FROM THE PRESIDENT

From the President – October 2025

Congratulations to NSBC for winning back the **Margaret Smale Metro North Interclub Teams** – a valiant effort and a great achievement for the club.

On the merger front, I'm pleased to report that things are ticking along. The NSBC Committee has unanimously supported the proposal, and the Lindfield Rollers have passed it with a majority vote. While it wasn't unanimous on their side, I'm mildly optimistic we can make this happen.

This progress is thanks to a huge amount of work from both the Project Team and the Lindfield Rollers Working Group. I extend my heartfelt thanks to all of them – their efforts have got us to where we are today: a **Memorandum of Understanding**, agreed in principle and now with the lawyers for final approval and tweaks. Key dates coming up:

- **Friday 11 October** – Lindfield Bowling Club Members' Information Session (TBC)
- **Thursday 16 October, 4pm at East Lindfield** – NSBC Information Session (TBC)

In the meantime, we'll keep sharing updates. Once the MOU is finalised, we'll package all the information for you to digest, with time to ask questions. Here's the spoiler alert:

- **For NSBC members** – whether you play online, at The Willis, or at East Lindfield, nothing should change for you... except the added security of knowing the East Lindfield premises will be there for years to come, with NSBC as part-owners.
- **For Lindfield Bowling Club members** – nothing

changes for you either, except reduced annual subscriptions and playing fees.

What does change is Lindfield Bowling Club and NSBC will share responsibility for the Lindfield premises, Lindfield members continue to benefit from their club exactly as it is — with reduced fees, long-term security, and the resources to improve the facilities — ensuring the club stays at Lindfield for many years to come and NSBC Members get their “forever home” This is not a done deal yet – both clubs still need to vote. But what definitely won't help is speculation and misinformation. So, once the details are shared, if you have a question, please call or email me directly. I promise to give you a straight answer or find out the answer to your question.

New MyAccount Portal

OUR MEMBERS / OUR CLUB

This month I had a conversation

with Jen Madden. Jen is an enthusiastic Bridge player and was recently voted onto the Committee of the North Shore Bridge Club. On coming onto the Committee she elected to take up some specific roles on the Committee, being part of the of the Social Committee and developing Sponsorship for the Club



Jen's background in Bridge started in her early twenties with some girlfriends. According to Jen, she and her friends probably spent more time drinking and eating cheese than playing bridge. Her mother was a keen player and Jen had some lessons to improve play. Back then you played 4 card majors (Acol- see below) because that was the system generally played here at that time. While I didn't play in a club and had an occasional games with my mother, I didn't really play bridge for a long time after marriage, children, living overseas and of course working in Sales oriented and Recruitment roles

Jen took up bridge once again when she retired and it has become something of an obsession. As she became involved in playing she also started to help at the Club and in particular, the Cancer Council Support Day in the Club. Jen's role in supporting the Cancer Council Day was to find Organisations and people who were willing to contribute to the cancer fundraiser. Her work background has helped her get the task done – she's not afraid to pick up a telephone and ask the question – can you help us?

From there she progressed to being nominated and voted onto the Committee. Her role with the Committee has been to be involved in developing sponsorship of events held by the Club and helping to get Social Events organised. Specifically, the intent, is to enhance the community type atmosphere and socialisation in the Club.

The Social committee is made up of 4 people, each having volunteered to help. They have now arranged a number of gatherings where Bridge players meet, don't play Bridge, perhaps have a drink, have a bite to eat and get together in a social atmosphere to discuss Bridge,

The Sponsorship Committee is all about bringing in sponsors, raising funds for the club. The money doesn't go to the Club, it all goes to the club members in terms of prizes. Of course the sponsors see the opportunity to promote their product and the demographics of our club mean there is a wide scope of opportunity for sponsors to build their customer base.

Kieser came on board as result of initially expressing interest in supporting the Cancer Council event. Jen then asked whether they would like to sponsor an event at the club. Jen describes Kieser as being like an older person's gym. Jen started going to Kieser because of a significant back issue – a cyst on her spine which had to be surgically removed. Given she was going to have an operation, couldn't play tennis or even walk, she went Kieser for remedial physiotherapy and doing weights which helped a lot. Then, a little later, on a trip to Japan, she fell and broke her neck, had to have a spinal fusion, resulting in 2 pins in her neck. Back to Kieser to maintain strength because they isolate specific muscles to work on and build muscle strength which is essential as we age.

Jen says she's always interested in looking for new sponsors. What better way to bring money into the club which will go directly to members. She's more than willing to have "nominations" of companies from members where they may have a relative, friend or neighbour who she can ask about willingness to sponsor.

A lot of her focus at present is on the Social meetings for the Club. The meeting place at Chatswood Hotel is on the transport hub of Chatswood, so it's convenient and there's plenty of parking at Westfield, it's an ideal place to hold a get-together. The Social Committee is aiming to raise the numbers each time we meet and broaden the range of attendees, more members, more Directors and more Committee members – let's hope the next meeting is able to attract that range of people.

Thanks for the conversation Jen. I can see what you are doing is adding value to the structure of NSBC – good luck for the next social meeting and finding more

Note: *The Acol system was in primary use in Australia in the 19th and 20th centuries until the Standard American system was introduced into Australia in the latter part of the twentieth century. Standard American is now the only system taught in Australia. The Acol system is still the standard system employed in the United Kingdom and for that matter in New Zealand – noticeably when we play "Across the Ditch" against New Zealanders.*

Rank: Graduate Master

Q: How did you first hear about Bridge?

It's in my family. My parents met playing Bridge, and three out of my four grandparents play Bridge. I have been watching my parents and my grandparents play since I was a little. I've known about it for a long time.

Q: When did you first start playing?

At home with my mum, dad, and grandpa. They'd need a fourth player, and I was interested, so I joined in. I started with mini-bridge and then I learned about bidding and stuff like that.

Q: When was your first time playing at a Bridge club?

Earlier this year. I played in the supervised section with my dad and liked it a lot. Taking Paul Marston's youth lessons helped me get to that stage. I have other activities like dance and soccer on Saturdays, so I can't go any more. But every Sunday I play with my mum and dad and sometimes I go to Youth Bridge Night in the city where I play with another girl who is around my age.

Q: Have you beaten an adult yet? Yes! I've taken up contracts before and declared and made them. It feels pretty good, especially when some people underestimate you.

Q: Who's taught you the most about Bridge? Dad, he's taught me things like Blackwood and other complex bids. We usually play together on Sunday nights.

Q: What do you like most about Bridge?

I like using my brain and the logic of the game. I also like the pressure of defending.

Q: Do your school friends know you play Bridge?

Yes, I gave a presentation about Bridge at school a few weeks ago. They know I'm good at thinking games but they don't know much about it.

Q: Do you see yourself playing Bridge as an adult?

I think so. My club (NSBC) gives me free membership until I'm 25 (sic 26). The good thing is, as I get older, more people my age will play, which will be cool. At the moment, I only know one girl who's my age who plays.

Q: What's a Bridge goal you want to achieve? I'd love to play in the Tasmanian Festival of Bridge next year. My dad played there with my Grandma, and he said it was really cool. My Grandparents live in Hobart, which is where the festival is. I like playing competitions in pairs.

Genevieve added to her comments for the NSW Bridge Club, to us, with the following:

I started playing when I was 8 years old. I prefer to be defender on lead, because I can hint to my partner how

we may take the contract down. I like it when I declare an extra hard contract or take off a contract. I prefer playing in pairs than a team.

From what I have heard/seen in writing this Newsletter Genevieve sounds very much like our Sue Crompton who is always aggressive in her interpretations of how to play a hand - **GO FOR IT!**

DEAR DIRECTOR

One thing you notice with Bridge there are a lot of rules! I love defending but it is very important to get a few things correct. When you lead you overlead. With KQJx lead the King. However when you lead a card to partner and partner has the Ace and King they play the Ace which is denying the King. So try to make things easier for your partner and if you have two touching honours and partner leads play your lowest touching honour.

Board 25 Open EL 27th August.

On this hand no one managed to get to slam and some people played in

a part-score.

I would open the East hand with 1 Club. South should overcall 1 Spade. Some bid 3 Spades which should be weak however you are not worried about missing game here and you may well want to be disruptive to the opps. Over 1 Spade West should bid 2 Diamonds. Now East should bid 4 Diamonds. This is not invitational it is saying to my partner - I'm interested in slam. Now with West's 15 HCP and a singleton heart, decides to bid 4NT. East will bid 5 Clubs (1 or 4 key cards) and now West would bid 6 Diamonds. Yes 7NT, 7C and 7D makes but everything is very friendly.

On this hand a lot of people got to an non-optimal contract. West is dealer and they open 1 Diamond. North can overcall 1 Heart here but I prefer 4 Hearts - it's very unlikely you will miss slam. The opps will probably let you play there. However if you decide to overcall 1 Heart. East will now probably bid 1 Spade. South has 5 trumps and a singleton spade and should call 4 Hearts, (if South had a strong hand they should do a cue raise). West following East

bid of 1 Spade would call 4 Spades. Now with your hand as North don't bid 5 Hearts just let them play in 4 Spades and that is a good score for N/S. Quite a few pairs bid to 5 Hearts and one to 6 Hearts.

ASK GARY

Bridge post-mortems are super helpful for anyone looking to get better at the game, especially with all the online resources these days.

Basically, a bridge postmortem means going over the hands you played so you can spot what worked and figure out where you can improve. Lots of players spend up to an hour chatting about boards with their partners after a session, since it really helps both people grow and play better together.

Whether you're just playing bridge for fun or you're into competitions, postmortems can really boost your performance and make the whole experience more enjoyable.

Talking things through helps build stronger partnerships because it's all about finding better contracts and tweaking strategies, not pointing fingers. It's always useful to watch how more experienced folks handle things—you can pick up some great tips that way. Sometimes you'll get unlucky just because your opponents played really well; that's just part of the game and nothing to stress over.

It's a good idea to hang out at the table with your partner for 10–20 minutes after you finish playing, to go over any tough boards and see if there were better ways to bid or defend. The idea is to keep it positive and focus on learning together, not criticizing. Checking out how skilled players handle bidding and play decisions can also teach you a lot.

In the end, a relaxed and honest bridge postmortem helps everyone keep improving—both when it comes to playing smarter and communicating better as a team—so you're less likely to make the same mistakes next time.
