MASTERS OF BRIDGE

An interview with leading Bridge Players

	Liam Milne
How long have you been Playing Bridge	About 20 years. I learnt when I was 15 at High School in New Zealand. I was very lucky that a top bridge player volunteered his time to teach kids in school during their lunch break. I hope to, one day, do something similar!
How Many Master Points do you have?	About 4500 (3900 gold, 500 red, 100 green).
While you have a lot of Master Points you have more Red and Gold Points than Green Points – why is that?	Green points are a lot harder to earn! You can play a session of bridge, do well and only get 0.6 points! If you do well at a national event, you might get 40+ points for a few days of bridge. I play a lot more national events than I do club bridge or congresses.
What tournaments have you had the most success in last 5 years. Which events have you represented Club/State/Australia	My best bridge result in the recent past, was when our team (me, James Coutts and NZ friends Michael Whibley, Matt Brown) won the silver medal in the World Transnational Open Teams. My most successful event is the G.C. Open Teams which I have won four times since 2012. The most important event to win is the Open Playoff to determine the Australian team. We have won twice, 2015, 2023 and selected as the third pair another two times.
What Conventions do you use when Bidding over and above the 5 Standard Conventions	Of the conventions I play with James I recommend: <ul style="list-style-type: none">• “Multi-Landy” defense to 1NT• Drury 2C by passed hand over 1H/1S• ‘Scrambling 2NT’ when responding to a takeout double ‘Good Raise 2NT’ when partner opens or over calls a major and the auction gets competitive, 2NT shows a good raise with at least 4 trumps.
Which do you think are the most effective Bidding Conventions other than the 5 Std Conventions for	Focus on conventions dealing with competitive bidding. Great example is cue raises / bidding the opponent’s suit

CONVENTIONS OTHER THAN THE 5 STD CONVENTIONS FOR: Rookies Restricted Players	Great example is cue raises (bidding the opponents suit to show a good raise of partner) which allows you to show good hands and preemptive hands. How Negative Doubles work is another very important area.
Defense is about 50% of the game what tips would give to players to handle this part of the game	Try to visualise what declarer's hand looks like. You have hints from the sequence of bidding, so make guess and update it as you find out more. If you just follow along with the play without thinking about what declarer has, it is easy to make a mistake and give away easy tricks. Try to work out what declarer is trying to do and do the opposite. A classic mistake is when I am working on establishing a suit as declarer, defense returns the suit for me! This is very rarely right.
What Conventions do you use for Defense/How do you approach defense	James and I lead 3rds and 5ths against suit contracts which helps us count the hand. A lot of our approach to defense is based on many discussions with partner and a good understanding of what partner likes to lead, how they usually defend, etc. It is easiest to defend well with a reliable partner.

EXTEND YOUR BRIDGE KNOWLEDGE

EXTENDING ON THE FIVE ESSENTIAL CONVENTIONS - Stayman, Transfers, Strong 2 Clubs, Blackwood and Pre-Empts

Bidding to Small Slam/Grand Slam and achieving those calls is one of the most satisfying feelings in playing Bridge. While Blackwood is an essential convention taught at the learning stage of Bridge, there have been a number of conventions developed to help get to slam - not more slams but to keep you out of bad ones. One such convention is Blackwood RKCB 1430 - this convention allows a partnership to not only identify whether partner has the King of trumps, but sometimes also where the Queen of trumps may lay. Blackwood RKCB 1430 was first publicised by Eddie Kantar. Kantar was a prolific player and writer of Bridge. He won two Open World Championships for Teams and won 15 North American Bridge Championships. He wrote 35 books on Bridge

Once you and partner have decided to head for Slam by bidding 4NT, - use the Blackwood RKCB 1430 - in this convention instead of 4 Aces you will pretend there are actually 5 Keycards and the fifth "Ace" is the King of Trumps.

After partner has bid 4 NT your response will be one of the following

- 5C indicates **1 or 4** Keycards
- 5D **3 or 0** Keycards - hence 1430
- 5H **2 or 5** Keycards (**without** the Queen of Trumps)
- 5S **2 or 5** Keycards (**with** the Queen of Trumps)

So how does this help you - if Partner bids 5C, saying he has 1 or 4 Keycards then by looking at your hand you can deduce exactly what partner has from your hand and previous bidding. With this bidding you will never get to a small slam missing two keycards nor should you be bidding a small slam requiring a finesse of the King of Trumps - after all Slam Bids requiring a finesse of the King are more likely to fail (less than 50% chance of the finesse succeeding)

You can continue to determine the number of Kings in partners hand by bidding 5NT but you only need to know the number of Kings other than the King of Trumps. Only ask for Kings if you are contemplating Grand Slam

A critical point is:

If there is any doubt which suit is agreed as Trumps, then the last (natural) bid suit is considered the key suit for the purposes of counting keycards

On this particular board the bidding achieved the desired outcome, although if more aggressive; the Declarer having been able to identify where both the King of Trumps and Queen of Trumps were, the bidding should have got to Grand Slam

Bidding:

East P South 1 C

West P North 1 H

East P South 2 C

West P North 4 NT

East P South 5 D (indicating 3 Keycards)

West P North 6 NT (then Pass, Pass)

Note Clubs was the agreed suit (Clubs were bid twice and Hearts only the once, Clubs was the last natural bid suit on which to identify the King as the fifth Keycard. North had the Queen C so North knew there would be no 5 S bid. Those that bid Slam all achieved 13 tricks

Dear Director

When we first learnt bridge we received a whole lot of rules to follow and then we finally memorised them, we were told to forget most of them. So no wonder this is the most confusing game known to man. But also one of the most rewarding and challenging games.

You need to remember if you are Opening the bidding partner may change the suit. This is forcing (meaning Opener can not pass). Now you bid your hand showing partner if you are a minimum, mid-range or maximum hand. As responder, you need to show partner how strong you are with your second bid. I will show a hand that came up where some pairs failed to get to game. I have put two hands here that are very similar so you can see you need to bid accordingly.

First hand

Partner East: Opens 1 Heart (meets the rule of 20),

South: Pass

West : Bids 1 Spade (forcing),

North - Passes

East: To show partner your strength - bid 2 Diamonds. South: Pass

West: Partner needs to bid 4 Spades not 3 Spades as this is not forcing - 4 Spades.

Six Spades makes but it is a very friendly hand.

John Brodie Asks: "Why do we have to announce 1♣ opening length and 1NT opening strength?"

Good question John, I will give it my best shot. There are a variety of bridge systems being played in Australia beyond the Standard American (commonly known as Standard). In the last five years I have encountered several systems including Standard, 2 over 1, Acol, Precision, Big Club, Polish Club (it's been a while), SCAMP (twice), and EHAA (Every Hand is An Adventure), which I've only seen once. The most notable similarity amongst these systems is the distinct differences in their 1♣ and 1NT opening bids.

Natural systems like Standard, 2 over 1, and Acol open 1♣ with either 2, 3, or 4 clubs, which must be announced (not alerted) for example when playing that a 1♣ opening contains at least 3 clubs then announce it as "3+" or "3 or more." If you have played in the Open, you might notice some players alert the 1♣ opening then announce it as "Strong" or "Unusual." This is because they are using a different system with an artificial 1♣ opening that may not contain any clubs at all and must be alerted.

The range of high card points (HCP) for a 1NT opening bid can vary significantly between systems. Some systems use a weak opening 1NT with 8-11 or 10-14 HCP, while others prefer a stronger 1NT opening with ranges like 14-16, 15-17, or 15-18 HCP. In my system, a double, by me or my partner, over the opponents 1NT opening will have different meanings depending on whether the opener's 1NT is announced as strong or weak.

The Australian Bridge Federation mandates that all players at ABF-affiliated clubs must announce the 1♣ opening length and 1NT opening strength bids. This regulation aims to ensure fairness and prevent misunderstandings by providing clear and immediate information about the meaning of these bids. Since bridge is a game of open strategy (no secrets!), this transparency allows players to focus on making the best possible bids without the need to decode potentially ambiguous signals.
