What an amazing performance by our NSBC members at the Spring Nationals. Well done to the place getters - we are very proud.

With Jo and me back in the same time zone, we're finalising the budget for 2025. As many of know, we've seen a double whammy in ABF Capitation and BNSW affiliation fees, along with hikes, wage increases, increases in cost of masterpoints and good old inflation. The good news is We've found a few places to trim the budget, and I am pleased to report that we will be keeping both Membership Fees and Table Fees at their 2024 rates, which is \$70 for Sydney Metro members and Home Club members and \$45 for our online members who reside outside the Sydney metro area.

I have had a few enquiries as to why the increase from the ABF and BNSW. The ABF explain their strategy and the need to increase Capitation Fees and Masterpoint fees in this article from D Fryda - please [click here to read](#).

The NSWBA (New South Wales Bridge Association) was previously the state body for bridge in NSW, but only members of the Sydney Bridge Centre (SBC) could vote under its structure. This arrangement left affiliated clubs, including ours, paying fees without having a direct voice in the organisation. Recently, however, SBC and the Bridge Network of NSW (BNSW) have separate identities with assets divided between the two. Unfortunately, this split has left BNSW with limited working capital.

To address this, BNSW has increased fees to build up its resources, enabling it to better support bridge clubs across the state. While this fee hike is frustrating, it should ultimately benefit clubs like ours. As one of NSW's "Big Four" bridge clubs, we now have a direct role in decision-making at BNSW, allowing us to represent our members' interests effectively.

This change is still very recent, and we need to give BNSW some time to establish itself and start delivering on its goals.

Terry, with Jo's help, has been meeting with local councils to scout out opportunities and potential support for a permanent club home. We're also exploring options for the Reserve Fund. Special thanks to Peter Marshall for his invaluable assistance in this area – thank you, Peter!

Our Christmas parties are shaping up nicely! The Christmas Lunch on Friday, 6 December is sold out. There are still a few spots available for lunch on Friday 29th November, to book please [click here](#). We'd love to see you there!

Meanwhile, Mike and Gary have been hard at work putting the finishing touches on the 2025 Calendar. Mike is also in the middle of designing a teaching calendar aimed at helping our Supervised and Rookies step confidently into the Restricted and Open sections.

MASTERS OF BRIDGE

Interviews with leading Bridge Players

Mike Prescott	
How Long have you been Playing Bridge	Learnt at age 16. Started playing at a Bridge Club when I was 18 - played for just on 40 years.
How Many Master Points have you earned	Total of 5,480.89 Gold 4148.52, Red 1246.47, Green 85.90 Played professionally for many Years at Grand Slam with clients. Only occasionally play now in major ABF Gold Point events.
What tournaments have you won and tournaments where you have represented Club/State/Australia	Played on New Zealand youth team with partner Michael Ware during the 90's. Won many events with the biggest being the Blue-Ribbon Matchpoint Pairs, in Canberra. Came to Australia to play professional bridge in 1999. Joined professional team with Barry Noble, travelled Australia and world attending major events. Won several National events and the playoff in 2002 to represent Australia in the world championship in Paris. Also represented Australia in two Far East Championships. Part of the Oz 1 team. Oz 1, sent teams to American nationals trying to improve the standard of our top players. Since joining NSBC I only play with a client partner, Marlene Watts. Marlene and I have won two national pairs events in the recent past.
What is your advice to be a good Bridge Player	Try to keep things simple so you never confuse your partner. Have good agreements and always make time to discuss different things that come up in each session you play. We all learn new things almost every time we play.
Which do you think are the most effective Bidding Protocols for a. Rookies b. Restricted Players	Rookie players should be looking at adding new things to their system as they progress. Restricted players much the same but adding in more advanced tools to their system as they are getting ready

	try our Open sessions.
What Protocols do you use for Defence/How do you approach defence	It doesn't matter what you use as long as you and your partner have firm agreements and stick to them.
For New, Rookie and Restricted Players what errors do you most commonly see and what alternatives should be applied	The way to become a better Bridge player is to reduce your mistakes. Always review your poor performance boards Pianola and see what you personally could have done better. Suggest your partner does the same and then you can discuss together. Never list partners mistakes as this could upset them and the partnership will not last. Let them look at the scores just as you do and then compare notes.
What do you see as the best ways for players to improve their game	Study, we have fantastic transition lessons, Face to Face and Online and read good Bridge books.
Do you try to work out what cards your opponents have <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. During Bidding b. After the first lead How do you do that	What you should do is listen to the bidding. Has declarer bid two suits, have they showed a balanced hand extra. Once you see the dummy add your points to dummy and give declarer what you think they will average and how many points will this leave for your partner. Then paint a picture of declarer's shape - you may not get this always exact but you can get pretty close.

EXTEND YOUR BRIDGE KNOWLEDGE

EXTENDING ON THE FIVE ESSENTIAL CONVENTIONS - Stayman, Transfers, Strong 2 Clubs, Blackwood and Pre-Empts

BERGEN CONVENTION – Developed by Marty Bergen, a tennis champion while at college, Bergen was a 10 time National Champion and American Contract Bridge League Grand Life Master.

The Bergen Convention recognises having 4 card support for Partner's major suit opening. Simply (and there are variations) when partner opens with a major (H's or S's), promising 5 cards of that suit then the Bergen convention tells partner, at least at the 3 level, having 4 card support and can lead to bidding game with less than 25 points.

The Bergen Convention is a pre-emptive bid forcing opponents to gamble – Openers partner bidding at a high level on potentially a weak hand and challenging opponents to bid at a high level without clear knowledge of each other's hand.

Partner Opens 1H.

You then respond:

- 2H - 3 Card support with 6 - 9 points
- 3C - 4 Card support with 6 - 9 points
- 3D - 4 card support with 10 - 12 points
- 3H - 4 Card support with 2 - 5 points
- 4S - 4 Card support with 12+ points

The same system applies if partner opens 1S but where 3H's is 4 Card support with 12+ points and 3S's is 4 card support with 2-6 points

Your opening partner now has a decision to make (unless you have bid 4 of Openers suit)- whether to bid for game or stay at the three level. Partner now has a clearer view of your hand and combined point total and a clear knowledge, between you have 8 cards of Openers suit (in the case of a 2 bid) and 9 cards (all 3 bids) in Openers suit, and also a clearer understanding of the total points in your 2 hands.

The choice remains for Opener to pass the decision to partner but the above system leaves it to decision making in Openers Hand.

At this point it is important for you and your partner to have agreed your options in bidding. It may be simpler to sign off on the above system or delve into slightly more complex options if Slam bidding can be seen as a potential outcome, particularly if Opener has 18 or 19 points. For further information refer to lessons which may be organised or review good bridge book conventions from the NSBC Library (or purchase same)



FROM THE DIRECTOR

I often get asked - how do my partner and I get better at bridge?

Bridge is a challenging and rewarding game and it is really difficult. What I find best is to have a look at the boards you didn't do so well on.

Sometimes it's just bad luck that the Opposition bid a slam against you. Other times there is often a theme. Are you being too timid in the bidding or are you being too aggressive in the bidding? Are the opponents making game when they shouldn't?

When you see there is a theme you can work on this and it will help with your bridge scores. And of course attending lessons is a great way to improve your bridge too

Board 13 Rookie 2nd October Online 2.00pm

On this hand North Opens 1 Diamond. You don't want to make a Take-Out Double here, as you don't have at least 3 cards in all the other suits. South will pass. Now as West in the pass out seat you need to bid 1NT (this is by partnership agreement needs to be alerted). It shows a stopper in the suit bid and 11-14 HCP not 15-18 HCP. If you had 15-18 you need to (Take-Out) Double first and then bid. Now partner knows how many points you have and with 13 HCP and you know where all the others points are you should raise to game.

No one got to game on this hand. So this is something to discuss with partner

Board 11 Rookie Monday 30th September F2F East Lindfield

On this hand you have 23 HCP. You don't need much from partner to make game. So you should open 2C. This should be alerted by Partner. Partner will respond 2D (also needs to be alerted). Now you have a very difficult bid. I like to think of it as - what is the best description of my hand. 2 Spades and 2 Hearts are definitely not an option. As this promises 5 card in the suit. I could bid 3C. But what I think is best on the hand is 2NT. Partner should respond 3NT. If the opponents interfere with 2 Diamonds still bid 2NT. Nothing is certain but it is a hand where you want to be in game.

You will get a diamond lead. Then play the Ace and King of Clubs. Then play a low club to the Queen. You can't lose the lead so you just hope that the spade finesse works. It does work so try it again.
