MASTERS OF BRIDGE

An interview with leading Bridge Players

	Giselle Mundell
How Long have you been Playing Bridge	I started playing in 1982 (42 years as a player)
How Many Master Points have you earned	Gold – 2295, Red – 1117, Green - 454
While you have a lot of Master Points you have more Red and Gold Points than Green – why is that?	I mainly enter state and National events and it takes longer to earn Green Points
In which tournaments have you had the most success in last 5 years. Which events have you represented Club/State/Australia	In October this year I was successful in the inaugural Giselle Mundell Stein Mixed Pairs event at the Spring Nationals with Andrew Peake and my team made the final of the Open Teams category. I represented Australia's women's team at the World Championships in 2019 and again in 2021. My team was runner-up in the Grand National Open Teams (GNO) final in 2023. Won the Victorian Champions Cup (VCC) Mixed Pairs in 2023 with Andrew Peake

What Conventions do you use when Bidding over and above the 5 Standard Conventions	Play transfer responses over 1 Club, and a Variant of Michael's Cue Bid. Overall my system is reasonably simple.
WRT Bidding which approach would you suggest for players with less than 300 MP's	Honestly I would recommend to both groups to keep it simple.
Defense is about 50% of the game what tips would give to players to handle this part of the game	Defense is very important and getting a feel for the point count and distribution in each hand will take you a long way.
What Conventions do you use for Defense/How do you approach defense	I listen to the bidding very carefully. The weaker my hand the more aggressively I lead. The stronger my hand the more passive my lead.
For New, Rookie and Restricted Players what errors do you most commonly see. How should they correct them.	Most importantly do not bid your hand twice. Partner sees your bid and hopefully will respond accordingly. Very important to remember which cards have already been played.
What do you see as the best ways for players to improve their game	Read as many bridge books as you can and try to watch good players on BBO
Do you try to work out what cards your opponents have <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. During Bidding b. After the first lead How do you do that	Yes, I do both, and as the hand progresses I gain further information to better recognise the cards and points each player has. I do this by concentration and memory – training myself over the years has led me to be successful in this area
Any other thoughts/questions you would add?	The hardest part of the game is to find a partner you can trust and gel. Mutual respect is vital for success.

EXTEND YOUR BRIDGE KNOWLEDGE

EXTENDING ON THE FIVE ESSENTIAL CONVENTIONS - Stayman, Transfers, Strong 2 Clubs, Blackwood and Pre-Empts

Splinter Bids - Dorothy Truscott is usually credited with having developed the idea of Splinter Bids in the 60's. She was a winner of four World Championships and the top ranked woman internationally for many years. Many years prior to that time however Lt. Col. Beasley playing England in the first World Championship in 1933 against the Ely Culbertson's American team made a bid unlike the modern splinter bid eventually reaching Slam on a combined 22 point

A splinter bid gives partner some additional information about a good hand. It also uses a bid which is not used for anything else, a double jump in a new suit over a major suit opening by partner.

For example:

Opener 1S or	Response (Partner) 4C, 4D, 4H
Opener 1H	Response (Partner) 3S 4C, 4D

Each of these Responses are Splinter bids. They show a game force raised in partners major as well as a singleton or void in the suit bid by you. as partner.

To make a Splinter bid you need to have the following type of hand:

- a) You have at least 4 card support for partners bid suit
- b) You have 13-15 points (including distribution points)
- c) You have a void or singleton in the suit you have bid

Splinter bids are particularly useful in ensuring you, at least get to game, but also the possibility of bidding to slam with fewer points than normal based on a precise knowledge of distribution. If you opened with a minimum points hand or a hand with a number of low value cards you can sign off in 4 of the agreed suit.

LESSONS

DEAR DIRECTOR

Just a quick reminder of another etiquette required when playing Face to Face Bridge. When you are going to lead, don't pull out a card and then pop it back in your hand and pick a different card. Now even though the opponents can't see the original card, you are giving information to partner, that you have two choices of leads. Also remember when you have decided and pull the card out, keep it face down so no-one else can see the card, in case it is your lead.

I have identified several boards which are worth a closer look as the outcomes achieved against what was possible with better calling would have led to higher value outcomes for the declarer/dummy partnership

Board 5 Thursday Open Face to Face East Lindfield 21st November

On this hand North opened 1 Club, opposition over called 2 Hearts. South bid 2 Spades. North bid 3 Spades and the contract finished in 4 Spades. A better bid by North is to bid 4 Hearts - a

Splinter bid. If South has a weak hand they could sign off in 4 Spades.

But the South hand is strong, and you have support for partner's first bid suit. The only thing North may be worried about is the opposition cashing 2 Heart tricks. With the 4 Heart bid by partner you should be very excited about looking for slam. You have a very easy 12 tricks. No one got to slam on this hand.

The bidding on this hand should have been
North 1C - East (Overcall) 2H

South 2S - West Pass

North 4H - East Pass

The bid by North indicates a shortage in the bid suit - a Splinter bid

South 4NT (asking for Aces) etc.

No one bid a Small Slam on this hand but it was eminently achievable

This hand also caused a lot of problems. The only pair that reached bidding slam had a bidding misunderstanding.

North should open 1 Spade and South should respond 1NT.

North can now show their hearts, bidding 2H's. South should respond with a raise in Hearts (having 4 cards in that suit).

Once North sees the Heart fit, North should realise they need very little from Partner to make Slam and should then proceed down the track of seeking Aces from partner to make a final call.

My tips for being a good partner

Act as the partner you would like to have. Exhibit friendliness, politeness, respect, and understanding, particularly when situations become challenging. Bridge involves both social interaction and game play, so it is essential to greet partners and opponents and engage with them inclusively.

Bridge partnerships require dedication. While poor game results may be quickly forgotten, poor behavior can leave a lasting impression. Players who frequently display negative attitudes at the table may develop a reputation that discourages others from wanting to ever play with them.

To maintain a lasting partnership, put effort into it. If a hand goes poorly, note the board number to discuss post-session. Conduct postmortems after the match, in private, and defer not during or between rounds.

During club bridge, stay positive and take bad boards in stride. A simple "sorry partner" for mistakes should suffice. Discuss what went wrong after the session to improve your partnership.

It may be an ad-hoc game for the day or the beginning of a potential long-term partnership. Regardless of the situation, it is advisable to follow the principle of "Keep It Simple." Begin by playing the basic standard system. Special conventions can be introduced into a new partnership at a later date when both parties are comfortable with each other's approach to the game.

Often I have heard players mention that they are using such-and-such a convention, and when asked about it, they say "Well, that's how my partner does it." In application of the convention I also hear "Well, this is how I always play it with my own partner." Even when familiar with a convention such as Bergen, many people have slight variations in their interpretation, and some may not be fully aware of the entire Bergen system due to its complexity. For new partnerships, it is recommended to avoid using Bergen and other special conventions, as they might hinder performance rather than improve it. Focus on the basic version of the standard system first, as playing it well will give you good results.

At the end of the match, when reviewing the game, address only the most serious issues and avoid focusing on every detail. Prioritize your concerns, acknowledging that bridge is a challenging game to master and requires time and effort, which ultimately makes the learning process rewarding.
