Myth Buster: Do Online Players Get More Red Point Events?

A common question I get is why online players seem to have more Red Point events and congresses than Face-to-Face players. So let's break it down:

- In 2024, we ran 660 regular F2F sessions, 11 Congresses & 5 Special Events.
- Online, we ran 773 regular sessions, 37 Championship nights, and 10 Congresses.
- All other Red Points are strategically used—for example, on public holidays to boost attendance or to support new sessions, or to try and keep a session alive.

One example is our April promotion: All Wednesday morning sessions at East Lindfield will o Red Points to celebrate the launch of our new Rookie session and encourage more Open pla to return to our friendly Wednesday morning game.

Championship Nights - A Special Part of Our Club Offering

Championship Nights are not just another special event—they are a prestigious, high-calibre event that attracts some of Australia's best players. These nights provide an incredible opportunity for aspiring bridge players to test their skills at an elite level.

Before COVID, these events were held Face-to-Face, but we have found that offering them or is both more cost-effective and allows wider participation. If you're a regular F2F player and would like to compete in these top-tier events, our wonderful Online Manager, Gary, is alway happy to help you get set up on RealBridge so you can join in!

In summary, we always strive to balance opportunities across both face-to-face and online players—our goal is to keep as many sessions viable, enjoyable, and inclusive as possible!

The bottom line: Excluding Championship Nights, which are a unique event targeted at our E Players, we actually have more face-to-face Congresses than online.

Additionally, we run five special red-point events that are only played face-to-face, including:

- Christmas Lunches
- Melbourne Cup
- Biggest Morning Tea
- AGM Day Pairs

The remaining red-point allocations will be used for public holidays and promotional events. priority is to ensure fairness while maximising participation and enjoyment for all members!

How Red Points Are Allocated

The Australian Bridge Federation (ABF) allocates a limited number of Red Point events to eac club, based on the number of Green Points issued in the previous year. Some Red Point ever such as State Championships, do not count towards our allocation. While you might not see behind-the-scenes details, rest assured that Gary and Mike work hard to distribute non-state

Red Point sessions as fairly as possible across all formats—so everyone gets a fair go at earn those lovely shiny red points!

Looking forward to seeing you all at the tables soon!

What are Swiss Pairs?

In my opinion, Swiss Pairs is one of the most inclusive and exciting bridge formats! The first round is a random draw, so yes, you might get the top guns in your division... but don't worn After that, the winners play winners and the lower-ranked pairs play each other. As you do w you move up the field, always facing pairs with a similar score.

Why is this great? You always have a chance to win a match—and winning a match means MASTERPOINTS! It's a fantastic way to compete, improve, and leave feeling like a winner.

MASTERS OF BRIDGE

A Summary of some of the thoughts made in interviews with leading Bridge Players

Thoughts on Bidding and Conventions by our Masters Of Bridge

On Being Good Bridge Player

Try to keep things simple so you never confuse your partner. Have good agreeme and always make time to discuss different things that come up in each session yo play.

Conventions to be Used

Rookie players should be looking at adding new things to their system as they progress. Restricted players much the same but adding in more advanced toc

their system as they are getting ready to try out Open sessions.

Play transfer responses over 1 Club, and a Variant of Michael's Cue Bid. Keep relatively simple

(1) use lots of conventions but they are an aid and aren't a substitute for bidd judgement. A common mistake for players is to take on too many conventions and not understand how they work

I don't play a lot of conventions but I am a big advocate for 2/1 GF (Game Forc Depending on the partner I also like transfer responses over 1C. Two-way checkback is another good one that I use with most of my regular partners

Of the conventions I play I recommend:

"Multi-Landy" defence to 1NT

Drury 2C by passed hand over 1H/1S

'Scrambling 2NT' when responding to a takeout double

'Good Raise 2NT' when partner opens or over calls a major and the auction ge competitive, 2NT shows a good raise with at least 4 trumps.

Takeout Doubles

The idea of using a double for takeout instead of penalties was developed early in the 20th century, before the First World War. At that time it was called an "informatory" double. One of the early users was Bryant McCampbell who was responsible for creating the 4-3-2-1 point consystem still in use today.

Takeout Doubles today are such a very basic part of bidding that they rarely require agreemwith partner as to their meaning.

Your opponents have opened the bidding with a 1C opening. You want to call but don't have card suit to call but you have opening points – what to do? – and the answer is as simple as a cross on a scorecard or if playing online clicking on the double sign.

How do you know that cross is Takeout Double rather than a Penalty Double?

There are three simple rules that apply

Bidding is at a low level, below game

Partner has not made a call other than pass

Opponents have bid a suit and not NT (A double of an Opening 1NT bid is taken as a penalty bid)

What is needed to make a "cross"/takeout double?

A hand worth at least an opening bid Adequate trump support for all unbid suits Shortness in the opponents called suit

What is the expected response to a "cross"/takeout double?

When partner has made a takeout double, you <u>must</u> respond unless there is an intervening bid which lets you off the hook.

You must bid your best/"favourite" unbid suit even if you have no points. Why? If elect to pass you are committing to defend a contract in which you know your partner has few cards - and that could lead to a disaster score

The following rules can be used

0 – 8 points – bid best suit at the cheapest level

9-11 points bid your best suit at one level higher than necessary (this shows your p range)

12+ points force to game

DEAR DIRECTOR

My tip for the week. When partner does something you think is totally insane make sure you keep a poker face. As soon as you react it gets partner stressed and they may not play well for the rest of the session. It's much better to have a chat about it after the game finishes. Then

maybe partner will need to buy you a very expensive drink!

Board 8 Stratified Pairs. Week 1, 1st March

On this hand North have a game-force hand with only 3 potential losers and 18 Points. So open 2 Clubs, Partner is quite excited as they 15 HCP and 5 Hearts.

I know some of you think you need to always respond 2 Diamonds (waiting) and usually you have hardly any points when partner opens a game force. But in this instance you have 5 Hearts and 15 HCP and so South responds 2H indicating a strong suit and points to support. Opener is very happy with the 2 Heart call. If partner has the Ace of Spades you should be making 7 Hearts. If you ask for Aces now and partner only has one you won't know which one. A better bid is 3 Hearts.

Now South is in control of the auction. South can happily ask for Aces by calling 4NT. North replies 5 Hearts (I have 2 Keycards without the Q of trumps). South now knows you have all the keycards and the Queen of trumps (also you have a 10 card fit so you would not worried about the Queen of trumps). Now you bid 5NT this says partner we have all the key cards. How do you feel about 7H. Now North with the wonderful side suit of Clubs and knows we have all the keycards should happily bid 7NT.

On this hand 7 Clubs, 7 Hearts and 7 No Trumps makes. Only about half the field got to a grand slam.

Board 13 F2F Wed 10.00am 19th March


On this hand I have 11 HCP and 5 Diamonds, with an Ace (Clubs). I happened to be playing with someone that wouldn't get cross about my opening bid!


My partner called 1 Heart.

I really didn't like my hand at all. I just called 1NT.

Opps hadn't bid spades so I thought - give it a go.

My partner (we had no system agreements iust bid 6 Hearts). Fortune favours the brave at





Bridge! Often I hear people say "I will leave it up to my partner" or "Oh I didn't like to go to game". My view is have a go (you don't need to be too crazy) and if you don't make it the sun will still come up tomorrow!

Tips for Pauline Evans Swiss Pairs First Timers

Swiss movements differ significantly from regular Mitchells and Howells. Typically, fewer rou are played, with more boards per round, and events often extending throughout the day. Generally, there are 6 rounds of 9 boards each, with 3 rounds before lunch and 3 rounds aft lunch.

The scoring system is different, and longer rounds help ensure that one poor board does no impact the entire round too much. In Swiss, masterpoints are awarded for each of the 6 mat played during the day, making it an effective way to accumulate red masterpoints even if you don't make the top half.

In duplicate bridge, scores are based on percentages calculated from the board scores earned in Swiss, only board scores are used, so game (400, 600, 620 etc) and slam scores (990, 1430 have a greater impact on the round. Overtricks are less significant than in duplicate bridge; to primary goal is to bid and make games and slams. Don't risk making a game just to score an overtrick. Doubling opponents' contracts is generally not recommended unless there is stror certainty they can be defeated.

In Swiss IMP/VP scoring, the board scores are first converted to IMPS and then the match score converted to VPs, resulting in an overall score from 0 to 20 for each round. If a match resin a low score (close to a zero) don't worry as it is still possible to recover and perform well in subsequent rounds. At the end of each round, after converting scores to IMPS and then VPs, pairs will be ranked based on their accumulated VPs. The draw for the next round will pair individuals who have similar performance so far.

My Swiss strategies:

- Bid games and slams if they seem likely to succeed.
- Focus on making your contract, not overtricks.
- Avoid sacrificing when vulnerable; it's too risky.
- In general, don't double the opponents; it's risky, if they succeed.
- Lead or return your partner's suit bid in the auction.
- Aim to defeat opponents' contracts (one down is usually a great score for you)
- Enjoy the game! Every pair usually gains some masterpoints during the day.
