot continue with the same cost structure with fewer than half the players.

Q: Won't the increase in member fees and affiliated club fees prevent the need for other change?

A: The recent price increases are only part of the necessary changes, but will still not be enough to make us profitable. That is essential for budget improvement, yes, but does not address underlying issues including a reduced pipeline of new players, the low useage of our large and expensive inner-Sydney property, and that bridge is not being actively promoted and positioned as a mind sport. Q: Where can NSWBA members, representatives from affiliated clubs and NSW bridge players find more information?

A: I encourage everyone to read the communications we are providing and attend one of the Town Halls we are planning (online or in person). Most importantly, reach out to any of the proxy board members to see how passionate and committed they are and learn directly why they want this Transition Project to be a success. And Always ask questions!

Everything about the EGM

Members of the NSWBA have recently received an invitation to an Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM) on 6 November to vote on two motions.

We have again sat down for a Q&A, this time with John Scudder (Chairman of the NSWBA) and Mary Anne Loveridge (Chair of the Club Proxy Board).

About the EGM – Interview with JohnScudder

Q: Members of the NSWBA have been invited to an EGM. Can you explain what this means and why do we need this?

John: A request from 5% of members to put a motion has been received. Therefore, Council is required to call an Extraordinary General Meeting (EGM).

Some members are concerned about the coming changes to the NSWBA. They have submitted a motion which aims to modify our constitution.

Q: You have proposed an alternative motion. Why?

John: The Council understands the disquiet of members and while we have repeatedly stated

that there is no intention to sell the premises, it seems this is insufficient. I would like to state: even if Council were to endorse a decision that changes the business model of NSWBA, such as selling our premises, it is inconceivable that we would do so without gaining approval from our members. All Councillors would agree with me on this.

The EGM and the motion, as submitted by members, seeks to alter the existing constitution and enshrine the need for a 75% majority approval for even considering the sale of the property. Now, handcuffing the Council (or a board) is not normal practice for any company and would dramatically limit our ability to conduct business in the best interest of the organisation. Even more problematic is, it will forever ensure that a minority of members can inhibit the wishes of the majority. It is my personal opinion, particularly in the context of the emotional tone of this debate (which seems to ignore facts and constructive discourse) that this clause would be impossible to remove, no matter how dire the need.

Motion 1 is therefore a compromise, giving a direction to Council to not even consider a sale of the property for two years. This would not alter the constitution and limit the handcuffs to two years. That said, most Councillors disagree with Motion 1 as well, because it would hinder due diligence and proper governance by a future Council or Club board.

Q: So why the discussion about potentially needing to sell the Goulburn St property?

John: There is a lot of misinformation out there, and I am happy to share where I think the rumours might be stemming from.

Let me be clear: the Council never passed a motion to sell the property. During a strategic review workshop in 2022 a recommendation was made to accept an attractive offer. It appears that this has been interpreted as a decision to sell.

Since then Council has undertaken further due diligence and considered a range of alternatives. I am pleased to report that the Transition Committee and the Proxy Boards have found a solution, allowing the property to be retained in its current form without incurring significant losses and risk insolvency.

About the EGM – Interview with Mary Anne Loveridge

Q: We hear that there has been a breakthrough on the separation discussions, what is happening?

Mary Anne: The two proxy boards have come up with a plan for how NSWBA could split into two organisations, which maximises the chance of both entities succeeding in the future. It has been great to work with the State Proxy Board – they understand what is important to us, and I think we really get them. We both understand why we need each other. We need a healthy bridge community in NSW, and we won't have that if we are not successful.

Under the plan, the Club will have full use of the Goulburn Street property, with the exception of a set number of days for State events, which the club is pleased to host. Bridge NSW, the new State organisation, will have sufficient funds to create a peak body that will promote Bridge across NSW, and enable it to give a level of support to players and clubs across the state.

The plan was put to the NSWBA Council and has been endorsed. This is exciting - we've been looking forward to this milestone, and I'm pleased to see progress at last. For those of us who have worked on this for months, the separation is now feeling achievable. We look forward to getting it done and focussing on activities that really benefit members.

Q: Does this mean that the club is now financially out of the woods?

Mary Anne: No, it doesn't. While our table numbers have improved since the lows of COVID, they're still less than half what they were before COVID. The recent price rises will help, but won't be enough by themselves. In addition to this, under the Separation Agreement, the club will own the premises and take on its running costs. We will still need to do a lot of work in the next few years to turn around the fortunes of the

club. I am optimistic we will do it with the help of skilled volunteers, good management and the support of members.

Q: Will we have to sell the club premises?

Mary Anne: To repeat, there is absolutely no plan to sell the premises. Under the separation agreement, the Club will have full use of 162 Goulburn St in perpetuity, and we will need to make sure that we really do get the most out of it. The Club proxy board has some ideas on how we can increase our membership and gradually add more playing sessions. These will take some time to work through, but I remain optimistic for the future of the Club – and that will be easier for us if Bridge NSW is successful too.

Q: If we don't have to sell the club premises, why are we having an EGM to vote on this?

Mary Anne: The EGM is NOT a vote on whether or not to sell the premises.

The first motion is designed to make it difficult for the board to even explore selling for the next two years, independent of changing circumstances. This motion does not get in the way of any current plans, but it does mean that there are circumstances where the board will be restricted in its ability to act in the best interest of the company (its fiduciary duty), e.g. financial stress or a lucrative opportunity to upgrade. It also means that the will of 25% of members will take precedence over the will of the majority.

The second motion would modify the NSWBA constitution to make it virtually impossible to sell in any circumstance, unless we received approval from more than 75% of voting members – so again, the will of 25% of members will take precedence over the will of the majority. I have even bigger concerns with motion 2, as this motion alters the constitution and therefore has no end date – it is permanent.

You may or may not be aware that Councillors can be held personally liable for breaches of their fiduciary duties. You are probably also not aware that the Council and others have received threats of legal action where a member is seeking to challenge decisions. As a volunteer on the board, this is serious - there may be consequences for my family should such a threat come to fruition. My willingness to work hard toward this separation and help the club is based on working constructively with like-minded people as are currently volunteering on the two Proxy Boards. What we have achieved to date is rewarding, and I trust that we can garner the support of members to deliver on our plans.

Q: How should I vote in the EGM?

Mary Anne: If either motion passes, there's a good chance we'll have trouble attracting and retaining high quality board members to help steer the club through this significant change. Motion 1 is the less draconian of the two as it does not alter the constitution and will expire, but it will still make it more difficult to run the club. I think people should make up their own mind, but if you trust the future board which you elect to do the right thing, then vote NO to both motions.

Following consultation with NSWBA legal Counsel, the State Proxy Board, and the Club Proxy Board, the majority of Councillors recommend that members Vote NO for Motion 1 and Vote NO for Motion 2. Keep reading to understand why.
