The launch of **MyAccount** has been a great success, and I want to thank the 60% of PrePay members who have already logged in. A few of you had challenges (yes, my choice of an overly creative password generator did not help—my apologies), but the benefits are already evident.

- You can now manage your own PrePay account notifications.
- You can **set up an automated top-up so you never go into the red again.**
- And if you're not set up yet – just call Sue or me. We can do the whole thing for you *over the phone*, including the auto top-up.

MyAccount is the start of automating our financial processes. For automation to be worthwhile, we need **80% of members paying through MyAccount**. This is *not mandatory*, but I want you to understand the upside:

- If you pay via bank transfer or the website, we cannot automate it due to incorrect references and manual reconciliation.
- Automation saves time, reduces admin, and lowers our

operating costs.

OUR MEMBERS OUR CLUB

This month's conversation was with NSBC member Sophie Ashton, one of the highest ranked Bridge Players in Australia and the first woman to represent Australia since Pauline Gumby in 2007 (see Footnote 1. below), in the Australian Open Team at the Asia Pacific Bridge Federation Championships in China in May and later the Bermuda Bowl in August. Our conversation took place via video as Sophie resides and works in Goulburn.



From a young age Sophie says numbers came naturally to her and remembers doing her mums "stolen" logic problems under bedclothes until late at night at the age of 7. Her family played a lot of games and various card

games, but Sophie's background in bridge didn't start until her late teens on a trip with her father to South America. On the trip her father taught her two-handed Bridge, where one player bids East/South and the other North/West and on return Sophie joined the University of Sydney Bridge Club - at the age of 21, I attended my first Gold Coast conference and met up with a really welcoming youth group – and my first boyfriend.

Bridge then went into hibernation as she completed her degree in Applied Mathematics, graduating with the University Medal. Sophie then embarked on a career in investment banking, working in Australia, Japan and England as a quantitative analyst and risk management consultant.

Leaving investment banking, her entrepreneurial skill base came to the fore and she started a medical centre hub in Goulburn – we started it from scratch in 2016 – we had 2 doctors to start with and now we have nine GP's and over 50 specialists, about 30 staff and it's very busy.

Sophie took up Bridge again in her late 20's - I played with people like Michael Wilkinson, who taught me a lot and I also played with Peter Gill – I was very lucky, and I hate to say it but it had to do with being a young female, in the bridge world all the men are kind of happy to play bridge with you and give advice – and I probably showed some potential and in some ways had more of an advantage than if I had been a man.

I met my husband Sartaj (see Footnote 2. below) over a bridge table – he's just come back from playing in the HCL (HCL International Bridge Championship in India) where he won, in a team of four, about \$50K (US). Playing in those International Events such as he and I have just done, in the last few months is very exhausting – it's the intensity of play and the intense focus required.

When asked why there are so few women at the top of International Bridge playing, Sophie thought the answer

could lie in the fact for the top players Bridge is their thing – the top bridge players **are** bridge players. Even for Sartaj – he and I work together at the health hub – at this years' Christmas party he's going to get the award for always being on holidays – because he's playing bridge – for women it's maybe too much of a risky path because there's not that much security in professional bridge.

To really commit your life to bridge is a risk – it's a big risk. I also think there's an element, that you know is changing, but culturally we haven't brought up women with the belief that they can play cards, do the maths as well as men or think logically as well as men.

Sophie believes to become a good bridge player you have to be single-minded about the game itself and women are better and more focused on multi-tasking – for men bridge is just bridge, bridge, bridge. It's much less common to find a woman who is so single minded and focused. I also want to have some kind of income that is a little more secure. You're just not going to be the best bridge player in the world if you're like that. For men though – “no, bridge is my thing – that's what I am going to do”.

Sophie has played professionally only once in a team for Geeska Joel who is a regular bridge sponsor. I played in a mixed team and played with Liam Milne. I did get paid but my preference is not, I've got a good job which I enjoy. I would always prefer to play in a good team that might win where I don't get paid as opposed to playing professionally in a team where I'm less likely to win.

I think I am a good multitasker – when asked on preferences Sophie was clear – they sometimes change but always family is first (Sophie and Sartaj have two young daughters) – recently bridge moved into second place for the tournament period but usually it's family first, business second and bridge third.

When speaking about playing in tournaments Sophie plays two over one with her regular partner (where a response at

the two level in a different suit is game forcing) but when playing with a number of others such as Sartaj or Liam she loves playing Precision (see Footnote 3. below)

Sophie thanks her husband for much of the skill she now has – Sartaj is a much better player than me but he's also a very good coach – he has spent hours coaching me – he's the type of person who when he discovered bridge in his early 20's would spend 6 hours a day studying it- he's an exceptionally good declarer and only plays Precision

He didn't get to represent Australia in the tournaments Sophie has just played – no she said with cheeky grin – no - I beat him in the play offs but he has done very well overseas in recent times at the US Nationals and in India.

I found our conversation both enjoyable and enlightening – a pleasure meeting Sophie even if it was over the video

Footnote 1. Pauline Gumby represented Australia in the 2007 Bermuda Bowl, In 2024 Pauline became Australia's first Diamond Grand Master with over 15,000 Master Points

Footnote 2. Sartaj Hans (Sophie's husband), has represented Australia many times over the last 25 years. He won his first GNOT in 2002. He qualified for his first Australian overseas representation in 2003 and has continued to represent Australia in many events since

Footnote 3. Precision - uses a 1 Club opening for any hand with 16 or more HCP's, a 1bid in a major indicates 5 cards of that suit and 11-15 points and a 1NT opening bid indicates 13-15 HCP's). It came into prominence when used by the Taiwanese team in their effort to come second in the 1969 Bermuda Bowl

DEAR DIRECTOR

My Tip for this month

So often players ask me how do I improve my bridge scores? What I like to do after my game is look at the boards I did badly on. Sometimes it is just bad luck but often there is a theme. Ask yourself, am I being too conservative? Or too aggressive. Do we let the opps play at a cheap level? Do I fall in love with my hand and keep bidding when I should just keep quiet after I have told my partner what my hand is?

Board 23 East Lindfield 03/10/25

On this hand some pairs played in a part score. About 1/2 the field was in game and only 3 pairs called 7 Diamonds. Once you have your diamond fit and ask partner for Ace by calling 4NT when they show you one key card. You are super excited. Yes 7NT does make but I am more than happy to be in 7 Diamonds!

The opps said "Don't mean to complain but that's not fair as you are too good. (Now this made me smile as years ago I filled in and someone complained that I was too hopeless to be a substitute (this was true, I was a little traumatized by the comment!)).

I said to my opponents yes that is quite true and if you have been disadvantaged, I will get Mike to adjust the score. On the first board they got a great score. Now the next board, opps opened 1 Heart and I overcalled 3

Spades. Now South liked their 5 card support for partner's hand and singleton and called 4NT. North responded 5 Diamonds - there seemed to be a bit of confusion as to whether they were playing 1430 or 3140. But South just confidently called 6 Hearts. Jack of Spades lead to the Ace. The declarer drew trumps. Now declarer took a diamond finesse Q, King Ace. I was thinking maybe we have a chance here to take them down. Declarer plays a small Spade and my partner only has the King. Now declarer can get back to dummy play the Queen of Spades and discard their diamond loser. So even though I may have been an overweight substitute, the opps scored another fantastic board. On this hand everything worked. It is not a great slam. Some E/W pairs went to 6 Spades; this was a huge disaster. Our opps worked out an excellent plan of how to play the hand.

ASK GARY

Gary's contribution this month is some of the Do's and Don'ts of playing bridge - important etiquette to be observed.

Gary's tips are:

Learn to keep a poker face at all times during the match.

Pro players are exceptionally good at this

Pass in tempo. Avoid pausing before passing, don't give your partner the idea that you may be thinking of sacrificing, doubling or inviting to game etc.

Never ask about a bid when it is not your turn to call.

Never ever ask about a bid during the auction unless you are intending to bid or double at your next turn to call

Don't ask for a review of the auction when you are intending to pass in the pass out seat as this may suggest to your partner they may have missed something that will affect the lead.

If your partner has made a mistaken explanation during the bidding and you are defending you must not say anything about this until play has completed as this may draw attention to your partner that they have made a mistake. This is un-authorized information.

If you're new to bridge or even been playing a while, here are some guidelines to help you play fairly:

- Only ask questions during the bidding when you really plan to bid yourself. Asking about bids just to get information is not allowed, because you might give away clues to your partner like that's the suit I have or what that's the suit I want you to lead. A big NO-NO!
- For example, if you ask what a "2D" bid means and your partner later leads a diamond, this could accidentally help your side unfairly. If director sees that the diamond lead wasn't natural or there were better choices, they may change the score.
- Any hints you get from your partner are considered off-limits for you, but your opponents can use them.
- Try to keep a neutral attitude "poker face" during the match—pro players do this all the time.
- When it's your turn to pass, do it in tempo and don't pause and think, since hesitating might tell your partner you're thinking about sacrificing, or bidding on to slam etc.
- If you need to know about a specific bid or double then only ask about bids when it's actually your turn and it genuinely affects your bid.
- If you're going to pass in the last seat, don't ask for a review of the bidding, because this could tip off your partner that something important happened and will affect their lead.
- If your partner explains something wrong during bidding and you're defending, wait until play ends to mention it; pointing it out right away might warn your partner and break the rules.
