Our Masters of Bridge Thoughts on

Defence

- Always work on visualising what declarer's hand looks like. If you don't know, then mal guess and update it as you find out more. If you just follow along with the play without thinking about what declarer has, it is easy to make a mistake or fall into a trap.
- Try to work out what declarer is trying to do and do the opposite. A classic mistake I se too often is that I am working on establishing a suit as declarer and the defence return the suit for me! This is very rarely right.
- Defence is very important and getting a feel for the point count and distribution in each hand will take you a long way.
- Pay attention to partner's signals
- Look at every card and COUNT

Determining Points in Each Hand

- What you should do is listen to the bidding. Has declarer bid two suits, have they show
 a balanced hand extra. Once you see the dummy add your points to dummy and give
 declarer what you think they will average and how many points will this leave for your
 partner. Then paint a picture of declarers shape you may not get this always exact bu
 you can get pretty close.
- I try to determine points in each hand prior to Declarer being finalised and then after t after first card has been played, but also as the hand progresses I gain further informato better recognise the cards and points each player has. I do this by concentration an memory training myself over the years has led me to be successful in this area
- Especially if I can anticipate if I'll be on opening lead. I want to have a picture of what the dummy and declarer's hands are before I lead. I listen to the auction and narrow down which suit I'd like to lead.
- Listen to the auction! There are a lot of inferences and negative inferences that can be drawn. Don't automatically lead back what partner led. Make sure there is a reason for everything you do rather than just playing randomly. Always try to picture declarer's shand points, it will help you construct the whole hand.
- I have a tendency to not notice my partner's card, so find it effective to say the card in head e.g. Spade 5.
- Luckily there is an excellent book available, "How to Read Your Opponent's Cards" by N Lawrence. It deserves your attention.

Our Members - Pat Bond

In the last few weeks NSBC was able to celebrate one of our members 100th birthday, Pat Bond, with a cake at our East Lindfield room, presented by Sue Crompton. What a fabulous achievement for Pat to reach that milestone and to still be playing Bridge at NSBC. After that presentation Pat then traveled to New Zealand for 10 days with her daughter Julie, to catch up with Pat's other daughter Cathy and her family to further celebrate Pat's milestone. The visit to New Zealand bought all the family together, both her daughters Julie and Cathy and their families.

On her return from New Zealand, I was able to sit down with Pat to discuss her association with Bridge, other interests and family.



Pat's interest in Bridge arose at a relatively early age and she was initially taught by her moth then had lessons in her early twenties with a Mrs Tudor-Hope, who played in a lot of Bridge competitions and had a studio in George Street, Sydney. Pat worked in the Health Departme nearby and would go after work to Mrs Tudor-Hopes studio. There she was in a small group three other learners and they would learn/play under supervision.

She met husband to be (Eric), in the mid 1940's, at work, and after 30 years of marriage, she convinced him to take up bridge. She arranged for him to have lessons with Ron Klinger. (Ro a very well-known player, teacher and writer of many books on bridge). Pat says Ron was qui charismatic and her husband became a keen student although she thought this may have be because within his learning group were a number of attractive young ladies.

In addition to an affinity with Bridge, both Pat and her husband Eric were keen golfers. For P and Eric, golf and bridge went together, hand in hand and over the years this led to friendsh and trips away with a group of friends, all keen on golf and bridge. Craigieburn in the Southe Highlands was a particular spot to which they returned, numerous times, with their friends t play both golf and Bridge

Eric was a member of Pennant Hills Golf Club originally but then joined Roseville Golf Club. Ftalked Pat into learning golf and joining him at Roseville. Pat played golf on Tuesdays and Friwith lady friends, and bridge followed golf, particularly on Tuesdays. On Sundays she played with her husband followed by dinner with friends. They would often invite these friends over play bridge on Saturday evenings in their home.

At the age of 92, after 52 years at Roseville Golf Club Pat decided to pack away her golf clubs give up golf. Pat was one of Posoville Golf Clubs languest term members, and of course, thou

her a great send off.

She and her husband moved to Lindfield Gardens about 20 years ago. Pat's husband passed away and while she was already a member of NSBC, she began playing even more often. She initially played at Lindfield Bridge club at Lindfield shops and then later at East Lindfield Bow Club. How does she get there each time she plays? – she used to walk of course – it's only 6 minutes away! More recently her lovely partner Penny has kindly picked her up and taken he home which has enabled her to continue playing.

What did Pat like about golf and Bridge – it was the competition, the friendships and the mer and physical exercise. Pat often played in the Herald Bridge competition which she thorough enjoyed and which allowed her to meet a wide range of interesting people. She always enjoy the competition, being able to play at a competitive level and of course the social interaction continues to play at a social level at Lindfield Gardens as well as competitively at NSBC.

One of her endearing memories of playing Bridge, was to play with Cathy at NSBC. Pat who part Standard American, teamed with Cathy who being from New Zealand plays Acol but togethe they were able to win the day – outstanding.

When I visited Pat, it was her last day at Lindfield Gardens as she has decided to move to Ma Vale, where she doesn't need to be so self-sufficient. In our discussion she indicated she was very keen to continue playing Bridge but perhaps closer by at Manly Vale. Hope fully she will be lost to NSBC as she continues to be a great member.

DEAR DIRECTOR

My Tip for the Week

I often see players not bid to game. They seem to worry - what if I don't make it? or "Oh we vulnerable, and I thought I had better not bid on".

If you know your side has enough points for a game bid, then bid game. Consider playing 3 rather than 3 Clubs or 3 Diamonds.


If partner invites you to game, if you have something more than promised or you are at the end of your range then go for it. What is the worst thing that could happen if you don't mal game? The sun is still coming up tomorrow!

Board 20 EL Wed 2nd April

On this hand only 1 pair got to slam

East and West pass throughout North calls 1 Heart, South calls 1 Spade, North calls 2 Diamonds and now South calls 3 Clubs (4th suit forcing) North calls 3 Diamonds. If you play control bids, South calls 4 Clubs first round control in Clubs (this is not Gerber!). Now North is quite excited and calls for Aces. South responds 5 Hearts (two keycards no Queen of trumps)


Now North can call 6 Diamonds



Board 10 Wed Online Rookie 9th April

East Opens 1D and West should not respond 3NT as this doesn't go with a Heart lead. West should call 2C, no they don't have 5 but it's OK to lie sometimes with a Minor. W3ests bid is giving vital information about a stopper in Clubs and is a good bid showing 10 plus points and forcing Partner show more about their hand. East has nothing more to show than they have the other 2 suits stopped. With vulnerability in Hearts. It is best that S is on lead and the King definitely makes. East bids 2NT (nothing more to show partner) and West raises to 3NT.

5 Diamonds will fail on Heart lead from West but can make by East by cashing Ace and King of Diamonds and running either Black suit and discard a Heart while North ruffs

Howell vs Mitchell movements.

Bridge directors face challenges in selecting movements for sessions, considering factors li stationary seats, players with movement difficulties, and sit outs. Socially, shorter rounds a playing with more players, which seems fairer, but in face-to-face games, shorter rounds remore physical movement, making sessions longer and more awkward. Typically, face-to-face bridge uses 3-board rounds. In online bridge, physical movement is irrelevant, so round ler and movement type matter less. Two types of movements are available, each with advanta and disadvantages, designed to ensure fair competition for all players.

In duplicate bridge, every board has equal value in the total score, influencing how you bid declare, or defend. While playing in game and slam is exciting, it's crucial to remember that score play and defence are equally important. Defending is the hardest part of the game, requiring synchronization with your partner, and improving this skill can significantly boost overall results more than any bidding gadgets. If your side doesn't play many hands, focus better defensive strategies with your partner. Experienced players achieve good results by excelling in all aspects of the game, regardless of their seating arrangement. The saying "th cream rises to the top" holds true in bridge, as skilled players consistently perform well.

A Mitchell movement is characterised by North-South pairs remaining at their table while E West pairs move to the next table each round. This format is referred to as a "two-winner"

movement as it identifies a winner for both North-South and East-West pairs. In contrast, the Howell movement entails most players moving to new tables and occasionally directions, we some pairs remaining stationary. As a director in face-to-face settings, I prefer the Mitchell movement when there are numerous tables, as it simplifies the administration of the day. However, as a player, I favour the Howell movement since it allows me to compete against entire field.

The Mitchell movement offers the (small) advantage of comparing performances on the sale boards and in the same direction, although it may obscure imbalances if not all opponents played. For instance, one might play against highly experienced players who capture all tric while others face less experienced players prone to errors, creating potential disparities an sides.

Conversely, the Howell movement ensures that players engage consistently throughout the event. If a balanced game is played, positive results should follow. However, this format ter have a larger bottom field, and finishing last can be discouraging (as everyone experiences The Howell movement strives to enable comparisons and interactions with all participants field as equitably and frequently as possible.
